My Lord,

I venture to ask that in all cases where Bonds or Agreements in connection with Concessions and other matters are prepared in London by the Crown Agents, the drafts of such Bonds or Agreements be sent to me for consideration before they are finally entered into with the parties concerned.

2. In the case of the Bond entered into by the Soma Trading Company, a copy of which was received under cover of Your Lordship's despatch No. 261 of the 8th ultmo, there is a penal clause the insertion of which was agreed upon in the earlier stages of the correspondence with the Company but afterwards we were inclined to doubt whether such a clause might not lead to inconvenience with other parties and somewhat tie our hands as regards other applications to trade in this part of the country on less extended lines than those advocated by the Soma Trading Company.

3. For instance Mr. Williams had already entered into

into arrangements for developing trade routes from South Abyssinia, without giving such a guarantee as has been required from the Boma Trading Company, and it was felt that this guarantee of £2000 which the Boma Trading Company not only did not object to, but on the contrary were anxious to give, might have the effect of placing the Company in the position of being able to object should others be allowed to trade in that part of the country without a similar guarantee being required, which we might not always be able to exact.

4. For these reasons I came to the conclusion that it would be well not to insist on the guarantee, or penal clause, and in a letter written to Captain Middell on the 21st July last, copy of which is enclosed, he was informed that I did not consider it necessary to insist on the guarantee.

5. As a penal clause I have no other objection to the clause in question which I think is right in principle, so long as it is not regarded by the Company as constituting a bar to others from whom a similar guarantee is not exacted, and in view of the letter to Captain Riddell to which I have referred, this contingency should be obviated.

Sir,

In reply to your letter of December 31st relative to the establishment of a trading post at Marsabit, I am directed to inform you that His Excellency will be prepared to give you all reasonable assistance in effecting this purpose and in trading between this post and the Abyssinian frontier but that there can be no question of a monopoly.

2. I am to add that His Excellency does not consider it necessary to insist on the guarantee you propose.

3. I am to inform you however that owing to difficulties which have recently arisen between the Abyssinians and the Italians, and in view of the fact that it is proposed to shortly despatch three officers to exercise control on the Abyssinian border, the operations of your Syndicate should be deferred for a few months till the Government is able to afford them assistance on the spot.

Sir,

I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your despatch No.

X 270 of the 2^d of June, in which you request that prostrances when made or agreements in connection with concessions or other matters are prepared by the Crown Agents the drafts of such bonds or agreements should be sent to you for examination before they are finally entered into with the parties concerned.

2. Your wishes in this matter will be borne in mind; and effect will be given to them in all cases, except where the delay involved in reference to you would seriously prejudice the enterprise.

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
