## Germany's Mad Gamble

The British Minister of Information, Mr. Duff Cooper, in a broadcast on Saturday night, said that Germany, like a mad gambler at roulette, had gambled heavily for vast resources and staked them all on the red in a determined effort to win or lose it all.

Speaking of the present battle he said: "We may win or lose that battle. We may lose it. But if we lose it we will not have lost the war. If Germany loses it she will have lost the war as well."

Germany, he said, knew that if she lost this battle she had lost the war. That was why she had thrown her last resources into the battle. She had accumulated forces she had built up many years before success.

## Germany's Mad Gamble

Mr. Duff Cooper said a racing figure of his had summed up the situation as follows: "The odds against her would usually be 100 to 1. Mr. Duff Cooper recalled that after the battle of the Marne in 1914 the German Commander in Chief said: "We have lost the war." He was quite right but the Germans were a stubborn people and it took three years to convince them what was wrong with their position.

Mr. Duff Cooper said the story of the last war which began with tremendous mass such as this and continued until the enemy was broken and exhausted.

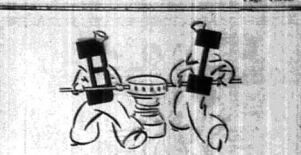

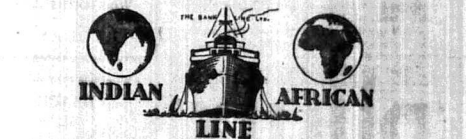

Patrol units... Messages received earlier stated that the Allies are facing the German advance in the heart of France with a full realization of what depends on the outcome. At all times in such circumstances, the people of Britain and France are observing developments of a kind which brought them through far worse days than those in the last war.

The seriousness of the situation is reflected in the order issued by the commander-in-chief, Generalissimo, which reads: 'The fate of our country and of the Allies rests on the heroism of the wild demands on the battle line in progress in Britain, Belgium, and Poland and the foreign frontiers are facing in our case and the Royal Air Force is taking the full part.'

Any soldier who cannot advance should allow himself to be killed rather than abandon that part of the national soil entrusted to him. At all times the order today is 'Conquer or Die. We must conquer.'

**Calm Determination**  
Since the Germans invaded the lowlands it has been emphasized in Britain that in a serious situation must be expected that there will be no retreat.

It is emphasized that while the present position is undeniably serious, the saving spirit of the Allies is unchanged and everywhere there is a calm, quiet determination to fight the struggle however grim it may be.

The Allies are now facing a new situation similar to that in the first weeks of the last war. Both sides are over and today a battle is going on, the result of which will decide the destinies of the Allies and the world.

It is well to keep in mind these points: (1) The Germans are using an entirely new method of attack and throwing all their available resources into a do-or-die-attempt to secure a quick victory.

(2) It is clear that with the vast superiority in numbers of aircraft possessed by Germany the first shock of this fierce and desperate attack is the most effective. There as in the last war, Germany has had the advantage of surprise and has been aided, too, by her ruthless disregard of the rights of her small and weak neighbours.

On the credit side for the Allies we may well ask that: Will the Germans be able to keep the terrific pace they have set themselves? So far they are still enjoying the advantage of their initial blow which has been achieved by throwing into the battle large numbers of aircraft and mechanized armored divisions. It is known that Germany's supplies of petrol on which the most depend for such attacks are strictly limited and there is already reason to believe that it is beginning to run short.

French war office spokesmen last night estimated that their division units between 20,000 and 40,000 gallons of petrol a day. The longer our forces are able to resist, the greater the certainty that German tanks and armored columns will themselves be at a disadvantage.

The battle took on the aspect of a veritable mad race. Further to the east the enemy advanced in the region of Sedan and continued to move forwardly. Our collaboration with the Royal Air Force and aviation continues its energetic offensive action against land troops, railways and road junctions. Many enemy stores were brought down.'

A communication issued by the British War Office on Friday night said that during the night of May 16/17 certain reinforcements to the front line having become necessary the British Expeditionary Force had withdrawn to positions west of Brussels. This withdrawal was carried out without any interference.

**Islands Evacuated**  
A further development in the situation in the north that the Admiral commanding the French forces in the Dutch province of Zeeland had decided to evacuate the two islands of Walcheren and Beveland. Both these islands are famous for their beauty of architecture and both have suffered very badly as a result of bombardments by the German Air Force and artillery. Further Pressure

France in this hour of danger has taken the advice of the late Marshal Foch and sent for General Weygand who becomes Supreme Commander in Chief of the Allied Forces in place of General Gortin.

(7) The Canadian Air Force is to be increased to 400,000 men.

From . . . **Mr. His Excellency's Tour VISITS IN THE TOWNSHIP**

As briefly reported last week, Sir Henry and Lady Moore paid a series of visits at Nakuru in the course of a six-days tour of the district. A further account of some of the functions in Nakuru township is given below.

His Excellency the Governor and Lady Moore, accompanied by the A.D.C., Capt. Oliver, the Provincial Commissioner, Mr. S. O. V. Hodges and the District Commissioner, Mr. Hamilton Ross, spent two hours at Nakuru last week.

Sir Henry expressed keen interest in the work which was proceeding, and expressed the opinion that these industries are today one of the greatest assets of the country, and hoped that they would be made full use of by the authorities.

**Indian Function.**

On Tuesday last week, H. E. the Governor and Lady Moore were entertained by the Indian Community at the Nakuru Hotel, where a large and representative gathering, after being presented, took tea.

Dr. Shah opened his address by extending a hearty welcome to His Excellency and Lady Moore, and stated that there were only two local problems of importance which he wished to bring to the attention of His Excellency. The first was the question of Indian registration and His Excellency's second was the urgent necessity for a Government Indian School building in Nakuru, as the present one is very small, and that the number of pupils were rapidly increasing.

As regards the Hospital, Dr. Shah said he was relieved to learn that a certain grant had been made, and he hoped that the authorities would be able to complete the building in order that they might have the best possible maximum use of the facility.

He mentioned these problems knowing that His Community fully appreciated the Government's at present engaged in more urgent affairs and that they had only a few minutes in mind and that was the winning of the war.

The speaker assured His Excellency of the traditional loyalty of his people and of their willingness to contribute their utmost to the war effort.

The Governor, after acknowledging the welcome, said he was very pleased to have the opportunity of meeting the members of the Indian Community in Nakuru. Referring to the question of hospital accommodation he stated that plans were being made for an Asian wing at the Government Nyeri Hospital.

With regard to increased school accommodation, he knew that the Director of Education had this problem under review, and he advised the Indian Community to get in touch with Mr. Colvile.

His Excellency concluded by thanking his hosts on behalf of Lady Moore and himself for a very pleasant and enjoyable party.

Proceeding to the Native Brewery and Canteen, His Excellency was met by the Town Clerk, Mr. T. R. Spence, and the Works Superintendent, Mr. A. A. Crates, and was conducted round the Municipal Mill Shop, the Canteen and Brewery.

**Brig.-Gen. G.N. Colville**

The death of Brigadier-General George Northcote Colville, D.S.O., of the Kenya General Hospital at Nakuru, yesterday morning, at the age of 72.

Born on July 9, 1872, son of the late Lt. General Sir Robert Colville, K.C.B., he entered the Army in 1897 and was a captain in 1899. He served through the South African campaign 1899-1900 and was awarded the Queen's Medal with three clasps and was several times mentioned in despatches. He also received the D.S.O. in 1900.

He retired in 1907, being then with the Oxford and Light Infantry but returned in 1914, being transferred to the 7th Sherwood Foresters, rejoining the Oxford and Light Infantry in the following year. In 1915, he was Colonel commanding the 7th Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry and was gazetted Brigadier-General in August, 1918. He was five times mentioned in despatches.

The late General Colville came to Kenya about 1923 and settled at Nakuru, where he was a well-known and extremely popular figure and owner of farming property. While he preferred to live quietly and took little part in public affairs, he was however interested in the district and his social nature and sense of human understanding led to a wide circle of friends. His great hobby was safari and big game shooting and he was never happier than when out hunting, to which he gave a great deal of his time. He was, as a result, being partly East African and partly Belgian Game intimately.

He was married to Miss Elizabeth Harriet, daughter of Sir W. A. Ferguson-Davis, the third Baronet, who he survived.

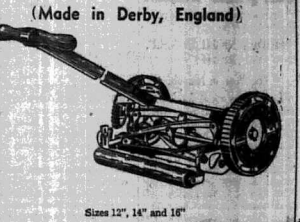

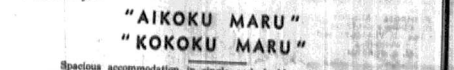

INCREASINGLY GRAVE SITUATION AT FRONT

Premier Tells Of Gap In The Allied Armies

Commons Sensation MEMBER ABSENT SERIOUS IMPLICATIONS

The full gravity of the situation of the Allied forces was revealed by the Prime Minister, Mr. Churchill in the House of Commons this afternoon.

IN A BRIEF STATEMENT HE SAID THAT THE GERMAN ARMED FORCES HAD MADE THEIR WAY THROUGH A GAP IN THE FRENCH ARMY, HAD PENETRATED INTO THE HEART OF THE ALLIED ARMIES IN BELGIUM AND WERE NOW ATTEMPTING TO DERANGE COMMUNICATIONS.

Abbeville was now in enemy hands and heavy fighting was proceeding at that neighbourhood. It was too early to say what the result would be but the implications were of a serious character.

General Weygand was conducting operations involving all the Allied armies with a view to restoring and reconstituting their combined front.

The Government and people of Northern Rhodesia have offered to make a contribution to the United Kingdom of £200,000.

The Colonial Office has accepted this most generous offer as an expression of the desire of the people of Northern Rhodesia to take their part in the common effort.

Already there is little doubt that the new Bill, giving the British Government complete power of control over persons and property, unequivocally unprecedented as it is, will be readily accepted, and approved by the public.

Today's newspapers of all shades of opinion are unanimous regarding it as a sweeping, but necessary measure, and the general opinion is summed up by the Manchester Guardian when it says: "We must surrender our liberties to the Government of our choice in order that we may retain them."

There is little doubt, too, that the Hitler will redoubt them. The temporary surrender is made with a full and candid spirit for it makes every man and woman a member of the national force.

The Daily Telegraph says the Daily Telegraph is Britain's characteristic reply to Hitler's lightning bid for industry and its meaning will not be just an every neutral, unfriendly as well as friendly. Now that the call to forthright action has been made the nation will respond, not only with cheerfulness, but with enthusiasm.

The Daily Herald declares "Now all are one. The new Act is not in itself enough in win victory, but it shows the nation's self energy in our leaders without which we cannot hope to victory."

The New York Times says that a free Parliament, fully aware of the seriousness of the moment, has authorized conscription of labour and conscription of industry.

Thus, of an iron Britain, the British people have surrendered their hard-won liberties for the sake of preserving them.

In the House of Commons this afternoon the Speaker announced that Captain Rankin, M.P., has been detained and taken into custody this morning.

The Speaker said he had received a letter from the Home Secretary ordering this step to be taken under the Defence Regulations, 1939.

Mr. Rankin, who is Conservative M.P. for Penryn, is at present in Brighton Prison.

Mr. Rankin's arrest has been a sensation since 1911. He was arrested at Eton and Sandhurst and joined the 2nd Battalion Coldstream Guards in 1917.

He was in France in August, 1914, and was severely wounded in the First World War in Paris in April the following year. He lives at Kelly Castle, Arbroath, Angus.

Britain and Russia: Trade Talks

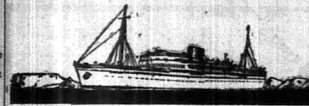

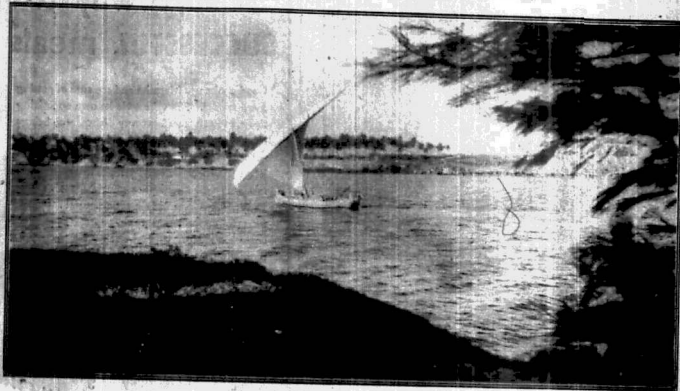

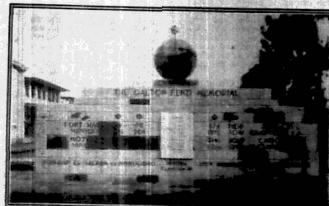

The Germans have committed many crimes in this way but the attack on Scapa Flow was not one of them. No more legitimate object of air attack than the British Fleet could possibly exist and if, as was the case on one occasion, a civilian life was lost, we can safely say the German airmen of any reprehensible intentions.

The Germans appear to be following a similar policy in Norway, not only in the consideration for the civilian population, but also in the making reprisals against the air force of the port of Narvik and also in the legitimate military objectives of Denmark.

# Reasons For New Measures In Kenya

## REASSURING BROADCAST BY HIS EXCELLENCY

In a broadcast to the Colony on Saturday, His Excellency Sir Henry Muro briefly explained the reasons for the calling up of more members of the Kenya Defence Force and for the new Government measures in the interests of internal security.

He emphasised that local preparations against any possible emergency should give rise to confidence rather than disquiet, and urged the public the importance of discontinuance of rumour.

His Excellency closed with a reference to the valuable co-operation obtaining between civil and military authorities, and that they will soon have the position clarified in Kenya in their contribution to the war effort.

Following is the text of the broadcast to the Colony on Saturday:

During the last week we have all of us been living through moments of anxiety. At times the War Cabinet has been reconstituted and an all-British Government formed on a national basis. On the Western Front the German and Russian forces have been subjected to the heaviest blows since the outbreak of the war. We have followed one another with such confidence and vigour that our position is more than usually well assured. We know from the reports of the past the weight of the men and materiel which the German always put into their initial battle. We know too that despite such initial setbacks their armies were only held after a long and arduous struggle had to be achieved.

But the same seems to be happening here, but with this difference that the French or British or American forces are not engaged in a battle. The defence of the Kenya Colony is a matter of internal security. The Kenya Army is a sturdy and well-trained force.
