

PRECIS OF EVENTS CONNECTED WITH THE UNREST  
IN TURKANA FOR THE PERIOD JULY 7TH TO JULY  
21ST 1917.

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( 6th Precis )

Captain Mayne left LOKIRIAMA on June 3rd and travelled via LOBAMA and MORONGWOLE to NATIRA. Having been daily pestered by spies he made efforts to capture some from NATIRA and succeeded in seizing five men.

He then proceeded eastwards past the MAKALALE River with the object of intercepting raiders returning from Suk, but hearing that these had already retired north, he abandoned this attempt on the 6th June.

The Nyisirr Turkana adopted a threatening attitude, and Captain Mayne seized certain stock from them. He returned to LOKIRIAMA on June 14th with the stock.

A number of Ngamatak Turkana have appeared in LOKIRIAMA in response to Captain Mayne's summons and appear to be desirous of peace, but the Ngamatak are strongly suspected of having participated in the recent raid on the Suk.

Captain Mayne is of opinion that the recent raid on the Suk was a half hearted affair organized and carried out by the Turkana without assistance from Abyssinians.

The raid was not particularly successful ( vide N. 5th Precis )

MOVEMENT OF OFFICERS

Lieutenant C. G. H. Johnson has arrived in Tokirama.

Notes.

Captain Mayne is of the opinion that the present Turkana situation centres round the Abyssinian Aparu, who is at present at LOMOGOL with from three to five hundred riflemen, recuperating from wounds. Aparu and his Abyssinian followers together with the Marille Donyiro and other tribes constitute the only danger in the area.

He advises the District Commissioner Kacheliba to form a strong outpost at the Turkwell bend and to place every available man at this point.
