Germany's Industrial Re-organisation.

STATE TO HAVE COMPLETE CONTROL.

Twelve Main Groups Formed.

TO AVOID UNSOUND COMPETITION WHILE KEEPING TRADE LIVELLY.

...and important industrial re-organisation is to take place in January, details of which are given in a new law that has recently been promulgated.

The Ministry of Economics is to have complete control of all industrial organisations—and the man appointed to direct the new organisation so formed will be Herr Hitler's industrial adviser.

The main branches of industry will be divided into groups, each with a prominent industrialist at its head, two of these leaders have already been appointed, both of them are directors of industrial organisations which are known throughout the world, Hiltol and Voss, the Hamburg shipbuilders and Krupp, and the steel manufacturers.

It is hoped that this new organisation, while retaining commercial rivalry, will at the same time do away with wasteful and unproductive competition—control groups will be enforced on firms not carrying out the orders of the organisation, members of which it is to be compulsory.

London, March 13. The National revenue last week exceeded expenditure by £15,000,000, the figures being Revenue, £2,800,000,000 and Expenditure, £2,785,000,000.

This current surplus, after allowing for the American Debt payment of £3,300,000,000 and the sinking fund payments of £125,000,000 amounts to a deficit of £1,475,000,000.

HIGHWAY ROBBERY IN UGANDA.

Release of Indian Suspect.

Kampala, March 12. There is a hint to report this week at the instigation of the Director of Prisons that the Indian who was arrested on suspicion of being a highway robber in Uganda has been released.

The number of programmes provisionally accepted by the Ministry of Health is 1,429 providing for the installation of 254,750 houses and the relocation of 1,197,170 people.

These are the results of the programme to date in that plans are being made to build in replacement of 225,180 houses. The estimated number of persons to be rehoused is 1,240,182.

The local programmes provisionally accepted cover areas with a population of 26,000,000, or 50 per cent of the total population of England and Wales. They include 302 where no slums exist.

When the final particulars are published, it is expected that the total number of programmes accepted will be 1,429.

GOVERNMENT PLANS ALMOST COMPLETE.

A Five Year Programme.

OVER 1,000,000 PEOPLE TO BE PROVIDED WITH NEW HOUSES.

Enormous sums are to be spent by Government and local authorities during the next five years in a slum clearance campaign in England and Wales. Plans are practically complete and an official report gives some striking figures regarding the extent of the scheme.

Plans are already in hand for the demolition of nearly 300,000 houses, and the provision of alternative accommodation. The estimated number of people to be rehoused is over 1,000,000. The capital cost of the scheme is stated to be £115,000,000.

Enormous Expenditure.

Plans for the "National Crusade" against slums, launched by the government last April, are now practically complete. Local authorities, at the instance of the Government, have submitted a five year programme of slum demolition and provision of alternative accommodation, and an official programme has been drawn up.

Tonight's Films

Capital Theatre.

There is amusing dialogue, and swift repartee. "Money for Nothin'" is a story which was specially written for the screen by Seymour Hicks. Unfortunately, the script is so swift, that it is very often missed in the laughter from the previous remark. Kenya's Finance, Credit and Economy Measure.

"I feel the reform to be a losing match," said Mr. C. K. Archer, Vice-President of the Kenya Association, taking the chair at a meeting on Wednesday at which the four Kenyan divisional candidates were to speak.

A time of all in was announced by each candidate to speak and answer questions, and each was given the choice of remaining in the room during the speeches, or of retiring. All remained.

COL DURKAM.

Col Durkham was drawn first. His first point was the credit of the country, and he definitely did not agree with the Secretary of State's recent announcement.

Regarding expenditure and revenue, today the country was carrying a heavy burden of 200 million years ago, and in that respect Mr. MacLellan Wilson was one of the greatest supporters of the amount of money spent years ago.

Session.

As to education, the demand for consideration of the Government to the children was no new thing. Government agreed to it in 1941, but the money was not available.

Unemployment.

With regard to unemployment, it would surprise his hon. member, as it had surprised him, to learn that the actual number of Europeans in the whole of Kenya registered with the Government was only 98.

MAJOR RIDDELL.

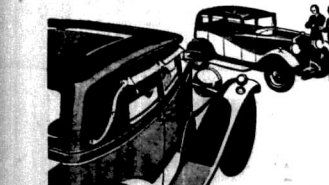

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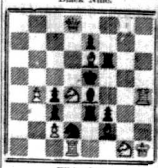
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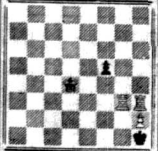

White Ten. White mates in two moves. **PROBLEM No. 1532.** By O. Filmenthal, Black Two.

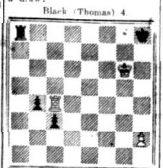

Every effort to restore their finances to a sound basis, and to rebuild their surplus balances which had been dissipated by the Government. They had at present got down to a more reasonable level of expenditure, but probably further savings would be made, but in this connection, it is pointed out that the need for caution, especially in view of the unbalanced budget, necessitates the Government to be careful and would refrain from the strong opinions, now being expressed, that the severe reduction in the Police Force may have been a contributing factor to the amount of crime that has been evident of late.

In former years when property owners were not so desirous that they as settlers asked for more costly services which they cannot afford today. Let them take a lesson from the past, rebuild their financial position, and resist the tendency to under-expenditure which the first flush of prosperity might suggest.

Taxation.

On the subject of taxation, the speaker intimated that the present Graduated Poll Tax and the Pollage Tax Ordinance were temporary measures and expired at the end of the year, when he hoped they would revert to the normal and former method of taxation based on the individual system. He firmly believed that this system would be sufficient to had served well in the past and he saw no reason why it should be altered.

Capt. Ward said he could not leave the subject of Taxation without a reference to income tax and wished to make it quite plain in this question, based on the fact that such a tax. Its effect was to prevent any increase in the country's capital or industrial wealth. In England the principal grudge against the tax was without doubt the big business men and their companies. They were the ones who by prospering had made large incomes, and if a considerable portion of that surplus income was left to them, they employed it for extensions, for new factories or works, or for new processes, and thereby created more employment, and as a result in the majority of cases that money would earn a profit and was productive.

There were many other dangers in this question, the fact that such a tax would discourage new capital, the fact that there would be no control on the sale and that it was too easy a tax to evade for extravagant or unproductive.

Civil Service.

Capt. Ward re-affirmed his attitude that the Civil Service must be given a fair deal. If a country was to progress, and especially if it was to become a great power, it must have a Civil Service, and in the British Empire the present level on official salaries was accepted by this Civil Service, who realized that a special place would entail a greater responsibility of the highest quality, but it was undoubtedly a breach of contractual obligation if the Government of the first adjustment to be made when finances allowed. It must be remembered that in times of prosperity business firms had the opportunity of making larger profits, and could thereby place sums to reserve against the leaner years, but the Civil Servant had not that opportunity.

RAILWAY FACILITIES.

Negotiable Consignment Notes.

For the last time, minutes prepared by the Railway Commission appeared in the agenda of the Executive Committee on Thursday. It was merely a note, however, that the General Manager of the Kenya and Uganda Railways and Harbours had written to the Executive Committee, suggesting that the minutes should be introduced, he hoped this month. A letter of thanks to the General Manager was also extended to the Executive Committee, and the minutes of the Executive Committee were read. This was the real reason for suggesting that the notes be withdrawn. The Chairman, at the request of the Executive Committee, suggested that they had no objection to these notes being no longer used, but that the consignment notes should remain, and he recommended that the Executive Committee should give this assurance, if the demand arose again, and it was supported by the Executive Committee.

BANKRUPTCIES.

Trained Investigator Suggested.

The Association of Chambers of Commerce of Eastern Africa has advised constituent chambers of a method by which the commercial community can obtain greater protection against unscrupulous trading from fraudulent bankruptcies. This is by the institution of a trained investigator on record.

The Association in its circular letter gives the names of the Licensed Investigator, Mr. A. B. Pollock and the fees upon which he would be prepared to undertake similar work in Kenya. Nairobi Chamber of Commerce, when the letter was read at Thursday's meeting, noted it for the information of members.

To the Editor "E.A. Standard," Sir.—I have recently returned from a short holiday and have just had the report of the election of Major Kirtvo's meeting at Kiabuo on the 6th inst. I am glad to hear that you will be good enough to publish my views on the report, so far as my participation in the proceedings was concerned, and in particular to explain why I put certain questions in relation to Mr. Harpo's report as the first District of Agriculture.

Major Kirtvo, in his address, distinguished Mr. Harpo's citizenship as "penetration and a firmness which of his public persona in your report—and by means of it indicated that there was an absence of the political opportunism with which those engaged in public affairs are especially concerned. 3. Is he aware that Mr. Harpo worked without a salary for (not without clerical assistance as reported in your paper) and that most of his memoranda were originally in manuscript?

We therefore welcomed the suggestion of two present District Council members, one of them Mr. Boster, that we should constitute our own committee for the remedy occurring by the resignation of Mr. Smith.

I must confess that I find myself rather foggy when I try to understand Mr. Boster's paragraph referring to the grants of money to roads and the number of residents in the North and South side of the Fort Hill Road. I suggest with all respect, that he has temporarily lost his bearings as these some considerable distance in his mind as to which side he himself lives.

EDUCATION.

To the Editor "E.A. Standard," Sir.—The recent letters which have appeared from Mr. Bost, and "E.L.C.C. Lecturer," further confirm my opinion as to the necessity of appointing a regular Committee to go into the whole question of Education, and the problems connected with the bringing up of our youth, and the placing of them in such positions that they can earn their living in their own country, so that they may not later be become a burden on the Colony.

Whatever happens, we do not want to run the risk of a "Poor White" movement in the future, which exists in South Africa.

Mr. Bost puts forward a number of points, all of which require very serious consideration.

I have on previous occasions endeavored to draw attention to the importance of the situation, and to show that an officer's enquiry, conducted in a proper manner, would have led after considerable delay in attending to the case. "E.L.C.C. Lecturer," has now raised a fresh suggestion which merits careful thought. It is, however, a very technical matter, and it is quite impossible for one who has no actual experience of the system as worked by the I.C.C. nor has any figures showing the cost of such a scheme, or the numbers likely to take advantage of it, to offer any criticism, which would be of the slightest value.

The points that have been raised in these and former letters to the Press emphasize the need for a subject—a body which should be permanent, whose meetings should, if possible, be open to the public should be able to call for and collect evidence, and which should publish the result of its deliberations. This may simply come out to be that the one which would need a certain amount of financing, but I cannot see how any really valuable information can be obtained without it, and I am glad to see that the East African Women's League is coming forward to support the idea. I can only trust that they will not let it drop.

Memorandum for Secretary of State.

PRESENTED BY EUROPEAN ELECTED MEMBERS.

Britain's Deflationary Policy.

RECONSTRUCTION LOAN PROPOSAL TO KEEP PRODUCERS ON THE LAND.

A statement of Kenya's financial position, as seen by the European Elected Members, was made to the Secretary of State for the Colonies in the form of a Memorandum.

The statement emphasizes that the appreciation of the commodity value of the £1 sterling and the heavy fall in price levels of commodities has doubled the physical burden of debts expressed in sterling in the last three years, with a much greater increase in the debt of the primary producer.

To solve the pressing problem of keeping men on the land, the Elected Members proposed a Reconstruction Loan to convert agricultural debt, with the option to the creditors of accepting Bonds at a fixed rate of interest.

The Memorandum is critical of the conditions of the Kenya 6 per cent. £5,000,000 loan raised in 1921 and not redeemable for another 12 years. It is described as the most onerous loan ever raised on behalf of any Colony.

What Other Countries Have Done.

A memorandum on the general state of the physical burden therefrom placed in Kenya, more especially with regard to agricultural debt, was presented by the European Elected Members to the Kenya Legislative Council by the Secretary of State for the Colonies.

It states the capital debt of the Colony to be £17,205,000 of which only £8,000,792 is Colonial debt. The balance being transported and other loans. The total annual sinking fund and interest charges falling on the Colony are £227,065. The Railway and Harbour annual loan charges are £1,640,250.

4. At this stage it might be desirable to analyse this Colony's loan commitments.
(a) We attach herewith Schedule A showing the allocation of the total public debt and annual charges of the Colony and Protectorate of Kenya. From this Schedule it will be noted that of a total debt of £17,205,000 only £8,000,792 is Colonial debt, the remaining £9,204,208 having been incurred on account of Railways and Harbours. The Railway is in a sound financial position, and its interest and Sinking Fund charges covering a heavy depreciation rate of 24 per cent. What the Colony needs, however, is a prosperous and expanding agriculture. It is clear, therefore, that in view of the comparatively small capital debt of the Colony, the Government should be invited to agricultural and developmental purposes, for the purpose of strengthening it.

Measures Taken Elsewhere.
5. Nearly all the schemes of the various Colonies for the relief of their primary producers are dependent upon primary production for export. It is therefore, of the utmost importance that the Government should be invited to consider the possibility of a reconstruction loan to Kenya, which would be used for the purpose of strengthening it.

(2) It is strongly felt that there must be another Ottawa Conference, and accordingly, of course, at Ottawa, for many reasons have already been mentioned by such far-reaching factors as the fall of the Dollar.

held strong views on political matters. Capt. Dobson has gathered that both his opponents in his district, Mr. Dobson were slightly mixed in their own minds as to what they did mean by "Electoral Committee." He would therefore explain that there were two separate suggestions to be considered. One of the suggestions was that the present Select Committee on estimates should be a statutory body. The speaker considered that the present committee was already constituted by the Government, Mr. Brown, European and Indian the Member representing Native Interests, the Colonial Secretary, Chief Native Commissioner, and Treasurer with the right to call on any head of a department.

During the sitting, members declined to vote on their own work to do, and really the whole thing was a failure. He did not see how such an unduly committee could be anything else. But he does not see the wisdom of making a statutory body to deal with the passing of a Bill through Council and its perusal by the authorities at home who would in all probability postulate for increased Asiatic representation.

Another and far more practical suggestion was that the Watch Dog Committee should set up a special finance committee, composed of people who really did know something about Government finance, and which could go into the budget before it was presented to the Council and reported to the Elector Members.

That he considered, was practical, and slightly remodelled so far as a permanent committee, but a step forward to the control of their own finances. Italy's Demand for Expansion in Africa.

SIGNIFICANT STATEMENT BY SIGMOR MUSSOINI

At Fascist Demonstration.

NO QUESTION OF TERRITORIAL CONQUEST INVOLVED.

The second of the five yearly celebrations of the advent of the Fascist regime in Italy, was observed in Rome on Sunday, when Signor Mussolini addressed a gathering of 7,000 leading members of the organisation. During the course of his speech he reviewed Italy's foreign relations.

He stated that Italian expansion in Africa was a task for future generations of Italians. He emphasized that there was no question of territorial conquest, but added: "Let not the nations in possession block the spiritual and economic expansion of Italy."

Signor Mussolini also referred to the possibilities of collaboration with countries in Asia, pointing out that transit, whether by sea or by air, was only a matter of a few hours.

Dealing with the question of the League of Nations, he said that proposed reforms could wait, pending the conclusion of the Disarmament Conference. If the Conference failed there would be no need to reform the League, but simply to record its demise.

The League and Disarmament.

The capital of Rome was decorated at four o'clock this morning by buglers sounding the Reveille, to mark the occasion of the second five yearly meeting at the Opera House of the Fascist regime later in the month.

Seven thousand Fascist Franchises, simultaneously conferred Signor Mussolini, who assigned particular attention as a task to future generations of Italians. He said: "There is no question of territorial conquest, but let not the nations in possession block the spiritual and economic expansion of Italy."

After reviewing Italy's foreign relations, he said that Austria could not wait until the Disarmament Conference, for if the Conference failed there would be no need to reform it, but simply to record its demise.



SCIENTIFIC LECTURE.
**Reptiles and Frogs in
 Tanganyika.**

Mr. Arthur Loveridge, who is
 well-known in the scientific world
 of East Africa, gave an interesting
 lecture on Friday evening at the
 Cuyahua Memorial Museum on
 Tanganyika, and a few of the
 smaller animals to be found in
 Tanganyika. His lecture was ac-
 cepted by the members of the
 club, and was held in the hall
 during the many years in
 which he has been working in
 the Territory. His lecture was

The lecture dealt in great detail
 with various kinds of toads and
 frogs, some of which were found
 in various places in the world

Stabilising the Price Level of Commodities.

BY WISELY REGULATED SUPPLY OF CHEAP MONEY.

The True Meaning of Inflation.

STRIKING SUPPORT FOR MANAGED CURRENCY BY MIDLAND BANK CHAIRMAN.

An important statement on Britain's monetary policy was made recently by the Right Hon. R. McKenna, Chairman of the Midland Bank.

The statement supports and bears out the main contentions of the memorandum on Kenya finance presented to the Secretary of State by Elected Members.

Mr. McKenna is strongly in favour of a wisely managed currency and points out that the provision of adequate supplies of cheap money has been the most important factor in Britain's trade recovery.

In supporting a managed currency with a policy of monetary expansion, Mr. McKenna maintains that there is nothing to be concerned for the time being with any metallic basis.

The quantity of available money, he emphasised, is a governing factor in the price level of commodities and the inflation practised by Britain during the last two years has been the most important factor in trade recovery. It has been proved that the price level of commodities can be maintained by proper regulation of the supply of money and public opinion is rapidly recognising that fact.

Britain's Monetary Policy.

Interesting and provocative views on British monetary policy were voiced by the Rt. Hon. R. McKenna at the Midland Bank on the ordinary general meeting of shareholders held in London recently to receive the annual Balance Sheet.

Mr. McKenna remarked that no previous address he has given as Chairman of the Midland Bank has been so widely discussed as this one, which necessarily involves a discussion of the functions of the Bank of England.

He had done so because the matter was of immediate concern to the shareholders of a clearing bank whose principal operations are directly influenced by the monetary policy of the central bank and the whole trade of the country.

Mr. McKenna explained the functions of the central bank and the importance of its policy in relation to the stability of the currency and the supply of money.

He stated that the Bank of England had acquired an unenviable reputation for its monetary policy, and its action had therefore, to the judgment of the public, been unwise.
