Disarmament Prospects Again Obscure. FRANCE AND GERMANY STILL AT CROSS PURPOSES. Mutual Distrust. DETAILS OF REPLIES TO THE BRITISH MEMORANDUM.

The texts of the French and German replies to the British memorandum proposing a basis for the negotiation of a disarmament convention, have now been published. The effect of these replies appears to place the realization of any agreed scheme of disarmament as far off as ever.

France is frankly distrustful of Germany, and expresses her anxiety for her security as a result of the recent increase in the German army, navy and air armaments. France states that this action of Germany has rendered negotiations impossible, the basis of which has been raised.

The French Government adds that she cannot overlook this, especially as the numerous aeroplanes have recently been organized in the demilitarized zone in contravention of the Peace Treaty.

The German statement is more conciliatory, and says that Germany is prepared to accept the British memorandum as a basis subject to certain important modifications, the chief of which is a demand for a definite limit to the armaments of the countries.

Germany is prepared to accept the position for the first five years of the Convention but during the next five years she demands reductions and increases so as to provide for equality of armaments in ten years.

Compensating Owners of Bazaar Property. MUNICIPAL TOWN PLANNING SCHEME. Re-building Problems. The success or otherwise of the Nairobi Municipal Council's Town Planning Scheme, which was briefly outlined in yesterday's issue of the "East African Standard," depends very largely on the question of compensation and the length of the period allowed for reconstruction.

That the owners of property in the bazaar area are, in the main, in favour of the new scheme, is the opinion of Mr. A. C. Tannahill who has had extensive experience in that valuation and town planning. He points out, that however willing property owners may be to co-operate in the re-building, there are very definite financial difficulties. It is hoped therefore that Municipal Council will not press for a limited period in which the re-building must be carried out.

Unless some mutually satisfactory basis of compensation is evolved, and unless they are given adequate time in which to make their arrangements, it is likely that a large part of the Indian property owners affected by the town planning scheme which the Municipal Council proposes to put into effect in the bazaar area, will strongly oppose the scheme.

**Amendments Proposed to Ordinance.**

**ENGLISH PROCEDURE.**

In this week's Kenya Official Gazette is published a Bill which offers amendments to the Companies Ordinance of 1922. This Bill will be introduced during the next session of the Legislative Council.

The first amendment repeals a section of Part IV which lays down the registration of charges with the Registrar. Sub-section 5 of clause 79 relating to charges comprising property situate outside the Colony, is considered unnecessary in view of the provisions of sub-sections 3 and 4.

By far the most important amendment, however, is that proposed to be made to Section 146, for which the commercial community have been asking. This section makes it compulsory for certain particulars in regard to directors of companies to appear in trade catalogues, circulars, stationery, etc. issued by those companies, and exemption from the operation of the clause can only be granted by a Judge of the Supreme Court on application. This exemption varies, according to the circumstances of the case. So far as is known, the three banks operating in Kenya have obtained total exemption, and the Kenya Farmers Association exemption for one year.

**Register of Companies.**

The commercial community have suggested that the law be brought into line with the English procedure, where exemption is obtained on application to the Registrar of Companies and on payment of a small fee, and heavy legal expenses such as are necessary under the existing Ordinance. The amendment will conform with the suggestion, inasmuch as it provides that power be given the Registrar of Companies to grant exemption, and to a Judge in chambers to hear appeals from his decision on such matters. No fee is, however, stated.

**TONS OF QUININE.**

**World Campaign Against Malaria.**

There were 17,750 cases of malaria under treatment in 1932, according to the report of the health section of the League of Nations, which deals with ten years' work in the prevention and cure of malarial disease. A British newspaper from Geneva says: "There are eight countries where malaria is rampant. It is estimated that the world requires quantities of quinine amounting annually to 1,087 metric tons, but owing presumably to the expense, the consumption of quinine is barely half that amount. Quinine, says the report, is still the best remedy, but it is hoped that by the more rational use of various other kinds of malaria drugs, a cheaper and equally efficacious.

If it is proposed to begin a course of treatment at Singapore on April 30, to be followed by field work in China, Netherlands East Indies and Malaya.

ever, it is not always easy to find the necessary money for heavy capital expenditure, and the proprietors must be given time to make the necessary financial arrangements and to arrange for re-building, notwithstanding the fact that there may be complete will-ness on their part to co-operate in the scheme.

"It has been suggested the building should be demolished within a period of two years and reconstructed within a period of three years. Very definitely, there should be no fixed period in which reconstruction should be completed. It should be left to the individual owners to do what they like with their own property, and if they elect not to build on their plots until some more propitious time, that is undoubtedly their affair. A limited period in which to re-build might seriously affect the value of the plots on the basis of the present owners.

"There is also a suggestion that the central auxiliary lane be widened from 20 feet to 40 feet by taking away a depth of ten feet from the frontage of the present sanitary lanes. This suggestion is a reasonable and proper one, provided the plot owners affected are suitably compensated for their loss of area.

"With regard to this job it has been suggested that the provision of a 40 feet road in place of a 20 feet lane will improve the appearance of these plots by giving them two footings instead of one, and that, therefore, a betterment will be effected, and may extend the compensation for the loss of area, which would otherwise be granted. This question of betterment is problematical, and the Municipality would be well advised not to introduce it.

**Robt. Phangas.**

"It is understood, further, that a number of the side passages will be done away with and thrown into the adjoining plots. In this manner the Municipality will doubtless obtain a considerable sum of money from which to compensate owners for the depth of ten feet to be taken away from the frontage of the central lane.

"The position, briefly, is that the owners in the bazaar area are asked to pull down the houses and buildings which, in the majority of cases, today satisfy their requirements. I understand that for the most part the job holders are prepared to do this for the benefit of the community as a whole, and if they are not unduly rushed in this matter there is every likelihood that this desirable scheme of reconstruction can be given effect to in comparatively few months by the Municipality and the ratepayers."

# CHESS.

**PROBLEM No. 1564.**  
"B" in the Competition, Black Three.

Our reason for setting so easy a problem is to encourage beginners to try occasionally a three-mover, and we have to start with simple examples. "B" is not quite as easy as it looks, but those in search of something harder will find another problem at the foot of the column.

Answers are coming in very well to Problem "A" and lots of fun is in store. In a competition, solvers should never be content with one key until they have searched for others. Competitors are by no means infallible, and when an extra key ("C") is found, it brings at many points (4) as the competitor's key.

In sending the solution to "B" it is necessary to send the Key-move, and then to send Black's Defenses to the Key, and, along with each defense, send White's appropriate Second Move. The actual mates (White's third moves) are not asked for. Keys count 4 points and White's second moves count 3 points each. If one White Second move secures more than one Black first move, then it will count only one point. Be most particular to number each move, and make it quite clear whether it is a Black or a White move.

"Short mates" in three moves and longer problems it often happens that some silly move of Black will permit a mate in two moves. Such short mates in no way upset the conditions, which insist that mate shall be given in not more than the specified number of moves. In other words, the solver has to meet the best offers of Black to escape mate. In this competition no points are given for short mates.

It is essential to write solutions on one side of the paper only, and to use a separate sheet for every problem. Your comments and criticisms are most welcome and will add much to the entertainment of the tournament.

G. Tanner remarks—"Must congratulate Fowler on a pleasing little effort." Yes, the key is good, for, despite the miniature theme, it gives Black a check and so prevents dual mates. The pinning and unpinning arrangement is splendid, and the effect is neat and crisp.

Send Singh also solved this, but missed the special pin in the device since he claims that 2. K1 is ineffective in every contingency. The "mate" named of course get White out of check otherwise is illegal.

### RACE RELATIONS COMMITTEE.

An invitation to Nairobi Chambers.

There was a variance of views at the monthly general meeting of the Nairobi Chamber of Commerce on Thursday afternoon, when consideration was given to an invitation from the Race Relations Committee to delegate two members to attend a meeting to be held in the Norfolk-Hotel at 5 p.m. on May 1st for the purpose of drafting a constitution for an organization which it is proposed to call the Native Affairs Board.

Several members queried the advisability of accepting the invitation, which was extended by Mr. E. E. Bine, honorary secretary of the Race Relations Committee, which was formed last year with a view to watching over the interests of the Natives in Kenya and inducing a wholesome and amicable relationship between the races in the Colony.

### Native Affairs Board.

In the letter of invitation it was mentioned that at a recent joint meeting of the Race Relations Committee and the standing committee of the Nairobi Association it had been decided that the time had arrived for the formation of a Native Affairs Board on a wider basis than that of the Race Relations Committee, and that the board should be fully representative and include all interested parties.

It was held by some of the members that the Chamber would be connected with such a body, particularly as a such a course might lead to it being involved in political matters affecting the Natives.

Two other members argued that the Chamber might be deeply interested in the work of the proposed board, and that whatever happened no harm would be done if the Chamber was represented at the inaugural meeting. It was pointed out that the representative need not commit the Chamber in any way.

Ultimately the meeting decided to thank the Race Relations Committee for the invitation, but to suggest that an invitation be sent to the Association of Chambers of Commerce on the 15th inst. to represent the whole Colony.

**Appreciation of Comedy.**  
On the comedy side a special word for Mr. Humphrey Slade in his second role as the Pedant, and Mr. D. J. Sobey as Grunnie, Petruchio's servant, and to P. ### SHARK SKINS WANTED.

A Possible New Industry for Kenya.

["STANDARD" CORRESPONDENT.]

London, April 10.  
The Montreal Chamber of Commerce frequently receives enquiries regarding products which may be manufactured in Kenya and successful inquiries take a queer form. For example, the Chamber has recently received, through the Provincial Commissioner, an enquiry regarding shark skins.

This enquiry emanates from H.M. Eastern African Dependencies, Cape Town in Zululand and according to the enquiry is a number of interesting questions illustrating the possibilities of coating and curing the skins while valuable hints are also given as regards the quality and kind of skins required by the market.

### Large Business.

"An extremely large business" says the letter from the Trade Commissioner's Office, "has been done in shark skins in the past, but it was never possible to obtain large quantities of regular supplies with the result that although the finished leather has been taken in bulk repeatedly, the needed stock was never there, and there were no supplies available which led to its being dropped altogether."

All power remains in the hands of the official side, which is completely unalterable or, in the words broadcast recently by Sir Edward Greig, 'a Dictatorship' (laughter). All we unofficials can do is to persuade the Government by sound reasoned argument, or other means (laughter) to listen to our views, and put them into force.

This did not cease them from devoting themselves to the problems of exploring the needs of the country and pressing on Government what they considered the right remedies. But still the responsibility for guiding Kenya through her troubles must remain with Government, and that responsibility could only be carried through successfully if it were based on some definite basis of mutual trust.

Tariffs and Quotas.

What was to be the policy of the Home Government to its overseas dependencies, which included the Dominions and the Colonies? For the last forty years their policy had been to encourage manufacturers but to discourage the production of all raw material, which they name or less undertook to receive.

Now, however, in addition to the Continental market being closed Great Britain herself was following an intensive policy of protection for any agricultural product by a system of tariffs, subsidies and quotas. The result was that she could no longer accept all the raw materials offered from the British overseas countries, and the quota system was hitting the Dominions pretty hard.

even though they did affect the main issue, they undoubtedly profited or lost—by the results of any new Empire policy as may be followed, especially when they relied on any question of playing about with the local currency, saving it would 'smash credit' although at the same time he said Kenya had no credit and so could not expect to borrow any more money on the London market. But that credit was not 'smashed' in 'The Times' of March 14th Kenya 41 per cent. Loan was quoted at 114; the same as the Gold Coast, South Africa and Southern Rhodesia. Had the Local Government any definite and determined plans for economic development in Kenya? Lord Francis who wondered when Governments would really realize that the Government of Kenya was not a Government in which everything in a country like this was built, was production. Unless the primary producer could carry on, and produce wealth from the soil, whether agricultural or mineral, every other thing else collapsed. For this reason it was absolutely essential that every means be taken to explore all the directions from which increased productive wealth can be achieved.

It has led us to Government, both here and in England that if we are met with obstruction and consequent difficulties then the people of this country will inevitably turn round and say, 'We are fed up with the form of Government, and must sweep away this bureaucracy and inaugurate our own affairs, cost what it may.' (Applause)

Lord Francis explained that the purpose of the meeting was to take the representatives of the people into contact with each other, so that united and together they might face their difficulties, overcome their obstacles, and win through to victory and the prosperity of this wonderful country of Kenya.

Consolidating Lord Francis trusted that everyone in the audience was to it in whatever way of life their business might be, that they would be very best to aim as well as possible towards the achievement of the country's welfare. (Applause)

London, April 20. (By Air Mail). The following are amongst the reports for the year 1923:

Accounts for 1923 of Lewis and Paul disclose a profit of \$4,392 for the previous year there was a loss of £2,217. The debt balance brought in has been reduced to £40,506. Mr. Herbert Ripley has accepted an invitation to join the board as a managing director.

Consolidated Diamond Mines at South-west Africa announces a net loss for 1923 of £97,708. After charging for depreciation, mining operations, which were suspended during 1922, have not been resumed.

Northern Maritime Insurance (controlled by Phoenix Assurance Co.)—Report for 1923 states that in marine department net premium was £18,467 and net claims £12,850. Net premium in fire departments totalled £18,023 and net claims £11,803. 65.04 per cent. of premiums, Expenses and commission amounted to £6,128 or 32.20 per cent. of premium. Fire dividend 15 per cent., making 30 per cent. (total).

Profit of United British Stores (Incorporated with Anglo-American Co.) for 1923 states that after all the year has been unproductive, sales have been well maintained. After other departmental expenses and taxation, was £3,792 (against £10,104, after Preference dividends and including reserves no longer required in previous years, adding £10,000 to the balance sheet from reserve fund £200,000 makes £41,822. Final dividend 3 per cent. on ordinary shares £2,350. Final dividend 3 per cent. on preference £1,262 making 10 per cent. (total). Dividend £12,710.

Plant Laid Up

Profit of United British Stores (Incorporated with Anglo-American Co.) for 1923 was £24,843 (against £20,510), and after deducting charges and laying-up expenses, there was a profit of £20,100 (against profit of £14,000) before credit brought in to £20,848. It has again been impossible to provide for any depreciation. Major portion of fleet continued to be laid up in order to avoid heavy trading losses as rates of freight were even lower than in 1922.

The British Thomson-Houston Company reports a decline in profits after the termination, from £202,215 for 1922 to £226,949 for 1923. Interest charges amount £20,005 (against £20,742) and £22,000 (against £24,982) is provided for depreciation of plant, furniture, and patents. The directors are unable to recommend a dividend on this ordinary shares (against 4 per cent. for 1922). The balance forward, after maintaining the Preference dividend being slightly higher at £220,448 (against £227,795). The balance-sheet shows floating assets at a total of £2,598,490, against current liabilities of £204,202, including reserves for contingencies.

Rhineland Corporation.

The directors of the Rhineland Corporation have declared a interim dividend of 5 per cent., less income tax, for the year ending July 31, 1924. This is a modest proposal.

The accounts for 1923 of Amalgamated Andriatic Collieries show trading profits, after providing for a total of subsidey compensation of £224,802. This compares with £220,200 for 1922. Trading conditions throughout the year, states the report, continued onerous, and

there was no improvement. Restrictions imposing the loss exchange of value were further accentuated, being difficult to maintain the volume in consecutive production.

The United British Stores Company reports a debit balance for the past year of £201, as compared with a credit of £19,000 for 1922. The balance to be carried forward increased will be reduced to £20,943, or, on last year, it has been impossible to provide for any depreciation.

Railway operating revenue in February totalled \$5,000,000, an increase of \$6,000,000. Net operating revenue for the month was \$1,640,000, or \$6,471,215, and net operating revenue for the year was \$24,000,442. For two months to end February net income rose to \$2,620,728 or \$8,700,728.

Accounts for 1923 show combined profits of \$11,120,464, after charges of \$12,000,000 for losses, \$5,818,403 for depreciation at usual cost and \$200,000 for abandonment of plant. Profits, after dividend on Preferred stock, were equal to \$4,700,000, or 100 per cent. against \$2.50 for previous year. Total dividend was \$1,000,000, a substantial increase in nearly all products during last half of year.

Woolston Commercial Assurance Society's statement in 1923 under new policies showed £2,200,000. Total income less premiums and interest was £2,000,000. Claims amounted to £1,000,000. Reversatory bonus in the ordinary department was at rate of £2 per cent. under endowment and rate of £2 1/2 per cent. under other policies. Amount of year amounted to £12,400,000.

The consolidated net loss of Trans-African Petroleum and Transport Company and its subsidiaries for 1923, after all charges, was \$7,219,137. This loss was due to the decline in the oil industry in the Trans-African part of the world. Current assets included cash, U.S. Government securities (of the value of \$1,000,000) and inventories of oil and products of \$1,149,355.

Property Losses

The staff and workpeople of Buxton and Sons, Limited, the Hull starch manufacturers, are to receive £127,000 under the firm's property losses scheme. A similar bonus was distributed last year. The directors report for the year ended December 31 last, shows that net profits amounted to £1,121,763.

Report of Norwich Union Fire Insurance Society for 1923 shows, profits and loss account balance brought in £414,896 (against £412,280) and £180,000 (against £180,000) credited from fire, accident and general and marine accounts. Interest and dividends amounted to £1,021,007 (against £1,045,000) net. After deducting dividend (20 per share for 1923) for fire accidents interest, directors' remuneration, carried forward, £414,896 is in excess of £1,021,007.

The dividend of the Royal Exchange Assurance is brought up to 20 per cent., which is one per cent. more than the 1922 dividend.

Well maintained profits are reported for the past year by A. and J. Franks, the soap-makers, the actual total showing a slight increase at £20,747 against £20,600. The dividend of 4 per cent. on the Cumulative Preference shares £12,000, and the 12 per cent. Cumulative Preferred Ordinary shares £20,600. The carry-forward to 1924, from £20,000 to £20,277.

A Cyle company's losses were revealed at the annual meeting of the Anchor Line (London) Trustees. The directors of the accounts showed a loss of £22,240, compared with a profit of £15,000 in 1922. A Golden Wedding at Navasha

CAPTAIN and Mrs. E. FEY.

TWO of Kenya's pioneers celebrated their Golden Wedding at Navasha last week. They are Capt. and Mrs. E. Fey, who were married at Navasha on Tuesday, April 17th. They celebrated a jubilee of almost thirty years of their old friends at their home at Njibini to celebrate the fiftieth anniversary of their wedding.

Capt. Fey had led a life full of adventure and varied interest. In early youth he joined a sailing fleet which plied to the West Coast of South America in the Cape Horn. Subsequently he went out to Australia where he held a commission in the Royal Victorian Navy, with which he served for a considerable time. He was then appointed Commander of one of the fine old India China Mail steamers which were at that time commonly known as the Optim Clippers.

After leaving the sea Capt. Fey turned his attention to ranching in Canada and took up land in Southern Alberta where he ran a fine herd of Shorthorn cattle. His ranch was at High River, and from there he might have stayed had it not been for the extreme cold of the Canadian winter. He decided to seek a warmer climate, and having heard of the attractions of British East Africa he and his wife and family left Canada and came to Kenya, travelling by Japan, China and the Straits Settlements, taking two years en route.

When he arrived in British East Africa in 1905 Nairobi was a collection of the shambles, the Norfolk Hotel and the National Bank of India being the only stone buildings in existence. From Nairobi he and his family eventually went to the coast and settled at Njibini, Kenya.

Capt. Fey has always taken a keen interest in the affairs of the country and has done much to help in the development of it today. He was the first President of the Kenya Farmers' Association, of which he was the first President. He is at present a member of the District Council and Town Committee. He has been a great supporter of cattle, his largest importation being twenty-three years ago and pedigree Shorthorns from Ireland which were sent right through from Dublin without the loss of a single animal.

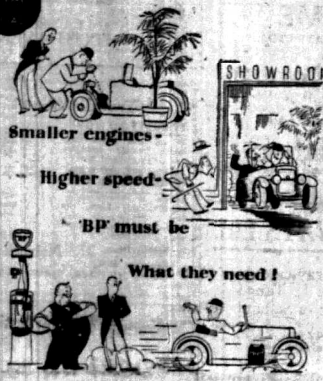

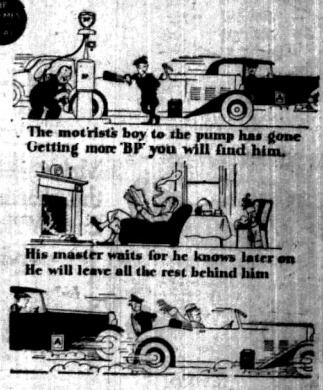

# NOTES FOR WIRELESS FANS

This paper, devoted to the interests of Wireless, is conducted by "Aerial," a licensed experimenter with a wide knowledge of East African conditions.

## An Aerial Development

In previous articles it has been shown that no useful purpose is served by the wire length of an antenna system beyond that of the wavelength which it is to receive, provided the antenna is supported vertically or horizontally. One of the difficulties arising out of this is the prevalence of a horizontal aerial, especially at the station time, depending upon the means of transmitting the energy picked up by it. The receiver without increasing the length of the aerial, would be placed 40 feet above ground and not subjected to a receiver level without using a good and not more than 60 feet of wire.

## "HETERODYNING."

### Just What It Means.

REFERENCE is made elsewhere to "heterodyning," and as the word may not convey much to those unacquainted with wireless forms, a little explanation may not out of place. Two high frequency oscillations are capable of forming together a "beat note" of audible frequency, the frequency of which is the difference between them.

It is thus possible for the carrier waves of two transmitting stations, if inductively separated to combine in such a way that a high pitched whistle is heard in the receiver when an attempt is made to tune to the station in question that said to heterodyne.

Use this as a guide in the super-heterodyne or superregenerative receiver where one of the inductively high frequency oscillations is locally generated to tune with the incoming oscillation. To form a third frequency called the "intermediate" frequency, still low frequency than either of the others. As a receiver it is too long. Try decreasing the total length including lead in to about 75 feet. This will reduce the signal strength somewhat but reception can then be used to restore it, simultaneously increasing selectivity. Should the signal still prove weak you will probably have to be content with less volume on a 40 feet aerial.

E.T.N. Mounassa, very kindly reports that conditions there are very good except for static, especially good results having been obtained from what on 10.67 meters now broadcasting from 5.30 to 11.30 p.m. local time. London on 10.5.5 metres is badly heterodyned as is 71.0 occasionally. He has used an A.C. unit of well known make in a superheterodyne circuit and performance is excellent.

Answer—Many thanks for your letter. Results from what have been reported the 10.67 and 10.68 are exceptional, good but before that in other areas. At the moment there is no heterodyning of G.S.B. but "L.D." is reported as having a "white" on its transmission which may also be a beat note with some station unknown.
