Finally, he called on all members of the Assembly to devote themselves to their duties and offer an inspiring example to our people of the strength of our national unity and spirit of 'harambee'.

The entry of the President into the Chamber as he moved in State procession into the House, accompanied by Mr. Maiti, was greeted by loud drumming by M.P.s.

Kenya's first woman M.P., Mrs. Grace Ogotia (televised), Member for Kisumu Town and Mrs. Gegeza (Nominated) — left a feminine touch in their imposing national dress.

Take-over of wholesale trade announced in Dar

The State Trading Corporation is in process of setting up wholesale distribution facilities throughout the country.

The Dar es Salaam Merchants' Chamber of Commerce yesterday gave full backing to the intended takeover by the State of imports, exports and wholesale business.

The chairman of the Chamber, Mr. M. S. Devani, said the chamber realised the time had come for the Government to take over the distribution sector of the economy.

'We would like to assure the Government the full support that the Asian commercial community will give in building a socialist Tanzania society,' Mr. Devani said.

The chamber is made up of 240 wholesalers and 40 retailers.

The chamber was aware that the take-over would be particularly painful to traders who have no other source of earning their livelihood.

But the sacrifice will have to be made for the wider interests of the people of Tanzania especially at a time when the nation is on the road to reach the target of socialism.

Mr. Devani welcomed the offer by the chairman of the State Trading Corporation, Mr. Dikson Nkembo, for import and wholesale business. The S.T.C. chamber would soon start approaching the S.T.C. to find ways and means of working together.

The chamber would co-operate with the National Development Corporation in whatever way it could. 'We are willing to give these two parastatal bodies the benefit of our experience and knowledge. Our resources are available to the Government to carry out the change so timely required,' Mr. Devani concluded.

The Standard Staff Reporter in London said:

President Nyerere's announcement that Tanzania was to take over the import and wholesale trade was fully reported here in a quiet way. Development in the area were long expected by London wholesalers and those companies planning investment are doing so through the National Trading Corporation and were unaltered by the latest moves.

British manufacturers are just willing to sell to a nationalised company as to private firms. In the future the National Assembly will be taken to Dr. Nyerere's remarks about Africanisation but they were not considered anywhere near the possibility of Kenyan and Uganda U.K. passport holders clamouring for work vouchers for Britain.

Along with takeover of the new nationalisation in the private sector was seen as yet another step towards complete socialism in Tanzania.

But Britain trades with countries far to left and right of Tanzania and as a spokesman for the British National Export Council said last week, while some had thrown up their hands in despair over Tanzania, they had every confidence in Tanzania.

There was brisk business between Britain and Tanzania and the B.N.E.C. is actively considering getting a stand at Saba Saba Fair.

India worried by new turn on immigrants

India is distressed at reports of the possible expulsion of 13 Kenya Asians of Indian origin who entered Britain without proper documents a few days ago, a Government spokesman said in New Delhi yesterday.

He told reporters: 'We have heard their reports with distress. We hope the U.K. authorities will not take any action which would cause legitimate resentment in this country.'

He said the Government had received reports that 13 Asians from Kenya, presumably, had been deported from the special visa without the special endorsements for entry to Britain, the Soviet Union. He was sure there was a possibility that they might be sent to India.

Asked whether India would take up their case, he said: 'Not yet.'

In London yesterday it was disclosed that Germany has now been dragged into the U.K. passport holders problem.

On Friday, after detaining her Office deported Mrs. Rajan Vaid to Frankfurt. She flew to London a day in transit in Germany and this was stamped in her passport by the German authorities who were contacted by the girl's brother who says Britain is likely to return her to her country of domicile not to where they spent one year before finally leaving Kenya.

The Committee on U.K. Citizenship is taking up the case with the Minister responsible for immigration, Mr. Merlyn Reece.

As Germany requires a visa for D passport holders, or a work permit, they are unable to return to their country of domicile. It is therefore likely to be shunted back to London where the authorities have little option but to admit her as she has no re-entry permit for Kenya.

Another arrival expected today is Mr. Babul Popat (31), a Nairobi mechanic who was deported to Paris on Thursday night following Home Office refusal to grant him a visa for his employment in Germany.

Mr. Popat claimed he waited in the queue for a visa for about a year before finally losing patience and travelling to the Continent from where he flew to Gatwick and was immediately detained. The Home Office did not return him to Nairobi as he too did not possess a re-entry permit.

Other Kenyan Asians are still detained in Canterbury Prison or Dover Detention Centre while six others were charged last December under the Forgery Act and remanded until February 22.

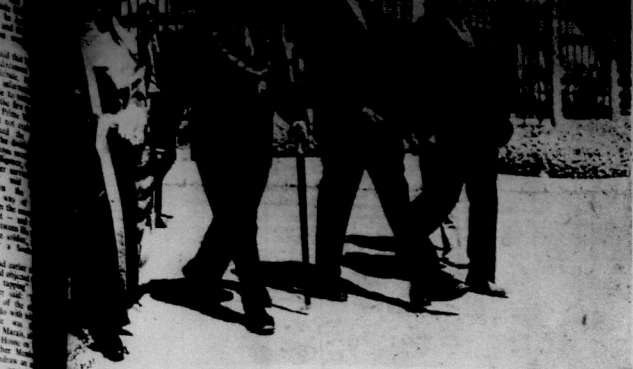

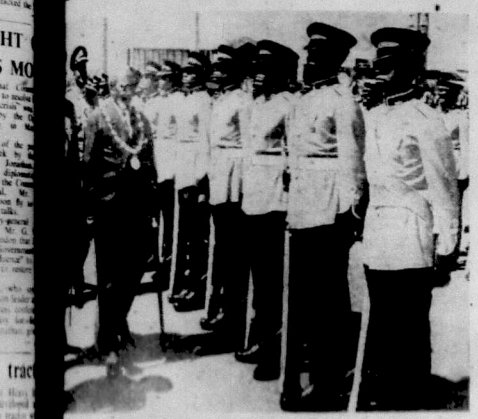

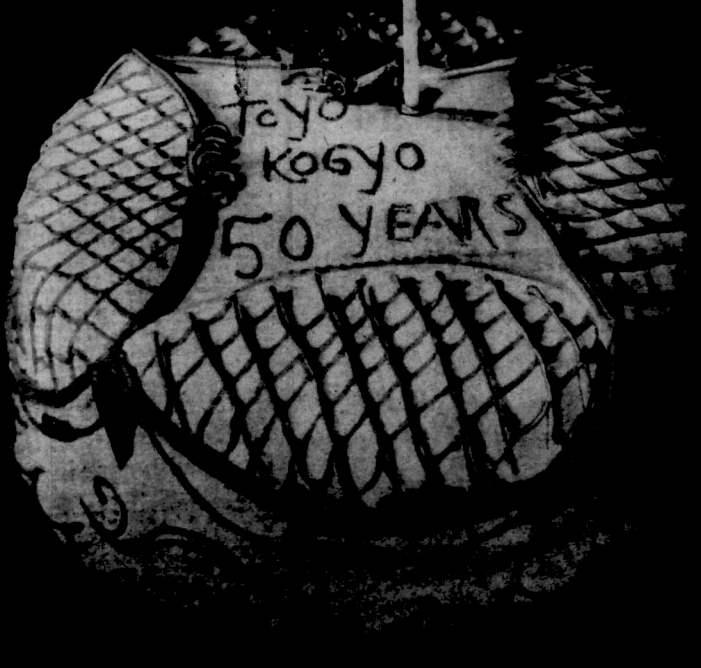

The Japanese Ambassador to Kenya, Mr. Ando, has a warm sense of greeting for the country's leader, Mr. F. K. Konyo. The Ambassador welcomed the strong mission to Kenya at the start of its visit to East Africa. The mission is due to leave for Tanzania on Thursday after talks with Kenya Government and other officials.

A top-level delegation of Japanese industrialists arrived in Kenya yesterday. The 34 members of the mission were welcomed at Nairobi Airport by an Assistant Minister for Commerce and Industry, Mr. Wood.

Kenya is the first East African country to be visited by the mission, which is due to leave for Tanzania after three days in Nairobi talking with Government Ministers, the Kenya National Chamber of Commerce and Industry and visiting industrial projects.

The team is also expected to explore the possibility of Japanese imports of Kenya's agricultural products, mainly tea.

At the airport to meet the delegation, which was led by the chairman of Mitsubishi Heavy Industries, Mr. F. Konyo, were the Japanese Ambassador to Kenya, Mr. Ando, and officials of the Ministries of Commerce and Industry and Foreign Affairs.

Mr. Konyo told a Press conference: It is with the greatest pleasure that we have come to Kenya. We should like to have discussions with Kenya leaders re-

trade relations between the two countries.

"I have been most impressed by the economic stride that Kenya has made since independence in 1963, under the leadership of her great leader, Mr. Kenyatta. The people of Kenya have made strenuous efforts to uplift themselves."

"During our stay here we will take the opportunity of getting acquainted with businessmen, Government leaders and people of all walks of life."

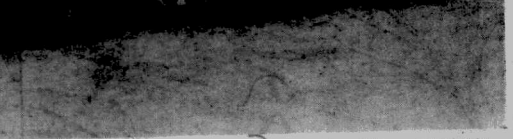
Mr. Konyo said the mission was not in Kenya to solve any specific problems or to bring about results overnight, but to have consultations aimed at increasing trade between the two countries. Trade between East Africa and Japan was growing at a great rate, although there was still a need for expansion.

The aim of the mission was a long term one, and although the duration of its stay in Kenya would be short, it was hoped that through discussion a firm foundation would

be laid for mutual trade and co-operation.

Mr. Konyo said members of the mission had come to Kenya with an open mind and would be happy to listen to suggestions and criticisms.

Although Japanese imports from Kenya and other East African countries were not as high as the people of East Africa would like to see, it was only through continued trade and co-operation that the problem could be solved, and not through

Mr. Konyo said the delegation included heads of various industrial companies in Japan and a number of specialists and advisers.

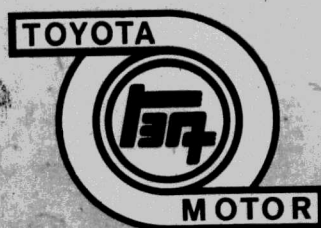

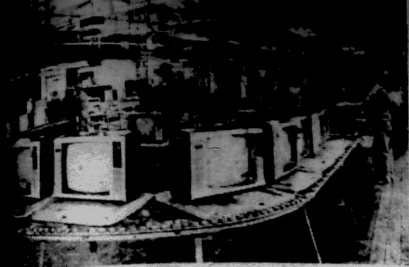

Great importance is being attached to the role to be played by smaller industry in the economic development of emerging countries.

Development of smaller industry is thought to promote the expansion of labour employment, the spread of technology in traditional by backward communities, and capital saving and intensive labour utilisation.

Large plants built in African countries usually have a low operation rate, and employment of indigenous personnel remains at a low ebb.

This is because African countries do not have sufficient capital and foreign exchange reserves needed to maintain such modern factories. Another reason is that these countries do not have a sufficient number of skilled workers to operate such plants.

In addition, the purchasing power to consume their products is also lacking in African nations. Most modern factories are run by Europeans and Asians. It is for these reasons that many nations have come to show great interest

in Africa

in the development of small industries.

There are many reasons why Japan can offer useful examples to African nations. Japan's industrialisation was started much later than in the United States and European nations, yet Japan joined the family of industrially advanced nations in a relatively short space of time. There was plenty of labour available in Japan. And there are still a large number of smaller industries in Japan.

Japan's rapid modernisation was brought about chiefly by the great progress made in industrialisation. The traditional cottage industry, transformed into a modern light industry, then heavy and chemical industries began to show marked growth.

In fact, Japanese industry as a whole underwent major changes during the initial 20 or 30 years of its development. Before this period, however, Japanese industry consisted largely of cultivation of

food crops and processing of textile raw materials by traditional techniques for local markets.

Japan's industrialisation began with the development of light industry for domestic markets. Most of the domestic demand was met in about 20 years. At this stage of industrialisation, however, the role played by large, modern factories was quite limited. The protagonist was still small industry.

The industrialisation of Japanese industry contributed immensely to Japan's foreign trade. Japan's exports prior to industrialisation consisted mainly of primary products, such as silk and tea, much as is the case with developing countries today.

As light industry was developed, however, cotton goods were added to Japan's export list, thus diversifying the nation's trade structure. Japan's export trade during this period centred on light industrial products, notably silk and cotton

The major factor contributing to Japan's industrial development and trade expansion was active production in its small industry.

With the development of light industry reaching its final stage, Japan's efforts towards industrialisation were now directed at the production of heavy and chemical products, notably iron and steel. Small industry performed an important part in Japan's modernisation, especially in the early stage of industrialisation. It contributed to increasing employment and production.

About 70-80 per cent of the employment was accounted for by such industry. A considerable portion of industrial production was also contributed by smaller factories. This was especially true of light industrial products, notably consumer goods.

Another thing that can be said in favour of small industry is that small factories can be operated efficiently even where the market is small.

Considering the fact that in many African countries, transport and communications networks are still largely undeveloped, small businesses can be best managed, under the present circumstances, to serve a small regional market in its neighbourhood.

In this respect, Japan's foodstuff and brewery industries are a case in point. African exports can be increased by selling highly processed products manufactured from domestic natural resources. Increased exports of such goods will bring about more value added. 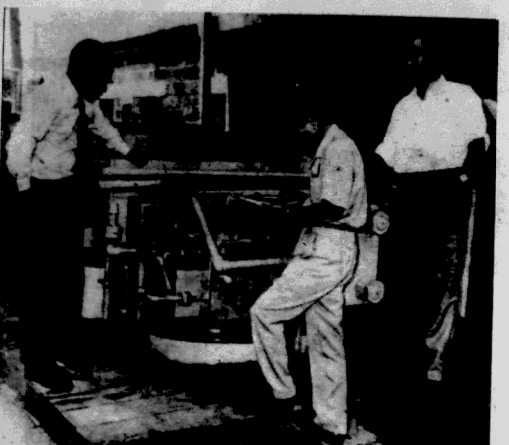

MAN-MADE TEXTILES—MADE IN KENYA

Kenya Toray Mills Limited were the pioneers of man-made textiles in East Africa. They were also one of the leaders in a new sort of enterprise—a manufacturing project designed to help accelerate industrialisation in Kenya, which at the same time provides local people with an opportunity to learn a new and highly skilled trade.

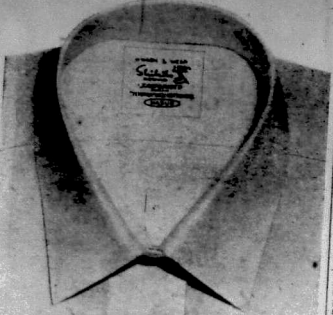

in flowers

Ikebana, the Japanese word for flower arrangement, is based upon certain principles of art which are recognised the world over.

The love of line so characteristic of all Oriental Art rather than the perhaps the most salient feature in differentiating Japanese flower arrangement from all others.

The arrangement is linear in composition, consisting of the most common branch material.

However, if this branch material is arranged in a beautiful flowing line, it is preferred to a group of blossoms, no matter how beautiful the latter may be in colour and form.

Equally as strong as the emphasis on linear perfection is the teaching of naturalism; an insistence on understanding the natural growth of the material used and a love of nature in all her phases.

At its inception 11 centuries ago, Ikebana was designed to symbolise certain Japanese philosophical concepts of Buddhism.

However, with the progress of time, the complete Japanisation of flower arrangement and its adaptation to people, much of the religious content was lost and the teaching of naturalism emphasised.

The symbolism of the passage of time, is of importance in Japanese flower arrangement and is evident to the discerning eye. No arrangement would be acceptable if it did not in some way suggest the time of the year — buds, suggesting future growth.

The art of flower arrangement bases its precepts upon line, rhythm and colour as the means toward achieving a re-creation of floral growth.

Westerners have always emphasised the quantity and colours of the materials, devoting their attention mainly to the beauty of blossoms. The Japanese, however, emphasise the line of the arrangement and have developed the art to include stems, leaves and branches as well as flowers.

The underlying principles which make practical the Japanese arrangement of flowers are indicated

by three main lines which are symbolic of Heaven, Man and Earth. These form the framework upon which the whole structure of Japanese flower arrangement is built.

The most important line is the stem which is symbolic of Heaven and often called Primary or "Shin", central line of the whole arrangement. Therefore, one should choose the strongest stem available.

Next to the Primary stem is Secondary or "Soe", which is symbolic of Man. It is placed in such a manner as to give the effect of growing sideways and forward from the centre line. It should be approximately two-thirds the height of the Primary stem and inclined toward it.

The Tertiary or "Mikae" stem, symbolic of the Earth, is the shortest and is placed to the front or slightly to the opposite side of the roots of the first two. All are fastened securely in a holder to give the effect of growing from one stem. Additional flowers may be added to fill out each arrangement, but it is the correct position of the three principal stems which is of paramount importance.

In arranging flowers, one should

arrangement depends upon its size, width and depth.

After the materials for the arrangement have been chosen, the next step in the procedure is pruning. Most flowers or branches, no matter how shapely or orderly they may have grown, have some superfluous parts, especially when they are used for the purpose of an artistic arrangement. They therefore need some pruning, a greater part of which should be done before the branches are assembled, the rest being performed while the branches are being arranged.

In order to keep the flowers fresh, both physical and chemical devices are now employed.

The simplest and easiest of them is Mikazuki, or cutting stems in the water. This device will avoid exposing the cut end of the stems to the air which would cause poor suction by the plants. As for chemical methods, a little hydrochloric acid or sulphuric acid, when diluted with some water, will revive and

refresh the flowers. An even simpler application of chemical aid is to place a pinch of salt and rub it into the end of the stems.

Flowers and branches should be arranged so that they will be secure and at the same time will have equilibrium. This means that the arrangement must be firmly fixed in the vase. To obtain security and equilibrium, the arrangement must make a curve, and the "foot" by twisting the stem against the inside surface of the vase. The bending or twisting of a branch should be done slowly and carefully, the performer using both hands, in order to avoid its being broken.

Full blown flowers or full buds are seldom used; tight buds are preferred. The branches of trees, including large leaves or bushes, are used, except while the leaves are in bud.

The reason for this preference is ten fold: first, while a branch is still in bud, the beauty of the stem is unobscured, secondly, when the buds are used, the pleasure of watching them open slowly. On the subject of perfection, it should be noted that the flowers should be perfect in form, and should drop this expression of perfection only death and dissolution are in bud.

This idea of conveying vitality is paramount in Japanese flower arrangement. The arrangement should be a re-creation of the development of flowers and not a static arrangement when the Asakusa Shrine, in the 16th Century, was founded by the artist Suami, some 100 years after the rules for flower arrangement so that all classes of people could enjoy floral compositions of their own making. This new style is called "Sewa".

Another development took place during the Momoyama Period (16th Century), when tea masters created a more informal expression in floral compositions. For this purpose, a freer style emerged which

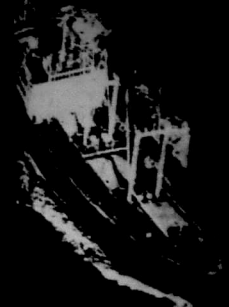

Tea-drinking—the very model of politeness

The art of drinking tea is an ancient tradition. In the Far East, tea drinking is a means to social communion and to enjoying the taste of life. Here is how it is done. The powdered green tea is brewed up with a small bamboo cup, a deep bowl. Hot water

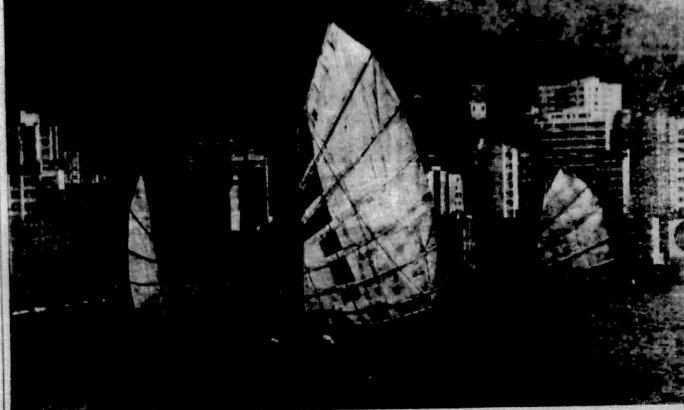

Powerful force for electrical industries

Japan's heavy electric equipment and machinery industry has grown to gigantic proportions, having an annual output worth more than \$1.7 billion.

The nation's major electric companies have already reached the level of other advanced countries in production capacity and technology.

The Japan Electric Machinery Industry Association estimated the 1967 output at around \$1.930 billion, an increase of nine per cent from the previous year.

This was due mainly to extension of equipment expansion in the power generation, iron-steel, machinery and chemical industries.

An electric power research council, a private organisation, said Japan's power consumption rose at an annual average of 9.6 per cent over the next five years.

The council said 330,000 million kWh of electricity will be consumed in 1973 as compared with an estimated 200 million kWh in 1968 and 232,500 million kWh in 1969.

It estimated power supply for lighting at 43,700 million kWh for 1968, a 10.3 per cent increase over last year and that for business at 24,900 million kWh, a 15.1 per cent increase.

Because of this impressive expansion of the power industry which accounts for 35 per cent of the total domestic demand for heavy electric machinery, the production of electric companies has registered a record of \$1,519 million.

Although the Second World War dealt a severe blow to Japan's heavy electric machinery industry, the post-war resources development programmes kick-started the production of the industry to put it back on its feet.

The programmes have been systematically stepped up by the government to meet the growing need for electricity, which is still increasing more than 10 per cent annually, in line with post-war Japan's social and economic progress.

Particularly noteworthy is the fact that hydroelectric power generating equipment made great strides in the five power resources development programmes, contributing a great deal to the industry itself and Japanese industry as a whole.

Prime movers for power generators have been in particularly high demand due to brisk orders from iron-steel, steel-chemical and construction companies, not to mention the electric power industry.

All kinds of water-wheel turbines including Francis turbines, Pelton turbines, tubular turbines, and reversible pump-turbines are manufactured in Japan and rate among the world's best.

Many of them have the world's largest capacity. Water wheels turbines are one type of machinery to which Japan's heavy electric machinery makers have wide manufacturing experience.

In line with the steady increase in production, exports of heavy electric machinery have been rising sharply in recent years.

Exports in 1968 reached a record \$200 million, compared with \$145 million in 1966. In 1967 exports were below \$100 million.

A decade ago Japan's exports of heavy electric machinery amounted to only \$43,900,000, a mere two per cent of the year's total output.

Despite the steady rise in exports in recent years, the growth rate of heavy electric machinery is lower than that of electronic appliances.

During the last few years, exports registered a sharp increase due to such strenuous efforts by manufacturers.

Exports in 1967, worth \$120 million, showed a 16 per cent increase over the previous year — a sizeable expansion.

Japan's exports of heavy electric machinery topped \$100 million for the first time in 1964, and since have moved higher on the strength of increased demand from Asian countries, the U.S. and Latin American countries.

Electronics is said to be a star in this age of technological innovation, and the electronics industry which makes full use of this science is counted among the foremost growth industries in Japan.

Already Japan's electronics industry is second only to the U.S. in production among the nations of the Free World, and its technical standards are recognised as very high by advanced Western countries.

Moreover, electronics continued to make constant, rapid progress. As a result, the demand for electronic instruments is expanding rapidly.

In the sphere of home appliances, electronic apparatus are now ranging from radios, television sets and tape recorders to electronic ranges and TV telephones.

And electronic desk computers will someday find their way into homes, freeing housewives from troublesome figure work. Furthermore, the day will not be very distant when printed newspapers will be replaced by "facsimile newspapers" to be directly transmitted to home receivers and "electroluminescence" will be adopted to substitute luminant walls for conventional lighting.

In the export of consumer electronic goods to Japan, the Government should establish a computer centre, equipped with a large-scale electronic computer accessible to researchers all over the country.

Statistics show that black and white colour TV sets have been installed in 94 per cent of all Japanese households.

Noteworthy is the fact that Japan is now the world's second largest producer of TV sets after the U.S., with the total production in 1967 of some 7,000,000 units, an increase of 22 per cent over the previous year.

In the field of electronic component parts, meantime, there has been a conspicuous progress, in the so-called "solid-state" devices (that is, use of solid semi-conductors instead of electron tubes) since transistor was invented two decades ago.

Japan's computer industry has been forging ahead with incredibly high speed despite the fact that it is less than 10 years old.

Now attracting keen attention as a possible pacemaker in the electronics of the future is LASER (light amplification by stimulated emission of radiation).

In 1963, the Science Council of Japan recommended that the Government should establish a computer centre, equipped with a large-scale electronic computer accessible to researchers all over the country.

Toyota Motor and Nissan Motor last year exported respectively 70.8 per cent and 50 per cent more than the preceding year. The "Big Two" auto-makers accounted for about 80 per cent of the nation's total auto exports in 1968.

Honda Motor and Fuji Heavy Industries, Ltd., were also good export performers last year, with their exports of midget cars rising four to five times compared with the previous year.

Until quite recently, motor car exports to industrially advanced countries had been rather negligible. In the past few years, however, exports to those countries have increased remarkably.

There are 12 producers of four-wheelers in Japan. They include Toyota, Nissan, Isuzu, Hino, Teruo, Kohji, Mitsubishi Heavy Industries, Fuji Heavy Industries, Honda Motors, Suzuki, Daihatsu, Aichi Machinery and Nissan Diesel.

For most of them, the production of trucks has not only been a very important operation but has been their chief source of income for some time.

Even such giants as Toyota and Nissan regarded as representative passenger car makers, did not get into truck production until 1962.

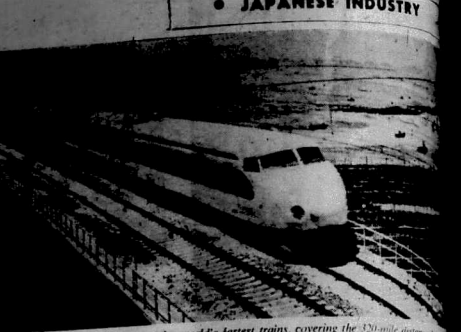
Passenger car assembly lines at the plant of the Toyota Motor Company.

New figures show burden borne by Kenyatta Hospital

An average of almost one operation an hour was carried out every day last year at Kenyatta National Hospital, the figures for 1969 disclose. They show that a total of 8,090 operations were performed in the hospital's six main operating theatres.

Almost as many - 7,551 - were carried out in the single operating theatre of the simple Department of Plastic Surgery.

The figures for the main 24-bed hospital only do not include other units such as the Rahimifala Wing and the Orthopaedic Hospital. A hospital spokesman said:

"These latest figures once again emphasize the intolerable burden on staff and equipment which our dedicated doctors and nurses have to overcome."

The total yearly operations at a British hospital of comparable size would average just over 3,000, a member of the information section of the British High Commission in Nairobi revealed.

The British Government loan is financing the £2,000,000 two-phase development at the hospital. A European specialist with many years' experience at Kenyatta National Hospital said: "They are desperately needed. I do not think a British hospital administrator would believe these figures possible with our present facilities. There has been a fantastic increase since independence."

At present the 637-bed hospital has 277 surgical beds and a small number of cots. The sister in charge of the main theatre said about 50 surgeons performed operations during the year - helped by a small theatre staff.

"Many of the nurses and dressers are tired by the amount of work they have to do. But the dedication of some of our long-serving members is overwhelming."

"One of the troubles is the big turnover among our young trained staff who either marry, drop out or become dispersed by the pressures."

The staff includes 14 qualified F.R.C.S. to student nurses and two enrolled nurses. "We rely very heavily on our trained and untrained dressers and the sister."

Most of them have no theoretical experience at all, but more than make up for it with years of practical experience. The staff is tired but they are not taking any rest days. The hospital has 11,000 in-patients.

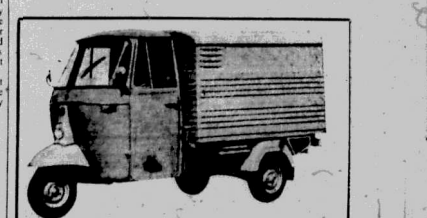

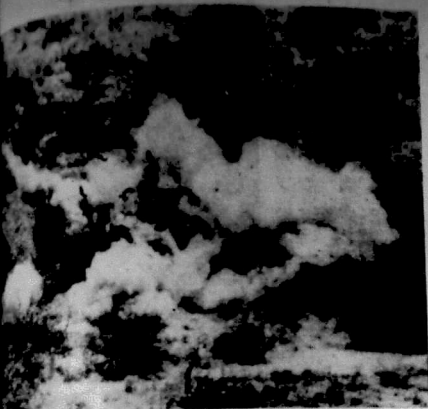

Khasakhal, the Kisumu District Commissioner, Mr. J. A. K. Kipsani, the Town Clerk, Mr. Ojwang' K'Omundo, and other Government officers, said that soil in Nyanza, particularly around Kisumu, was ideal for growing groundnuts.

The meeting was also attended by the Assistant Minister for Local Government and Member for Ugenya, Mr. Mathew Oguti.

Mr. Oguti regretted to note that women in the area who often had to walk long distances to fetch water had not attended the meeting. He urged men and women to attend such meetings so that they could be well informed on current affairs.

Mr. Oguti said water was essential to the health of human beings. He told his listeners that the Government would give them every possible assistance if they themselves could work hard on the project to get it moving.

Over 928 people joined adult literacy classes in Kisumu and Nyanza Districts last year, the adult education officer for the area, Mr. P. J. Odongo, stated in his annual report for 1969.

Mr. Odongo stated that more than 600 women had started in the year. He said supervisory staff were very necessary if proper teaching was to be carried out effectively through the two districts. **K.N.A.**

days would mean they would stay long periods without going home. The House should not sit more days than was necessary and he did not want to lose his seat at the next election.

Mr. M. Karunguru (Embakasi) felt that the day allowed for the debate were too few and suggested that the day should be held in the afternoon.

Mr. M. J. Seroney (Tidjete) proposed an amendment that the session should be allowed ten days and that each Member should be allowed 15 minutes. He said that many Members lost at the general election not because they talked too much but because they allowed themselves to be led to limitations.

The Speaker, Mr. Muti, ruled that these amendments could not be entertained because Members who wished to move them had not given notice in sufficient time. Replying to the debate, Mr. Muti again appealed to the Members to study the Standing Orders which guided the business of the House and even suggested that Mr. Muti should find a day to give a lecture to the Members.

Mr. Muti pointed out that the House had a lot of business and even if more time than ten minutes was given for debate, it would not address all Members who would be asked to speak.

Moving the main motion, which asked the House to record its thanks to the President for the address contained in the Presidential address from the chair on February 6, Mr. Muti said the House was pleased to note the direction development was going to take in all matters including education, rural development and getting women a fairer share in the management of the economic life of the country.

Mr. M. Muthiga (Nakuru Town) complained that the address did not spell out what was to be done with the large numbers of school leavers who could not secure employment. Many of them were becoming street-corner boys and girls in the urban areas and others would form gangs in rural areas which would scare ex-cultists.

Mr. Muthiga recalled that in 1968 he tabled a motion calling on the Government to establish a National Builders Brigade which would absorb school leavers in national undertakings like irrigation work and give them a living and some form of training.

The Vice-President and Minister for Home Affairs, Mr. Muti, had recently said there were 25 women in the Police Force and that other 21 were being recruited. Mr. Muthiga suggested the women's constabulary should be enlarged to absorb all young women who passed through the National Youth Service.

The Member for Mvaya, Mr. Muti, said that his area, Marsabit, covered 42,000 square miles. Communications were bad and when after the election, he and some administration officials returned to the area to find the people of the area had no roads, many places which had no roads at all.

He said the Minister for Communications should look into the problem of roads in Marsabit. There were many small towns in the area which had absolutely no communication of any kind. The place is just jungle, he said.

The Minister for Power and Communications, Mr. Ngala, said that new Members should appreciate what had been done in the past by the Government. There was a trend in the debate to ignore the Government's work.

It was wrong, for example, to state that the Government had done nothing for places other than Nairobi. This was distorted and incorrect. Mr. Ngala listed developments in Nakuru, Thika and elsewhere including the Coast and suggested those who decried this work of playing to the gallery.

Mr. Ngala said M.P.s should find more profitable ways of spending their time than complaining for their pocket book. He said that the Government had succeeded in setting 30,000 people on settlement schemes and had opened many hospitals in areas including Marsabit.

Mr. Oluoch Okunang, Boma North, asked the Government to remember it was a tool of the National Assembly and it should not harass the Assembly by attempting to pass through some ministers' Bills. Ministers and their assistants should remember the Assembly was supreme and they should not make policy decisions without the agreement of the House.

He criticised the taxation structure in Kenya and said that it adversely affected the people with low incomes. It made for a capitalist society. Education was too foreign and academic for Kenya's needs and should be transformed.

Dr. J. N. M. Mwangi, Kisumu, claimed that the system of local Government was the same as that in Britain and operated by British 'so-called advisers' in Kenya. This was why it had failed. Some people — including a Minister — did not know the definition of municipality and how it differed from an area council.

Mr. G. J. Morara, West Mombasa, said that President Kenyatta was being misguided and misled by some individuals who wanted a big piece of the cake. Mr. Kenyatta had said that the need for living in peace was a fundamental need — but today in Kisumu there were people being killed in fights.

Plans were centralised in Nairobi to the exclusion of people from other areas, including Kisumu, and Kenyanisation was not working as it should. People had enlisted with the Kenyanisation Bureau but went for more than a year without hearing from it.

The new maize-wheat mixture had given people constipation or diarrhoea. He was disappointed in the Minister responsible. Free education was still not available despite the 1963 Kari Manifesto and all the time in Kenya the fish were getting richer and the poor poorer — which was history's basis for revolution.

Mr. I. O. Owala, Homa Bay, said that if charity began at home then more emphasis should be placed on giving rural Kenyans better roads instead of building international highways. People in his area were forced to go back to the land which they did, but could not sell their maize because they could not transport it.

Mr. A. Kibukibuk, Marsabit South, said there was a grave lack of water for his people — just as there had been in colonial days. Priority should be given to his people in this matter and also in the provision of hospitals.

Immediately, Mr. J. D. Akumu (Nyahak) rose and tried to do a matter concerning the death of Dr. James Angawa in Nairobi on Sunday. Mr. Muti said the rule had been just given applied in that case too.

Mr. Muti then went on to ask all Members when they started to speak to call out their names and constituencies for the benefit of Hansard reporters. This might have to be done for some months until all new Members were known.

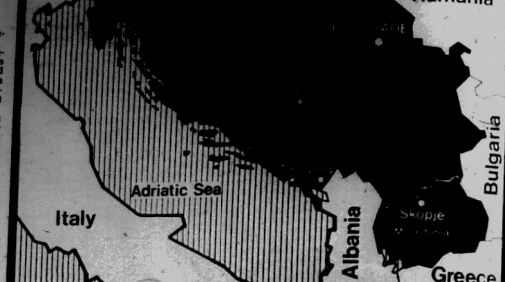

P.L.O. FALLS ON HARD TIMES

The Palestine Liberation Organisation (P.L.O.), which has all the semblance of a Palestinian Government in exile, is surviving on a shoestring budget because several Arab countries are withholding the aid they promised.

"We are facing financial difficulties because some Arab Governments are refusing to pay their dues," a P.L.O. spokesman said in an interview in Amman.

He declined to say which Governments did not want to pay. At the recent fifth Arab summit conference in Rabat, the P.L.O. delegation asked for £200,000 for the Palestine National Fund.

"The summit gave us not a penny, but asked that we approach individual Arab countries for funds," the spokesman said. The delegation to Rabat was headed by Mr. Yasser Arafat, chairman of the P.L.O.'s Executive Committee and spokesman of the National Liberation Movement (Al Fatah).

Mr. Arafat's tour of Arab capitals will be replaced in time by somebody a little more akin to the merry Jinn, Mr. Hodric told me with a resigned look.

Based in Amman, the P.L.O. has established a 115-member Palestine National Assembly (Parliament) which meets in Cairo, an 11-man Executive Committee (Cabinet) and a Palestine National Fund (Treasury). Last year the P.L.O. also set up the "Palestine Armed Struggle Command" to coordinate relations among the commando groups.

In creating the P.L.O., whose members receive salaries, the second Arab summit said Arab countries should pay to keep it going.

For the past two years, the P.L.O. spokesman said, Kuwait, Egypt, Algeria, Jordan, Lebanon and Saudi Arabia kept a total of £2,605,500 to the P.L.O. and £1,210,200 towards its Palestine Liberation Army.

Iraq, Syria and Libya (then a kingdom) also contributed a total of £855,800 in the first year. Iraq paid only £80,000 instead of £115,000 in the second year, and Libya paid £845,000 in 1968.

Sudan, Tunisia and Morocco never contributed. Jordan, except when paying regularly, the spokesman said, Libya resumed its contributions after the downfall of the monarchy there last September. Egypt was helping on other ways.

The Member with a mission

Mrs. J. T. Gecaga, who took her seat in Kenya's National Assembly last Friday, is no stranger to public life: She was a Member of the Legislative Council.

She was born and brought up in Kambe and attended Church in Scotland schools in Kiluyu. In 1952 she taught at the then Jean School, Kabete, now the K.I.A. Her students were women and the subjects taught were community development, nutrition and domestic science.

In 1953 she flew to England to take a diploma course in domestic science. She returned in 1956 and took the post of probation inspector attached to the Law Courts.

In 1958 she was nominated by the Colonial Government as a Member of the Legislative Council.

She became the first African woman to enter Parliament. If this came as a surprise to Mrs. Gecaga, it did not to many people who knew of her ability to get things done. Her special field was getting women to participate in activities at all national levels.

This period was an especially difficult time for Kenya; the Emergency was in force and Mr. Kenyatta still under restriction.

During the time she was in Legislative Council (1958-1960) she called on the Government to provide education for all. At that time it was a lucky child who went beyond K.A.P.E. schools being fees and underfunded. She felt that a secretarial school should be voted money by the Government to enable African girls to take up this exclusively "foreign" occupation.

Funds were eventually provided for some girls to study in Britain.

all were either Asian or European. Since Mrs. Gecaga left Legislative Council in 1960, she has been involved in many voluntary activities, her goal being mainly to awaken women to the vital issues which were hardly understood in 1958.

Mrs. Gecaga emphasized that for progress to be achieved in any field, both the women and the men need to work together. Women need to be trained to take up responsibilities, mainly voluntary work, either part-time or full-time.

She joined the Y.W.C.A. in 1958, believing that for Africans to be independent all fields of life had to be revolutionized. The Y.W.C.A. was then purely a European organization and Mrs. Gecaga was the first African to join.

She rose rapidly to the executive branch and was elected national president, the first African woman to occupy the post. She relinquished it two years ago.

One of the first things she did was to open the hostels for all races and built a new one for the lower income groups.

In 1968 Y.W.C.A. started a secretarial course which now takes 40 girls every year.

Mrs. Gecaga undertakes many social activities and much voluntary work. She is on the University College Council, the Board of Governors of Kenya High School and Nairobi Hospital.

Mrs. Gecaga is concerned about the displacement of traditional life, especially the effect on women. Industrialisation is causing a rapid change in the way of life of many families, most of whom have had to move to urban areas.

Usually the mothers were not employed and found themselves without responsibilities, the opposite of traditional ways of life. Women should take up occupations; children were not a hindrance to a career.

Problems always faced young girls who were unable to go to secondary school. One of the ways such problems could be overcome was by setting up a training centre, such as the one set up at Limuru last year. She would look into ways of helping such youngsters.

Women were behind in most fields and Mrs. Gecaga wanted educated women to look upon it as a duty to help the rest. There was no critical class problem although this could arise if the balance was not maintained. There was room for everyone to grow rich and the few people who were now conspicuous in their wealth were pioneers. Such persons could serve as an example to others.

Mrs. Gecaga said she would protect and promote the interests of women. Women would never get anywhere really if they did not sit with men on the boards of major concerns where important decisions were made.

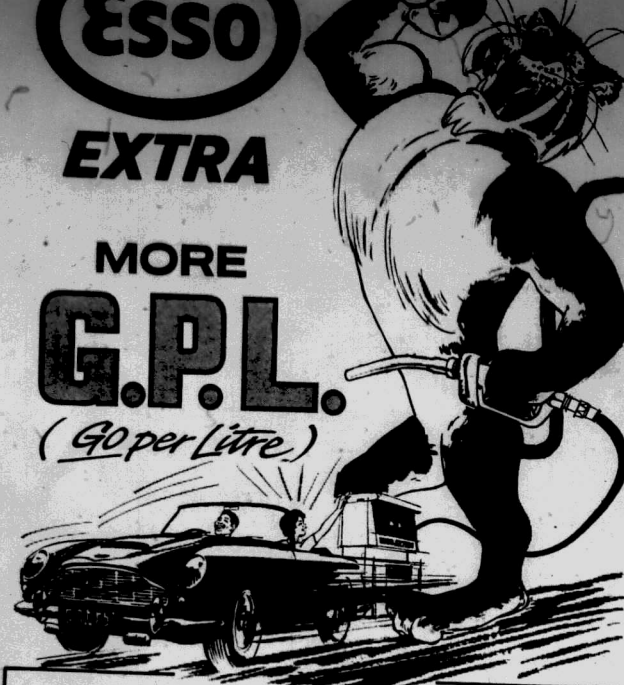

Instead, Miss Makeba's husband, the Black militant, Mr. Stokely Carmichael, went alone to Ibadan, 90 miles north east of Lagos, where two television appearances had been scheduled for the world-famous folk-singer.

Four Africans at World Youth Forum

Four African students are among 29 youths from all parts of the world who are taking part in the 24th annual World Youth Forum in America.

They are Gizachew Wobshet of Ethiopia, Augustine Adana of Ghana, Matthew Nihumbi of Kenya, and Henry Ejembi of Nigeria.

During their stay in America - which ends in the middle of March - the forum delegates are living with a variety of American families. They attend high schools with their host students, and take part in special projects, seminars and discussions.

To broaden their understanding of the United States and American life, field trips are made to cities such as Washington. In the nation's capital delegates meet Government officials, educators, students and members of the international community.

In Philadelphia the forum delegates are now taking part as the international representatives in the first Student American Assembly on World Hunger.

A highlight of the delegates' stay in New York is the opportunity for them to take part in the WCBS-television discussion programme "Young World," which takes place every Saturday while they are in the country. Different delegates participate each week.

On March 15 the delegates leave for Geneva for a final 12-day programme of visits to Swiss families and meetings at such organizations as the International Red Cross, International Labour Organization, the World Health Organization and the European headquarters of the United Nations.

Miss Makeba denied reports in yesterday's local Press that she walked out of the Government-owned Nigerian Broadcasting Corporation's studios on Monday night leaving producers "bewildered, befuddled and virtually begging."

"It was the latest in a series of misunderstandings with N.B.C.," she said. "It started when my husband and I arrived in Nigeria at our own expense to perform free of charge and found no one from N.B.C. to meet us at the airport."

"After inviting us to the studios last night, we found there were no spectators and we left after waiting some time."

N.B.C.'s television director, Mr. Michael Oluvide, said negotiations with Miss Makeba broke down because she refused to sing accompanied by a Nigerian band.

She said she would rather mime, but any senior producers told her we could not accept miming and the recording session fixed for last night was cancelled," he said.

"That was why no one was on hand to meet her when she arrived - but no shabby treatment was meted out to her," Mr. Oluvide added.

Miss Makeba said she did not want to sing to a Nigerian band because "her music was South African and took much practice to play." She had brought her own music tape to sing to, she said.

"I am very annoyed," she said. "I feel I have been treated very badly and feel unwelcome here."

Britain may lose S.A. arms market for ever

South Africa's Defence Minister, Mr. Piet W. Botha, warned yesterday that the British Labour Government's embargo on the sale of British arms to the republic could mean soon that the South African arms market could be lost to Britain for good.

In an exclusive interview with the editor of the *Yorkshire Post*, Mr. Botha is reported as saying, "The market could be lost permanently to Britain when we saw how things were going, we had to think of new moves so that we could plan towards self-sufficiency in arms."

"Even a change of Government in Britain and a consequent change of policy towards South Africa would not necessarily mean the reopening of the market."

In the future, we would prefer our own government agencies to provide all the arms we need in South Africa. If they could not further money to be made from arms in South Africa, they should like to have a share of the British arms manufacturing industry field of licensing agreements."

Speaking about arms deals with France, Mr. Botha said, "The sale of knowledge and simple basis that we buy from France because we are interested in self-sufficiency. It is not because we have heard opinions expressed in Cape Town where Parliament has been sitting for a week or so, that the South African Government will self-sufficiency in arms. 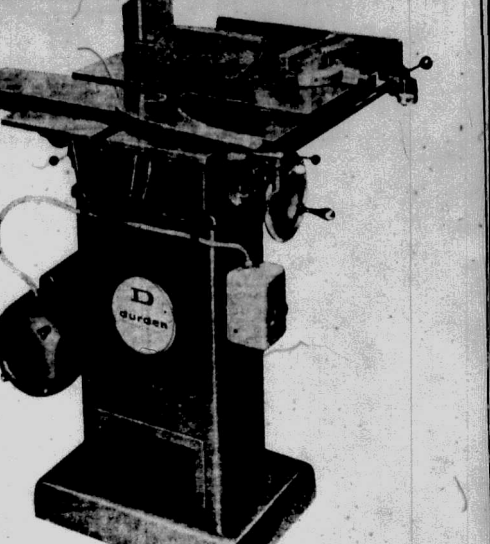

Two in court on murder charge

Two brothers charged with the murder of Mrs. Marietta McKay, the wife of a newspaper executive, were ordered to be held in custody for a week in a brief court appearance yesterday.

The two men of Trinidad-Indian origin, Arthur Hosen, 21, and Niramoleen Hosen, 21, were charged with the killing on Tuesday night 44 days after Anura-ji Hosen, Mrs. McKay's husband, was found dead.

Police said Mrs. McKay's husband had not yet been found, although more than 200 police and firemen have been digging at the Hosen brothers' farm for three days.

A Black Maria brought the brothers to the court from the police station only 100 yards away, about 20 who tried to surge into the courtroom behind the Black Maria.

Another charge against the Hosen was that they demanded \$100,000 with interest from Alexander (Albie) McKay, husband of the missing woman and deputy chairman of the News of the World newspaper.

The two brothers were indicted by a grand jury on charges of first-degree murder and conspiracy to commit murder. They were held in the county jail.

The laboratory to be built at the National Communicable Disease Centre in Atlanta, is identical to the special centre used for handling the first Moon rocks after they were brought to earth in 1969.

The virus was discovered by a team of scientists from Yale University and is called Lassa Fever after the village in Nigeria where the disease claimed its first victims early last year.

Two American missionary nurses working in the village in Northern Nigeria died within a fortnight of each other from the disease. A third American nurse who cared for her two companions suffered the same complaint a week later and the first patient died in a laboratory built at a civil institution.

Vietcong command storm U.S. post

North Vietnamese or Vietcong sappers stormed a position held by U.S. and Saigon troops early yesterday punching a hole through the defence perimeter and killing three Americans, a U.S. military spokesman said in Saigon.

Twelve soldiers, eight of whom were U.S. Marines, were killed in the two-hour attack after the initial onslaught.

The sappers - crack commando squads - pumped about 40 bazooka shells into the camp before launching their assault.

The defenders' U.S. paratroopers of the 104th Division and South Vietnamese soldiers, called in by helicopter, the sappers were on the scene rapidly dropping flares which blazed the bloody path for an assault, yellow flag.

Several sappers succeeded in penetrating the barbed wire defence perimeter before being driven off. Ten Americans were wounded in the clash. A South Vietnamese spokesman described Government losses and material damage as "light".

The U.S. command also reported sporadic fighting between American and enemy units in the Saigon region between the capital and the Cambodian frontier. Losses on both sides were "light".

Vietcong gunners shelled six U.S. or South Vietnamese positions near Saigon.

promised loans

A total of £16,350 was loaned to traders in Kisumu and Siaya Districts plus Kisumu municipality last year and this year £6,000 has been set aside for Siaya District alone, the Deputy Provincial Commissioner for Nyanza, Mr. Jairo Alibava, said.

Speaking at a bazaar at Kambaro School, South Coast, Mr. Alibava said that the Government had promised to give £100,000 to every peasant of Kenya who had lost his land through the soil and erosion which had taken place in the past few years. He explained the methods they should observe when applying for loans to improve their farms and business. He urged them to come forward and improve their business and farms. The Government had opened the door for people who wanted to progress. What was required from business men to enable them to obtain loans was that they should ensure that before applying for loans their accounts books were properly kept.

Mr. Alibava said that the Government had adopted a bad habit of spreading rumours. They were giving the province a bad habit and should stop immediately. The people of Siaya District in Kisumu District have been strongly warned by the District Officer for Wundanyi, Mr. H. A. Waburuti, not to take the law into their own hands.

Mr. Waburuti issued the warning at a large bazaar in the village. Recently, he said, some unknown people had stoned policemen who were on official patrol.

He told them to be law-abiding and explained that the police patrol was there to protect innocent citizens from law-breakers. Nyandala village was known for harbouring destructive elements in the division and the Government intended to protect loyal citizens from them.

He appealed to the people to give information to the police when they saw law-breakers and to co-operate with Government officers on official duty.

Students must work hard to attain high standards of education, which would qualify them to become technical experts, the acting D.C. for Kisumu, Mr. Kinyua, said when he issued 40 bags of cement and 40 sheets of corrugated iron to the Kisumu Middle Secondary School. The school is building a four-room classroom for next year.

The D.C. said students at Kambaro school should participate in the building work in their free time. Mr. E. Odenyo, deputy for the Acting Mayor of Kisumu, appealed to the Government to take over the school next year to enable children who could not afford the fees to go to school. The school is presently run by the Kisumu Mission community. The vice-chairman of the school's board of governors, Mr. T. Odenyo, said that the school was run on a commercial basis. The board had a task to finance its services, and it was studying the possibility of lowering the fees.

The Lions Club of Thika has presented 25 cases of tinned peas to the Primary School in the village of Thika. Here the vice-president of the club, Mr. G. M. Shah, presents one of the cases to the Superintendent of the school, Major Kotera, while club members and pupils look on. A further 25 cases were given to Joy Town — the school for cripples at Thika. The cases were given to the club from one of its members, Mr. Lallo Ka Shuk.

Twelve new land adjudication sections will be declared in Kakamega District this month, according to a letter sent by the Land Adjudication Officer, Mr. S. Okito, to the district officers for Central and White Divisions.

The new sections to be declared open are Marhanda, Mbitvay and Shoka, in the White Division; Epiot and Senende in Iririki; Bugenda and Kibwa in Usuta and in South Marhanda.

Mr. Okito appealed to the people to include women members on the committees. Kakamega County Council is determined to protect traders in established markets for trading centres and the issuing of temporary or provisional trade licences is to be severely curtailed.
