It is true that topees are obtainable at Mombasa and Nairobi, but at a much higher cost. It is much better to leave the passage as a suggestion for the purchase to be made at Port Said, otherwise there is always the possibility of people going ashore at Port Sudan or Aden in ordinary hats and getting sun stroke.

Outlery and Chinaware. This is not supplied by Government.
