NAZIS PLAY CAT AND MOUSE Armistice Terms Still Not Known

The Germans are still keeping the French people in suspense regarding the terms the Nazi leaders have decided to impose for the cessation of fighting.

People in many parts of the French Empire are urging Marshal Pétain to continue the struggle, but the indications are that the government will abide by its decision announced earlier in the week.

France has asked Italy on what terms hostilities between France and Italy can be ended.

The latest news of France's armistice negotiations is a vague and unconvincing one. It was in the afternoon of the 21st that the Associated Press reports that Germany was to give the reply to France at Compiegne this morning.

The Associated Press says that the meeting of the French Council of Ministers which took place at Vichy on the 21st was a success. It is reported that the French plenipotentiaries were Admiral Auloy.

It was announced in Bordeaux last evening that they met the German representatives in the Bois de Compiègne but nothing more is known.

The latest report from Berlin says that the terms would probably be presented to the French at Compiegne.

Revolts in Abyssinia

A Djibouti message says that revolts are beginning in every province of Abyssinia.

Reports in Northern France say the Armistice was signed by Germany.

Radio Rome announced last evening that the French Government had sent the Italians to state what terms hostilities between the two countries should be terminated. The Italian Government has replied that Italy has given the same reply to Germany, namely that France should appoint plenipotentiaries with powers to hand armistice terms.

Members of the French Parliament who met in Bordeaux last evening are reported to have urged their desire to stand against the Armistice and to support a declaration by M. Laval that he could not leave France by sea.

After the meeting, the Parliament delegation, headed by M. Laval, is expected to leave for Vichy.

The Committee of French Members of the Parliament in London has issued a statement in which it has expressed its regret that the Armistice has been signed and its hope that the French Government will continue to fight.

PRACTICAL SERVICE
 A Job for the Public

On Monday a correspondent who signed his letter "Wandering Scot" did a valuable service through these columns to the defence and security of East Africa. When he saw displays of military uniforms and badges in Nairobi shops his curiosity prompted him to discover whether there was any control over the sale. He hoped, quite rightly, that if there was no control the members of the Fifth Column, if there are any such amongst us, would have as little difficulty as he would have had in fitting themselves out in any uniform worn in the Territories, complete with every detail of military identification. "Wandering Scot" wrote to the East African Standard, making his enquiries and gave the intelligent benefit of his surmises. That was a public duty.

The point to be noted is that the military authorities, unaware of the absence of control over such articles and clothing, took immediate steps and as soon as the letter appeared the necessary powers were applied to rectify a position which, in certain circumstances, might easily have proved dangerous to the security of the State. The Defence Regulations were invoked and what had been clear breach of the law was stopped. It is obvious, of course, that the military authorities though well aware that powers exist to control such details are not necessarily aware that these powers are functioning in the hundreds of matters of varying degrees of importance which arise when a country is living under a military administration. In such circumstances they were grateful for the information given by our correspondent.

Help of that kind will be gladly welcomed. The Kenya Information Office, Nairobi, and the East African Standard in the public interest, are happy at all times to receive information or suggestions bearing on public security and to pass that information on to the appropriate authorities for such action as they may deem necessary. It is a small service which the individual can render to his country. Sometimes, in this particular case, it is of real value and importance and has escaped notice mainly because nobody has thought about it. It is proper bearing while those in authority, unable to know everything, have not had it brought to their attention.

Perhaps, indeed without doubt, there are hundreds of points, large and small, which strike the public eye, curious, doubtful and even dangerous. A little applied intelligence will set out the importance of the potentially harmful. Neither the Information Office nor the East African Standard have any desire to cover themselves in fob or verbal reports which have no effect. The fact can be all easily explained. Importance Of Malaya

India, import it in vast quantities and perhaps even to Germany. But the present definition of British neutrality is not so broad as the subsequent negotiations between Lord Halifax and Hitler. The British Government is not bound to supply the raw materials which are essential to the German war effort.

Through Singapore, the first month shipments of tin from Malaya to the Allied war effort. Experts are convinced to supply raw materials for the heavy energy destinations, and prevent the tin from being used for certain foreign currencies to increase the Allied resources of foreign exchange.

A large and complicated organization exists to ensure the smooth flow of the economic weapons which can be operated from Singapore. One of the most important war time departments is foreign exchange control. For Malaya normally has a large, favourable trade balance with the world, particularly with the United States. To conserve the foreign exchange, the tin from rubber estates, may export transaction with a country outside the United States is allowed. The authorities have approved the arrangements made for the export of tin to the goods.

Last week the British United Press correspondent, Malaya, states that rubber exports from Malaya to the United States are valued at least \$100,000,000. Under present conditions it is likely that Malaya makes available to Great Britain at least 10,000,000 dollars (100 million) in United States currency to pay for war materials bought in America on the "cash and carry" principle.

No country in the Empire is so important a supplier of raw materials for the Allies as Malaya. By the exchange of tin for rubber, the American from Malaya have their country's tin for rubber, the Empire's treasure house. Linked with exchange control, from non-ferrous countries are restricted to prevent foreign exchange from being used on goods that can as well be obtained from within the Empire.

Japanese and United States reports have been hit by those war countries, especially with Australia.

Withholding the Straits. Export control has a wider significance. It aims at seeing that Great Britain and France get all the rubber, tin, palm oil, copra, and other colonial raw materials they require, and at the same time receive a useful use on supplies of these vital commodities.

So while a Malaya trade that can reason for the cost of tin in Germany is to provide material for manufacturing synthetic rubber, it is overgrown. He knows that the Allied countries are interested in the supply of plantation rubber from the British. He also knows that synthetic rubber is not nearly so useful for ordinary purposes as natural rubber, and that it is almost impossible for Germany to make enough "synthetic" material for her war requirements. The Singapore export control is to 100 per cent of tin as a blockade weapon because of the tin's value in the United States and the Dutch East.

The War Department has issued a statement today that the Ministry of Shipping in London is in the process of adopting a new measure of shipping in the constant endeavor to improve protective and life-saving measures at sea. To assist the expansion of the tin trade with Britain, Mr. E. Shaw is making a tour of Malaya and neighboring countries on behalf of the British Cotton Board.

The Malaya Government has arranged with the Ministry of Road in London to buy from Great Britain only such foodstuffs as are absolutely essential. Malaya is turning more and more to Australia for food imports, but certain goods must still come from Britain. The tin being supplied on a rationing basis, so that Malaya will not get more than her fair share of Britain's exportable surplus.

Every type of firearm, including air rifles and air gun pistols, is forbidden, and any such articles in possession of aliens must at once be surrendered to the police. The police are busy rounding up these firearms for safe custody. As soon as the order was signed, thousands of letters were sent to the London houses of all aliens to whom certificates for firearms had been issued and collected the weapons.

RED CROSS WORK IN KENYA

To the Editor, "E.A. Standard".
I have been brought to my notice, and that of the Joint Co-ordinating Committee of the British Red Cross Society and the Order of St. John that the work of these two bodies is not fully understood. In view of the fact that our work is possible only through the generosity of the public, it appears to me to be only right that the public should be more fully informed. I have, therefore, decided to use the correspondence columns of your paper to outline the following points:

(1) The Red Cross is the symbol of help to sick and suffering mankind in time of war as the result of enemy action and, while at former times its activities were limited to the military forces and refugees from invaded areas, the use of air-raids on the civil population as a weapon of war has resulted in an enormous increase. It must be obvious now to the most casual observer that it has not been the policy of the British to prepare for war and, since it has been forced on us and large numbers of men have rapidly come under arms, the necessity for equipping hospitals, field ambulances and first aid squads and posts, not to mention providing (and financing) for each individual soldier, has become both great and urgent. This is why the Red Cross and St. John organisations have of great value to both military and civil authorities. Theatres must be equipped with "surgeon" cots, wireless sets, coats, caps and mackintosh, bandages of every description, while in the wards there is a continuous demand for dressings, bandages, dressings, gloves, slippers and so forth. Some extra cottees—such as hot water bottles, covers, trays, cloths, flannels, jugs, stretchers, pillows, air cushions, comfortable chairs, pull-downs, mirrors, games, playing cards, gramophones records, picture puzzles, fruit, cream, etc.—have to be added to the large number of military emergency hospital wards.

(2) It has been decided by the Joint Committee, that, under present circumstances, we should hold in reserve a minimum stock to the value of not less than £1500 and our monthly expenditure to meet current demands and to build up this reserve will probably exceed £500. During the month of May we need funds to one hospital alone no less than 10,000 swabs and 525 bottles of iodine and at the end of May we had a reserve of approximately 1000 swabs of completed articles in the stores.

There are many willing workers, and in Nairobi alone more than 400 women doing this

work and an even greater number throughout the rest of the Colony. Members of these blessed workers' parties will realize that, until our income is greatly increased, the amount of work for each site must be small.

(3) When it is realized that the amount of work for each site must be small, it is not surprising that V.A.D.s in Nairobi alone, either employed or engaged to give part of their own service and the two organisations have supplied the A.R.P. authorities with over 100 female personnel. This does not take into consideration personnel working in Mombasa and elsewhere.

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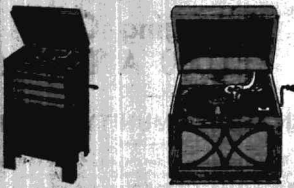
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IMPORT AND EXPORT PROBLEMS
Scheme To Assist Kenya's Trade Flow

One of the matters dealt with at Friday's meeting of the Nairobi Chamber of Commerce, held under the Chairmanship of Mr. A. A. Lavery, the President, was that concerning the National General Export Merchants' Group of the Export Council of Great Britain.

Mr. A. B. Glama, the Secretary, read a letter from the Secretary of the Association of Chambers of Commerce of Eastern Africa dealing with the subject.

It is stated—
"As you are probably aware, the Home Government has appointed an Export Council and one of the sub-sections of the Council is the National General Export Merchants' Group, whose task is to advise the Export Council regarding the requirements of overseas markets and also to advise importers in these markets of the availability of supplies from the United Kingdom."

The organization of the General Export Merchants' Group is being undertaken by the London Chamber of Commerce and East Africa's requirements are being dealt with by sub-group No. 2 which covers Africa (excluding North Africa), Australia and New Zealand.

You will observe that the representative for East Africa is Mr. W. F. Jenkins, Managing Director of Smith, Mackenzie and Co. Ltd., who is the Association's representative on the Joint East African Board. This Association has been asked to act as the co-ordinating agent in East Africa for the purpose of furnishing the National General Export Merchants' Group with information regarding the requirements of East Africa.

Standing Committee Member
In order that the information may be complete, it has been decided to ask constituent Chambers to elect all the information from their members and submit frequent reports to the Association. As the information received both from East African Chambers and the National General Export Merchants' Group will be of considerable value to everyone concerned, it has been decided that copies of all reports received and dispatched by the Association will be furnished to the Supply Board of Kenya, Uganda and Tanganyika. The Supply Board

of Kenya has already expressed its intention to utilize the new channel of information and it is anticipated that the results will create a speeding up of information which is vitally required in order to balance the trade of the country.

In the meantime, the Association has been furnished by Mr. Jenkins with a list of goods under three headings as follows: (1) goods in short supply and not likely to be available to export; (2) likely to be available to a limited extent; (3) obtainable for export and probably in free supply.

Positive Constantly Changing
It must be clearly understood that the position indicated in the list is constantly changing and that goods are liable at any time to be removed from one category into another. It should be noted, however, that this list was forwarded under cover of a letter dated May 22, so that the information is quite recent.

It is realized that the list is not comprehensive and therefore it is necessary for constituent Chambers to send as soon as possible to the Association further lists of goods upon which information is required regarding availability for export from the United Kingdom.

With regard to those items which are in quite short supply and not obtainable from the United Kingdom, the Association is endeavoring to obtain information regarding alternative sources of supply and any such information will be passed immediately to constituent Chambers.

Full Information Essential
The Chairman pointed out that the matters dealt with in his letter were of considerable importance to the commercial community as a whole and supported the suggestion to appoint a special standing sub-committee to deal with the relevant problems as they arise. It was necessary to keep the matter of reports constantly under review and he suggested that the sub-committee appointed to deal with fluctuations in prices could most efficiently carry out the duties suggested in the letter.

Mr. P. Phillips said that he thought that this sub-committee, suitably reinforced, could deal with the problems involved but he said information regarding the country's requirements should be placed before the committee who would report. It was hoped, he felt, to get all the relevant information from members, but would be most fully informed of the situation so that they could deal with all matters within their purview promptly and effectively.

The sub-committee appointed, including members co-opted, will include Messrs. P. Phillips, A. I. Gladwell, Chumali Kiriparam, G. A. Tyson and A. L. Block.

"No-Treating" Proposal Unopposed

The proposal that a "no-treating" order should be introduced in Kenya did not receive support at Friday's meeting of the Nairobi Chamber of Commerce, the resolution proposed by Mr. A. C. Tamshill not finding any takers.

Mr. Tamshill, who said that this was a matter which the Chamber could properly propose, put forward the motion very seriously and hoped that it would be supported. The resolution was in the effect that it would be suggested, similar to the regulations in existence in the last year, should be reintroduced into Kenya Colony and Protectorate.

He believed that such a "no-treating" regulation was desirable in time of war. He recalled that it was introduced in 1942 and that members of the Chamber were not prepared to accept the right people to propose such a regulation as they were probably themselves among the serious offenders on the subject of treating. He added that he did think, however, that at this time it was quite definitely wrong to include in the regulations that "no-treating" regulation which had been in force for the war period. He indicated the fact that one of the roads—for which one had no particular need—might possibly be "no-treating" for the dish and said he believed that the Chamber, concerned by supporting such a proposal at this time, would be doing a good and useful thing.

RHODESIAN NEWS
Intensification Of War Effort

The intensification of the Colony's military preparations, was described by the Prime Minister (Mr. Hon. G. M. Huggins) at the conclusion of the Parliamentary session in Rhodesia. He said, "We are well in hand. More than 110 instructors who have been undergoing a month's intensive training at Bulawayo and Salisbury will be ready this week to take their part in the new part-time training scheme under the National Service Act, which will be started on July 1. The Volunteers at present doing part-time training at the main centres will be absorbed into the new scheme."

A new infantry training camp is to be established at Umtali, being a traditional Rhodesia and an officers' training camp to be established at Bulawayo. In addition, district training camps for cadets in the rural areas are to be started.

The new part-time units are to undergo intensive training from July 1st when they will train on Wednesday evenings and on Saturdays all day on Sundays and all officers and sergeants will be on duty on Monday afternoon for the road—for which one had no particular need—might possibly be "no-treating" for the dish and said he believed that the Chamber, concerned by supporting such a proposal at this time, would be doing a good and useful thing.

Former M. P. returned
Italy's return to the intervention of large numbers of Italians, who were quickly equipped to give no trouble. Under the new regulations anyone, whether alien or otherwise, can be interned. Further, by arrangement with the United States Government, the Congress of the South African Association for the Advancement of Science, which was held at Salisbury in July as part of the Jubilee Celebrations, has been cancelled. The congress will be held when Rhodesia resumes membership of the British Commonwealth. The meeting of the Rhodesia Scientific Association, however, will still be held at Salisbury in July.

An Armed Camp
In a few weeks' time Southern Rhodesia will be an armed camp. Training camps will be revived with full time service, and on July 1st the Rhodesia Constabulary will begin part-time training on an extensive scale.

The Rhodesian Regiment, all the former members of which are on Active Service, will be revived with two battalions each, at Salisbury and Bulawayo, and a company in each town.

The formation of Defence Units in country districts is also progressing rapidly, and active steps are being taken to deal with possible air raids and parachutists.

The object of these measures is to provide internal security from any threat of external attack, and to assist neighbouring countries in case of need.

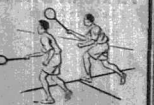

It was stated at Friday's monthly meeting of the Nairobi Chamber of Commerce that the Association of Chambers of Commerce in East Africa is to hold their annual session in Nairobi which will be held on June 12 and 13.

PROTECTION OF CIVIL POPULATION

GERMANS TO OCCUPY A GREAT PART OF FRANCE

FRENCH FLEET TO BE HANDED OVER INTACT

ARMISTICE TERMS

THE GERMAN ARMISTICE TERMS, ACCEPTED BY THE BRETAGN GOVERNMENT, ENTAIL THE DESTRUCTION OF FRANCE AS A MILITARY POWER AND THE CONVERSION OF THE COUNTRY INTO GERMAN TERRITORY OF WAR AGAINST BRITAIN.

One of the provisions which most closely affects Britain is that the French Fleet must be recalled to French ports, disarmed, and interned under the directions of Germany and Italy.

A great part of France will be occupied by the Germans, the French paying the cost of occupation.

There is growing evidence of the repudiation in the French Empire of the Bordeaux Government and of the determination of the French colonies to continue the war against Germany and Italy.

The following summary of the armistice terms, as forwarded by Germany, and substantially approved by Marshal Petain, was seen in London.

(1) Germany will occupy the whole western coast of France, and all the territory north of the line drawn from Geneva to Tours. France will pay for the occupation.

(2) The French armed forces will be disarmed and interned. Only a small force in unoccupied France will be allowed, the size of the force being fixed by Germany. France will pay for the occupation.

(3) Germany may demand the surrender of all arms, munitions, all artillery and tanks, aircraft and military stores, and all other material.

(4) No French forces may leave France, and no military stores may be conveyed to Great Britain.

(5) All establishments and stocks must be handed over intact. The same applies to stocks in the Colonies.

(6) All railways and communication roads, without exception, in unoccupied territory must stop.

(7) The French Government must facilitate the transport of merchandise between Germany and Italy.

(8) German prisoners of war, who will remain in captivity until such a sign is given by Germany as to their return.

The Fleet
(9) The French fleet is to be recalled to French harbours, and disarmed and interned under German and Italian supervision to be specified by the German and Italian governments.

(10) France will be allowed to retain a part of the Fleet which the Germans and Italians will determine as that which it may be left free to assist the French interests in the Colonies.

(11) The armistice will enter into force on the day when the French Government has concluded a similar agreement with the Italian Government, and will remain valid until peace is concluded between Germany and Italy.

(12) German prisoners of war, who will remain in captivity until such a sign is given by Germany as to their return.

Here in the Americas, we have abundant resources and abundant man-power to enable us to take care of ourselves, and are confident of our power to resist and repel any attack."

5 Bombers Shot Down IN RAIDS ON BRITAIN

Personnel Landed And German Prisoners Taken

June 26. Enemy aircraft again around the British coast last night and anti-aircraft defenses were in action in the Channel. The British National Committee on Air reported that three enemy bombers were shot down in the Channel. Bombs were dropped and the enemy planes were seen to fall through the clouds. 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TEACHING WITHOUT TEARS

Story-Telling

WHEN WENDY wanted to amuse the Lost Boys in the Never-Never-Land, she told them stories. Thrilling stories and teaching stories of Heroes and Fairies lands where other children played.

The Lost Boys were children... Have you ever thought of amusing your children in this way? Not only does it entertain them, it educates them. The child who has heard stories from babyhood connects very favourably with the one who has never been told stories at all.

Dates and facts can be ticked later when they are at school. If the child has had a good grounding in stories of history he cannot get wrong. The same thing applies to literature. And what better stories can we tell the child than those handed down to us from the days that we were half in the day that they can tell to their own children. In the evening, after supper, time, after lunch before they go, or even for a little while during their rest.

Let us look at the first of these. In the first place, they stimulate the child's mind. A most necessary thing to know, where many children are so far from civilization that they have but scant knowledge of the outside world. For the child with no questions during the reading of a story, and questions answered led to knowledge. In the second place they educate the child. Stories chosen from history and literature delight the child from six years old upwards.



UNDER this category of stories for children from five to ten years of age come old tales like "The Three Bears" and "The Three Little Pigs". And many others. At this age, however, it is better to make a story if possible and not read it from a book. It is so much easier to hold a child's attention in this way. There is an idea that many small children are easily frightened by stories. It seems a pity to deprive these children of this positive advantage. They can be very easily adapted for the nervous child, and it is so well and avoid telling them at bedtime. The best of stories is so great, three days that one can afford to read and choose the more suitable ones. Also, there are always better Peter's exciting, gaily animals.

Miss Elizabeth Clarke's books, "The Tale that has no ending" are about the most charming stories I have ever read or told to small children. They are straightforward and simple. Most of them are selected from old times. There is nothing in them likely to frighten the most imaginative child. In addition to this they have in them this sense of humor which appeals to the children, and I have had even the older ones ask me to read them again and again.

And a long story such as "Peter Pan" will hold their attention. It is a good idea to take one book at a time. "The Water Babies" is a good story and leading by the reader's authors and leading by the child's own imagination. The six-year old will enjoy the story of "Alice in Wonderland" by Lewis Carroll, while "Alice Through the Looking Glass" is more suited to a child of nine years or older. "The Story of the Three Little Pigs" by Rudyard Kipling are also suited to this age.

Stories of History can be read to them now. At first, and then to the children, chosen, such tales as "Hercules and the War" and "Aeneas and the Circus" are the most interesting. The boy, especially, will appreciate carefully.

choice stories of Arthur and his Knights, and "The Story of Robin Hood." It will stimulate their ideas for games to play and find in them a certain amount of history even at this early age. "The Water Babies" by Charles Kingsley is very popular with the seven-year old, and it is so well and even the advanced size can understand it. "The Water Babies" is a valuable book in many ways. It leads the child to read and read usually unexcited by these old tales. So few little children know anything about the sea. They are lucky if they have seen it. In this book they find plenty of scope to teach them to visualize it to a certain extent. A good deal of the information is needed of course. However it would be far better than most children's books, but with thought and discussion, the child will have gained an unobtainable general acquaintance without having realized it.

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SOMETHING FOR

THE MEAT COURSE

I THINK nearly every woman who does her own housework is at least once in a while tripping to think of a different meat course. Nothing extravagant and cuts like panseok pan or larks' tongues in syrup, but just a change from roast or boiled mutton, roast sirloin or grilled steaks and chops.

Here are a few suggestions for different ways of doing quite well-known cuts of meat one of using other bits that are often forgotten.

Venison

Cuts of venison are similar to those of mutton. The best cuts for roasting are the leg, of mutton, and the saddle. Steaks and chops are slices from the leg and loin, and are served with a rich sauce. Venison is a very healthy meat and is well suited to the diet of the sick. The flesh is sometimes infected with the maddening tick, and a few pieces of celery and carrot may be added in each rack, which is then covered underneath, close to the backbone. Venison, when roasted or

boiled, is usually served rare. To prevent the drying of venison joints, it is covered, to be cooked by means of beef, ham, pork or mutton. The meat should be covered with salted paper over which is laid a thick coating of flour and water (this should be removed 1 hour before cooking is finished to allow the meat to brown).

Here is my method for Sweetbreads. Sweetbreads should be used while very fresh and should be washed in running, hot water and then drained. They are prepared in many ways, but the following is a simple one. Sweetbreads are soaked in milk for 24 hours, then washed in running water and drained. They are then cooked in a sauce of milk and butter.

For Braised Beef, prepare meat by cooking first in hot water, then in a rich vegetable stock. The meat is then braised in a sauce of milk and butter.

Roast Crown of Lamb. Have crown set up, using ten ribs or more. Pack trimmings in centre of crown, cover with weighted paper to keep crown in shape. Wrap ends of chops with greased paper to prevent burning. Place in hot oven, reduce heat and pour down a cup of boiling water. Cook 30 minutes, to a golden brown, when half cooked. Remove from oven, brown, garnish with paper trimmings. Fill centre with tomato, onion, green, peas, and carrots. Serve with brown gravy and current jelly or mint sauce.

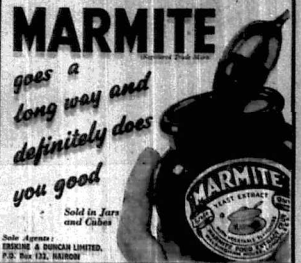

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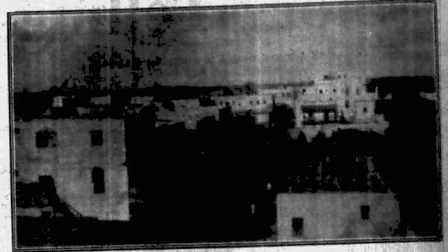

France Greater Leaders

Weynaud and Weygand versus the Maginot Line Complex.

Weynaud, Weygand, Petain, Mandel - these four men have been ruling France till her last dark days. It is strange to think that Weynaud and Weygand were among the few people in France who already, as long ago as 1935, fully realised the importance of armoured divisions and foresaw the use the Germans were going to make of them.

Weynaud, who was then in command, made one of his most memorable speeches in 1935 on the necessity of providing France with an armoured force as the Germans had done. He used many of the arguments advanced in that famous little book, "Les Armes de l'avenir," by General Guderian, published about the same time, in which the importance of armoured divisions and "armoured nations" were severely stressed, not least in the case of the Germans had done so with their intensive re-armament.

Weygand, for his part, wrote in 1935 in the French magazine "L'Esprit" also emphasising the importance of armoured and mechanised units. In 1936 he followed to the same extent, but not so enthusiastically, the "Maginot Line" complex, which was very discredited in France, and particularly in French military quarters, who all clung to the "Maginot Line" as the "armoured nation," a conception which was considered outdated. There is some great humor in the criticisms made at the time against the "Maginot Line" by "armoured" units. It was argued that a "pre-emptive" army with highly mechanised units might be used to

weapon against domestic government in the hands of a would-be Fascist dictator. What if, instead, the development of a highly equipped "armoured" army side by side with the conscript army, not the replacement of it by the other. Then the War Minister treated M. Weynaud's speech as a pretty good example of paranoia. It is curious that Colonel Guderian, who expressed the mechanised theory in a more extreme form in his book, was considered in a dangerous heresy in certain Army quarters as it was the Germans had done so with their intensive re-armament.

As regards Weygand, it is sad to think that when some years ago he reached the apogee of his political influence exercised through the Ministry of War, the key position he then held on the General Staff. He was decorated as a Knight, a Commander and a Grand Officer of the Legion of Honour. Later the Left Wing press freely accused him of being a "General" and of being in sympathy with the "armoured" movement. Perhaps when one later takes a long view of France's recent history the campaign against Weygand will stand out as one of the worst blunders of some of the men who ran the country during the "dark days." Fleet To Be Recalled

ITALY'S MEDITERRANEAN CLAIMS

THE GERMAN ARMISTICE TERMS, ACCEPTED BY THE FRENCH GOVERNMENT, ENTAIL THE DESTRUCTION OF FRANCE AS A MILITARY POWER AND THE CONVERSION OF THE COUNTRY INTO A GERMAN ARSENAL OF WAR AGAINST BRITAIN.

One of the provisions which most closely affects Britain is that the French Fleet must be recalled to French ports, disarmed, and interned under the directions of Germany and Italy.

A great part of France will be occupied by the Germans, the French paying the cost of occupation.

In there is growing evidence of the repudiation in the French Empire of the Bordeaux Government and of the determination of the French colonies to continue the war against Germany and Italy.

Although Italy's armistice terms make no direct territorial demands on France, they provide for the demilitarisation of large zones in France and the French Empire, and most serious of all, for the destruction of the great naval fortresses in the Mediterranean.

A clause of the agreement which is of particular interest to East Africa is the demand that Italy shall have the free use of the port of Djibouti and of the railway from there to Addis Ababa.

Nothing More Shamer?

M. Bourdieu, Marshal Petain's chief delegate, was quoted a few days ago as saying that France would not accept humiliating or shameful terms. It is difficult to see how terms could be more humiliating, but also more degrading, than to hand over territory and material resources to a power which has won a victory which is a permanent one.

"This treaty will be, as M. Bourdieu's undertaking has been, a bitter, unending and condemned, not only by all Frenchmen overseas, but also by many Frenchmen at home who have been prevented by the action of the German Government from following the example given by other victims of German aggression, and from continuing the struggle against the common enemy in circumstances which hold out a good hope for final victory."

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British Reaction

A statement broadcast from London on Friday said that His Majesty's Government find that the terms of the armistice proposed by the German Government are a state of complete submission to the enemy and deprive the French people of their rights.

His Majesty's Government declare that it can no longer regard the Bordeaux Government as the Government of an independent nation.

The Government of France have taken note of the proposal to form a provisional French National Committee, determined on the proposition that it will be in full control of the administration of France.

Italy's Terms

The terms of the Italo-French armistice were published last night in the Daily Mail. It is stated that (1) France will cease hostilities in French North Africa, the Colonies and territories under French administration. (2) In French metropolitan territory, France will also cease hostilities in the air and on the ground.

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CONTROL OF THE ENEMY TIMBER INDUSTRY

Important New Regulations

In view of the necessity under War conditions of ensuring adequate timber supplies for Military and for urgent public utility and civil requirements, it has been decided that timber production must be regarded as essential work within the meaning of the Defence Regulations.

Therefore, in exercise of the powers conferred upon it by Regulation 46 of Defence Regulations 1939, the Supply Board has ordered that, with effect from June 23, 1948, no sawmills, lumbermills or timber producers shall execute any orders for timber, or enter into any contract for the supply of timber, except with the consent in writing of the Supply Board, or of some duly authorised person appointed by the Supply Board, first had and obtained, which consent may be given subject to such conditions as the Supply Board, or a person duly authorised by the Supply Board may see fit to impose.

It is hereby notified for general information that the following Regulations apply to the timber industry in Kenya, Uganda and Tanganyika, and are to be read in conjunction with the Regulations in force in the United Kingdom and the Colonies.

1. The Supply Board, established by the Supply Board Act, 1947, shall be the authority for the control of the timber industry in Kenya, Uganda and Tanganyika, and shall exercise its powers in accordance with the provisions of the said Act and the Regulations made thereunder.

2. The Supply Board may, in exercise of its powers, make such regulations as it may think fit for the purpose of giving effect to the provisions of the said Act and the Regulations, and any regulations made by the Supply Board under this section shall have effect as if they were made by the Government.

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IMPORT AND EXPORT PROBLEMS

Policy in Kenya Scheme to Assist Kenya's Trade Flow

The position of enemy aliens in the Colony has recently been carefully reviewed by the Government, in consultation with the Ministry and Police authorities (says a statement issued by the Information Office). The following is the general policy which has been decided upon.

With very few exceptions all enemy aliens are to be treated as persons of interest in connection with their activities in the Colony who are to be supervised by the Security Department. It is further decided that all Italian males with the exception of (a) the Consul General and five members of his Staff (who will be treated as persons of interest) and (b) four ecclesiastical dignitaries, have been interned.

All enemy alien women have been removed from Mombasa and a ban has been placed on the entry of enemy alien women into the Colony with the exception of those who are employed in professions which will, in a given case, be allowed to reside at large. Any individual, however, who is interned under this scheme will be interned with his wife and children.

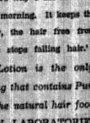
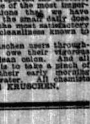
