The German quote on the stamp reads "When we plant trees, we plant the seeds of peace and hope".


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First Cohort of Interns at Elgon-Kenya Flagged off

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ERASMUS STUDENT EXCHANGE PROGRAMME

The University of Nairobi through its collaborative agreements with partner universities promotes quality assurance through the Student Exchange Programme which includes consortium sponsored programmes, Semester Abroad Programme (SAP) and Students' Exchange.

An exchange involves a formal agreement between the University of Nairobi and an international university that allows us to exchange students each year.

In 2019, the university sent students through the programme to the University of Hradec Králové in the Czech Republic. Here is a narration of the students, Monica Osuka-Religious Studies student, and Purity Wanjiku- Psychology who were beneficiaries of the exchange.

"My humble appreciation goes to the University of Nairobi stakeholders who gave me the golden opportunity that has given me a chance to go beyond my geographical territories -both career-wise, academically, socially and culturally," says Osuka.

One of the most amazing experiences was the great opportunity to teach at an elementary school. It was unique to have young minds try and learn the Swahili language and play games that they had not played in the past.

They got to see Kenya: especially the wildlife, forestry, food, sportsmen and women among other items.

"Living abroad has its challenges for example there is culture shock when you arrive, the food is different as well as the language is spoken. The major problem I faced, however, was financial assistance. If you do not manage your finances well you will be in deep trouble," says Purity.

There are principles that you learn from such experiences for example punctuality, which is an important aspect here - lateness will cause you to miss the bus hence you will be behind schedule.

In addition, education is student-oriented and it makes one horn their presentation skills, analytical skills as well as critical thinking.

I would recommend the office to be given an opportunity to hold a public awareness of the same in the institution, use the social media Platforms-Twitter, Facebook, Instagram the main university website because this is where information can really reach a good number of the students and in future have an `EXCHANGE ALUMNI` forum to discuss on how to make international improvements on the same.
