I do not understand the position. The military authorities in German East Africa used to be able to unload ~~the~~ the National Bank of India at Dar-es-Salaam any German local currency that they ~~wished~~ having given the Bank a guarantee that they themselves would ~~wish~~ ~~accept that currency from the Bank at its face value.~~ ~~as far as it might eventually hold.~~ We have now authorised Mr. Byatt by telegraph to give the Banks operating in the occupied territory an assurance that, even after the withdrawal of the military authorities the Government will continue to recognise the German local coin as legal tender at its full face value unless and until it is replaced by British currency at par. This assurance ought to be enough to guarantee the free circulation of the German local coin in German East Africa itself. This being so, the National Bank of India ought to have no difficulty in giving the military authorities credit at Nairobi for German local coin deposited by the military authorities with the branches

branches of the Bank in the occupied territory. It is difficult to believe that there has been any question of shipping German local coin to the National Bank of India at Nairobi and asking for a credit there in Indian currency.

The National Bank is the bank of military authorities. The civil administration of East Africa employs the Standard Bank as its bank. It is just possible that the Bank is not aware of the assets. Recently empowered Mr. Byatt has given his views on the future of the local currency.

The first step is to get in touch with Mr. Bowring as in the enquiry it is difficult to say what the situation is. And
