I am just back from leave and find one or two points to write to you about.

(1) The post of Headmaster in the Arab school at Mombasa is again to be filled. You will remember that the original salary was £200 by £20 to £300. This has now been altered to £250 by £10 to £300 as it was found that £200 was too low a figure for a University man to start at in Mombasa. I enclose some copies of the conditions, as revised. A young graduate of Oxford or Cambridge, who is likely to impress the Arabs as a gentleman is above all things required. He need not have a good degree, but should be of good character and influence, fond of teaching and, if possible, with a turn for languages, as he will have to learn Swahili as soon as possible.

(2) The post of Vice Principal of the Government Model School, Sierra Leone, will also have to be filled within a few weeks. If you remember, I sent you details of this post about three months ago, saying that a candidate would be required in the autumn. I now enclose a further copy of the conditions.

An honours graduate of a British University with a qualification in manual training is required. He should have some teaching experience and by preference should be a science man.

If you know of any man whom you think suitable for either of these posts I shall be very glad if you would let me know of them.

PS You will of course regard what I have said as to our requirements for the post as strictly confidential

P.E.GREVILLE, C.N.HEATH, and J.N.S.OWEN.

The pick of these I certainly should say would be P.E.Greville. He is not a very impressive man in build but he is distinctly a gentleman and has had a good Public School education. He has just refused a Mathematical Mastership with elementary Science at Perth, Western Australia. He would seem to have very useful qualifications for Mombasa and has decided ability for picking up languages.

I do not know C.N.Heath personally but Mr. Roberts speaks well of him and thinks he would be a good selection for Mombasa. The Emmanuel Tutor speaks extremely well of him. You will probably prefer to fit him in for the Government Model School. Sierra Leone
