REC'D 15 AUG 16I. THE DETAILS.

(1) On the 5th of July a letter dated Archer's Post June 25th was received from Mr. Kittermaster. He gives the following news:-

(a) Mr. Butler at Moyale states that a report has been received from an Abyssinian agent of a gathering of 200 Tigre under Ex-Fitaurari Tadia near El Der. They are said to have collected in response to an invitation from the Garreh to assist in driving out the Dagodia, vide I.(ii) of last week's Precis. Mr. Butler considers there is possibly an element of truth in the report though the number is probably exaggerated.

(b) Mr. Glenday reports that the remnants of the village of Sheikh Mahamud, Dagodi, Jibrahil, have arrived at Buna. The village was attacked when on the move near Luffs, north of Eil Wak, by the Darawa Garreh, the Sheikh himself with 19 males and 4 females being killed and the stock carried off.

Sheikh Mahamud is a Dagodi who has lived on friendly terms with the Garreh for years.

The Darawa Garreh are connected with the Darawa from Italian territory, some of whom are said to have joined in the attack.

The Garreh have left Eil Wak and are retiring north and west.

The situation is complicated and Mr. Kittermaster fears that before long there will be raiding on a large scale. He thinks that as soon as we are prepared really to occupy the country we can get rid both of the Tigre and the Dagodia without much difficulty. He intends therefore to isolate if possible the quarrel between the Garreh and Dagodia, leaving the former to take care of themselves as best they can. When the operations against the Aulihan are commenced the Dagodia

can also be dealt with and driven across the Daua River.

(ii) The Acting Provincial Commissioner, Kiambu, has been asked to repeat the telegram referred to in I.(iv) of last week's Precis.

II. DISPOSITION OF SOMALI TRIBES.

No change reported.

III DISPOSITION OF OFFICERS.

Mr. Kittermaster has left for Marsabit.
