Sir, I am directed by the Board of Council to inform you, in reply to your letter of the 18th of May, that on the receipt of that letter a telegram was sent to the Governor of the East Africa Protectorate stating that you had informed his Lordship that all your proposals were made to Mr Montgomery subject to native rights, and that you considered that they were agreed to with slight alterations.

The Gov. has replied that Mr Montgomery states that you made no definite proposals for the basis of negotiations, that Mr Montgomery's suggestion would be sent by next mail.
