The President of the Association of Chambers of Commerce of Eastern Africa, Mr. J. M. THE ANNUAL SESSION

The need for developing the East African territories at a greater rate than hitherto was stressed by the President of the Association of Chambers of Commerce of Eastern Africa at the opening of the annual session in Mombasa yesterday.

Mr. Macleod welcomed signs of a changed attitude by the Colonial Office indicating, in his view, a much more progressive colonial policy in the future.

In regard to the proposed Union of the East African territories the President asked the delegates to support the main issue which all their strength should be put to the advancement of East Africa.

In his speech opening the session His Excellency the Governor of Kenya, stressing the national trend, said "we must try to bring the work back to unity."

Ten Years' Trade in East Africa: No Marked Progress Shown

This table was prepared and circulated to the President of the Associated Chambers at the opening of the annual session yesterday. Mr. Massey made reference to it in the presidential address. A study of the figures will show that on the basis of tonnage of exports the progress of Kenya, Uganda and Tanganyika during the last ten years has not been very marked, the figure in the case of Tanganyika being 5.3 per cent over that of Kenya and Uganda (which are combined) 2.5 per cent.

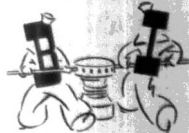

has been, of course, a very noteworthy absence of references to the so-called 'Fischer's' speeches during the past year and the organized fear of Russia, a very real thing in the mind of the Anglo-French statesmen.

Even now, however, it is not clear that the Anglo-French statesmen are not in a state of mind to be satisfied with the present situation in Moscow or to the staff talks. The connection between the two crises, economically has been mentioned during the past year. Outbursts against the Soviet have never been allowed to interfere with trade relations and Germany has been a large buyer of Russian goods. This relationship has been strengthened by the conclusion of a trade and credit agreement which, in itself, was not a matter for surprise.

Even non-aggression pacts are not new things. Not so long ago Hitler offered a whole series of such undertakings to States in Northern Europe, which were not accepted. Others were rejected because the countries concerned did not wish to be too closely identified with either side. However, there is nothing essentially wrong with a non-aggression pact. In theory, at least, it ought to strengthen the cause of peace. It is not a political alliance, like the pact between France and Russia, for instance, which provides that each country will go to the assistance of the other in the event of attack. But the significance of such a pact is that it is a step towards a more general peace in Europe, and particularly in the Balkans, without their knowledge, which France and Great Britain engaged in the talk of holding up an anti-aggression pact which was conducting negotiations in Russia which it was hoped would see the alignment of the other States in the League of Nations. Staff talks in many respects more important than facts, proceeding. There is something in the conception of a non-aggression pact between Russia and Germany which is in conflict with the international action against aggression. In theory at least, membership of such a group is open to any power in the world, including the Axis powers.

The latest move referred to Poland (which is not a member of the League of Nations) is that it is just another trick played in the game of the "war of nerves" and is a very variously interpreted throughout the world as being anything from a matter of little importance to a fundamental change in the balance of power in Europe (an equally patent overstatement). The one thing which is clear is that it is a move which serves as an edge in Europe; the manner of the announcement, as well as its character, are not likely to induce calm. Until its meaning is clear, and until it is seen what effect it is likely to have on German policy in respect of Poland, and whether in practice it means that Russia has decided to remain outside possible conflict, which is the traditional foreign policy of the Soviet—it is difficult to see how it can be anything but a dramatic unexpected move of a new structure of fear and alarm.

Nothing is inevitable or unlikely in the world of today. The most fantastic and incredible things are possible and what we should all remember at the present time of difficulty is that the world is still enjoying peace. Until there is an emergency which threatens peace, all people should try to keep their minds off the war and concentrate on their own affairs and the well-being of the world.

has been with so long that unless we steel ourselves against its insidious weakening of our morale, all human enterprise will be threatened by disaster. In East Africa there are many tasks to hand and we should determine that while there is peace we will be busy in its maintenance and make full use of it.

MORE DETAILS OF MERILE MASSACRES About 270 Turkana Killed

Many more details of the Merile raids in Turkana, and the K.A.R. action, than had previously been made known, were provided by the Kenya Express yesterday afternoon, and they give a history of the events beginning with an alleged murder of a Merile by a Turkana.

Although the figures of casualties are unconfirmed, about 270 Turkana, men, women, and children, are reported to have been massacred by Merile and Donyiro in various times and places.

Details of the co-operation between Kenya, Uganda, Sudan, and Italian forces were also provided, and it was stated that at one time the Turkana were thought to be massing for reprisals.

Further details are now available regarding the series of raids which took place at the northern end of Turkana during the latter half of 1933. Figures of casualties are not ascertained and should not be taken as correct.

The first intimation of any trouble impending in the Kenya desert was on July 14 when a Turkana, who was reported to have incited a Merile some five days previously, was arrested and reported to have taken part in the raid.

"SURE TO REJOIN REICH" Far East Floods And Friction Continue

"Pledge To Poland

SPECIAL MESSAGE TO FUEHRER

BRITAIN'S OBLIGATIONS TO POLAND ARE IN NO WAY AFFECTED BY THE PROPOSED PACT BETWEEN GERMANY AND RUSSIA, AND THEY WILL BE CARRIED OUT IN FULL. This is the substance of the decisions reached at the meeting of the British Cabinet on Tuesday afternoon, and they meet with full approval in Britain and France. They were conveyed personally to Herr Hitler by the British Ambassador to Berlin, yesterday afternoon, so that the head of the German Government could be in no doubt about Britain's position. No news of Britain's firmness was published in Germany yesterday and the newspapers pretend that there is utter consternation in Berlin and France.

Herr von Ribbentrop had an interview with M. Molotov in Moscow yesterday afternoon, and German opinion expects that the non-aggression pact will be signed almost at once, after which the way would be clear for Germany's next move, which might be to take the Danzig question into consideration. It is suggested that there need be nothing inconceivable in a non-aggression pact with Germany and a defence alliance with Britain and France, which the Soviet, it is said, still desires to conclude.

The following communication was issued from No. 10, Downing Street, on the eve of the British Cabinet meeting—

"The Cabinet, at its meeting today, considered the international situation in all its bearings, in addition to reports that have been received as to military movements between the German and Soviet Governments which was about to be concluded. They had to be taken into account in deciding that such an agreement, if it were made, would be a serious step towards the fulfilment of their obligations to Poland, which they have repeatedly stated in public, and which they are determined to fulfil.

The Outlook

The summoning of Parliament and the announcement of special emergency powers to be sought by the Government are a measure of the seriousness of the most recent developments in the international situation from the point of view of Britain. Every thing points to the next few days being a critical period, even allowing for the fact that the word "crisis" has through almost constant usage lost much of its true meaning. The official statement issued after the Cabinet meeting on Tuesday stresses the belief of the British Government, expressed on so many occasions, that there is no problem in Europe at the present time which cannot be settled peaceably if there is a general desire to resolve it and it may be taken as certain that the British Government and all those associated with it in the Peace Pact will do everything possible, consistent with solemn obligations, to avert a war which would have the most terrible consequences for the whole world.

Details of the proposed non-aggression pact between Russia and Germany have not yet been published, but it is apparent that German and Russian interpretations of its purpose and significance vary considerably. Germany holds it as a death blow to "enrichment," Moscow is believed to regard the development as an important step in the direction of a general settlement of European problems. The latter may prove to be the more reasonable interpretation particularly if, as is suggested, the treaty makes provision for other signatory to denounce it in the event of the other taking aggressive action against any other country. After all to refuse a loving country can logically open an agreement the declared purpose of which is non-aggression; it is only the natural sequel to attacks on Germany, diplomacy and intentions in the light of recent history which makes people doubt this course.

Germany has made apparently diametrically opposed ideological systems. Moreover it should be borne in mind that Russia still has pacts of friendship with France and Poland and a new undertaking of similar character should not be likely to disturb those relationships.

Nevertheless it seems clear that the manoeuvring of the Axis Powers and particularly Germany try to achieve some comparatively minor objective, such as Danzig, which is yet of great psychological importance. It being brought to drastic test. It is no less obvious that Britain has made her attitude perfectly plain—that anything in the nature of active aggression will meet with the most determined opposition and that neither the Government nor the people of Britain are in a mood to be intimidated by bluffs and threats which Germany is still relying on a technique which has hitherto accomplished all that Hitler has done for it. PLANNING FOR PROGRESS

The Association of E.A. Chambers of Commerce

MONDAY, AUGUST 21, 1939.

The Excellency of the Governor of Kenya will open in Mombasa this forenoon the annual session of the Association of Chambers of Commerce of Eastern Africa. Commercial interests in a wide area of the Territories are represented and it is a matter for regret that the business men of Uganda are still unable to send their way to cooperate with their commercial colleagues in the discussion of matters of common concern. Problems are being faced and solved in East Africa today, and progress is being steadily recorded in so many directions that the self-imposed isolation of Uganda business men can only do harm to the other wider interests to a greater measure than their absence damages their influence and the Association.

The long agenda has two outstanding items—Union of the Territories and Development. Union has been given a new impetus by the recent meeting of British settlers at Frings when a draft constitution was prepared in the broadest detail providing for the preservation of all communal interests. A new body is to be formed in the Mandated Territory which will have as one of its main tasks the furtherance of the object of the Association of East African Chambers once more discusses this week from its own non-political angle of commercial common sense. The resolution of the Executive, in its call to the unofficial members of the Territorial Legislatures to take the same action, is being signed to Closer Union striving to align itself with the East African Standard in voicing the widely held view that sectional preferences are less than the advantages are backed by action taken in cooperation with the Government directed to voice public opinion. The frings meeting is already passing into history, but as yet no final leader of the unofficial community has taken any step to bring the frings plan into the field of practical politics.

That while the movement for Union is suffering from inaction, development economically can and is going on. The economies of Closer Union are the factors

which in the end will compel the political association and its direction. In Kenya, Tanganyika and Uganda, the Executive and Committees of the Governments are closely connected at the moment with the details of development plans. But whereas the policy of the Imperial Government apparently precludes financial support at Territory and for development schemes, Kenya has within a past few weeks reached a stage at which progress can now be planned. A quarter of a million pounds has been provided from funds for the Land Bank, part of which can be employed in securing the foundations of the present group of settlers. In addition a similar sum has just been authorized for new settlement, with the important implication that the Imperial Government has at last resolved its doubts and difficulties about encouraging more European settlement in Kenya. The only major outstanding requirement is the provision of funds for a progressive programme of road improvement and reconstruction.

On one aspect of the agenda there are no two opinions. The Executive is calling for closer cooperation between Tanganyika and Kenya (Uganda should not be excluded) in considering plans for economic development. It is manifestly desirable that any project for exploitation of resources, the countries should be in complete and harmonious principle of collaboration, which goes to the root of effective Union. The present circumstances give an emphasis recently by the announcement of the policy of the Government in respect of the encouragement of secondary industries. Today more than ever before, in the face of world difficulties which as we have often insisted will be solved on a basis of maintained peace, it is important for all sections of our communities to see East Africa from a long-range viewpoint and to see its whole.
