I am directed by the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury to transmit to you herewith a copy of a letter dated the 3rd instant, which They have received from the Foreign Office on the subject of an adjustment being made between the Government of the East Africa Protectorate and His Majesty's Legation at Adis Ababa whereby the emoluments of Mr. Zaphiro from January 1st last should be shared equally between them.

The correspondence, to which reference is made in Mr. Langley's letter, was not enclosed with it, and My Lords do not appear to have been consulted by the Secretary of State for the Colonies on the subject. In these circumstances They do not feel quite clear as to the nature of the arrangement suggested and before deciding on Sir E. Grey's proposal They would be glad to be favoured with Mr. Harcourt's views on it and with copies of the connected correspondence.

I am directed by Secretary Sir E. Grey to state for the information of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, that a letter has been received from the Colonial Office on the subject of an adjustment being made between the Government of the East Africa Protectorate and His Majesty's Legation at Adis Ababa whereby the emoluments of Mr. Zaphiro from January 1st last should be shared equally between them.

Mr. Zaphiro, as Their Lordships are aware, was until recently inspector of the frontier between the East Africa Protectorate and Abyssinia and has now accepted the post of Abyssinian Secretary at His Majesty's Legation at Adis Ababa.

Mr. Zaphiro accepted further employment as an officer in the service of the East Africa Protectorate and sailed for Jibbuti in August 1910. He was required to return via Adia Ababa for the purpose of assisting His Majesty's Minister in negotiations on the subject of the frontier, and arrived in Adia Ababa on the subject of the has remained ever since.

Since the letter from the Colonia Office was written, proposing the compremise set forts above, another, despatch has, it is understood, been received from Sir P.

Girouard in which he maintains that the Protectorate should not be called upon to pay any portion of Mr. Zaphiro's emoluments since September, but as, in assisting the boundary negotiations, he may be considered as having done work on behalf of the Protectorate as well as on behalf of His Majesty's Legation, Sir E. Grey does not consider such a proposal should be entertained.

Considering however that Mr. Zaphiro hasnow been given a permanent position in His Majesty's Legation, and that the East Africa Protectorate have not had the direct benefit of his services since his return from leave and that since the dismissal of Mr. Beru in October last, he has performed a certain amount of interpreter's work at the Legation, I am to request that the compromise suggested by the Colonial Office may receive the sanction of the Lords Commissioners, and that Mr. Zaphiro's emoluments as from January 1st last may be divided equally between the East Africa Protectorate and His Majesty's Legation.
