

Report on death of No. 5687, Cpl. R. Gooden, M.L.B.

This N.C.O. was admitted as a sick transfer stretcher case from Morogoro, suffering from Cerebral Malaria. There was a history of Acute Mania caused by his disease and the patient's condition on admission was very serious. He was put on the Dangerously Ill List and died on the evening of 22.4.17.

He was buried in the Military Cemetery at Darassalam. Owing to his mental condition on admission, and throughout his stay, no information could be obtained as to his religion. On his death being announced A.C. Base was requested to see that he was buried in accordance with the rites of his church.

Report on death of No. 5830, Sgt. H.A. Fleggmere, M.L.B.

This N.C.O. was admitted as a direct (local) admission on 2nd June 1917 with a history of 3 or 4 Malarial attacks during 18 months of service in East Africa. He was put on the Dangerously Ill List as suffering from Cerebral Malaria. He was seriously ill when admitted and passed into a semi conscious condition the following day, before his death. He was attended by the Church of England Chaplain and buried in the Military Cemetery here with the rites of his church.
