Principles of Taxation In Uganda.

B. BOURDILLON'S VIEW OF DUTY OF A GOOD GOVERNMENT.

Seeking Financial Security.

INCOME TAX PROBABLY PRACTICABLE EVEN IF KENYA DOES NOT HAVE IT.

The "East African Standard" enjoyed the unusual privilege, during the week-end of interviewing three East African Governors in Nairobi on one day.

The first interview, published below, was granted by H. E. Bernard Bourdillon, Governor of Uganda who explained the principles which guide his taxation policy.

He disagrees with the view that it is the duty of a good Government to reduce taxation. Rather is it the duty of a good Government "to make the proportion of taxation to taxable income as moderate as possible."

Even if Kenya repeals the non-Native Poll Tax, it does not rest in his view, that Uganda does so. Apart from revenue needs and the importance of tax as a security, the Uganda non-Native Poll Tax is an attempt to embody in its system some form of graduated direct non-Native taxation which will redress the balance between the African and other communities.

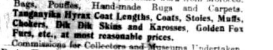

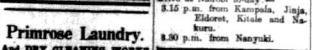

Women and Diplomatic Service

Eagerness to Serve in Outposts

In eleven countries women are employed in the Diplomatic Service. It is remarkable that Great Britain is not one of these countries and that France, the United States, Russia and many others have been allowed to take the lead in this direction.

The National Association of Women Civil Servants has submitted a memorandum to the Foreign Office Committee which is now considering the admission of women into Consular and Diplomatic posts. This memorandum states that women are capable of making good and several instances in important matters. They are already doing pioneer work in many remote and dangerous districts. Women Civil Servants are used to dealing with rough and unsmooth men, and that properly trained women should be capable of taking their share of all types of work.

In the question of rank, which comes within the domain of Consular in all parts of the world, a large proportion of foreign travel is connected with household necessities or goods for women's personal use. The memorandum continues: "We think that the officials who give evidence before the Royal Commission were not acquainted with the capabilities of the younger generation of women who to their education and independence of thought and outlook are eminently suited to work in the Diplomatic and Consular Services."

With reference to the objection that women would not be able to deal with native peoples without being treated as a "maid" the fact that an educated and trained person was the acknowledged representative of the British Government would have an undoubted influence on the development of backward races and would affect in particular the position of native women, which in many cases is a disgrace to civilization."

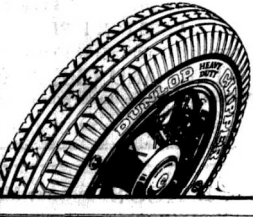

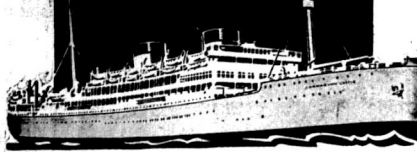

Shop Hours and also for the control of trading centres established on the outskirts of established towns. A Shop Hours Ordinance was still awaiting a Bill and recently has passed to control trading centres outside the limits of towns and in those it should regulate and generally make the provisions more suitable.

The most outstanding piece of legislation passed during the year under review is, as far as it affects commercial interests, the "Bank Scales Ordinance." The Ordinance which closely followed a Canadian legislation on the subject was passed at the request of and after consultation with this Chamber. It was designed to prevent fraudulent sales of business by the disposal of business from substantially the whole of their assets other than the current assets of business. The Ordinance provided an inexpensive and satisfactory method of dealing with debtors as an alternative to insolvency proceedings.

During the year the English law relating to Partnerships and also the Bills of Exchange Act, 1908, as enacted as Ordinances in the Province, similar to the one in England. English Acts. Provisions had been made for the appointment of a judicial officer, of real time as a result of representation made by this Chamber. An Ordinance relating to Electricity Lights and Power supply has been made. It is hoped that the Ordinance will be a boon to the Province of a light and power project.

Railways and Harbours. In regard to railways and harbours the year called for considerable little commerce. The decrease in revenue had been noted in the Uganda notes just short of 100,000 shillings and this with a large export of wool had not only enabled the railways to balance its budget but also to provide something towards wiping out past deficits. The decrease however continued and from the import returns of the customs of the Province, the railways must be dependent on the more extensive export of goods to which it looked for relief.

Much the same conditions after the Harbour. Further economies have been made but have again we feel been made at the expense of maintenance. The large cotton crop helped the Port considerably in getting much more of a balanced budget and the loss was expected that the Province in the near future and that the recent increase in what was already very high rates for a Port would be abolished.

There had been considerable discussions about arrangements of lines and also about weights at the port and the Committee hoped it would be possible to come to some satisfactory arrangements with the port authorities regarding these. Quite a number of minor changes in the rates were made. The report stated that the Committee was very doubtful whether the bulk of those were justified and considered that those were handled in the future for general increase in rates and had generally increased owing to the long haul. Uganda notes were not of any considerable

The prospects were again for a bumper crop in 1934 and final forecasts would not be far short of the 1933 record. The better crop should mean more imports from the Railway and the Port. Native Crops. Coffee. This was the second most important crop produced by the Province of Uganda. During the year about 1,000 tons of coffee were produced from the Province. The coffee was marketed under the Buganda Coffee Scheme. The coffee grown in Ankole was chiefly marketed in the Province. It was impossible at the present time to estimate what the actual crop was but it was of the order of 1,000 tons. The main reason for this was the increase owing to a large area of new coffee planted annually. The main crop was 2,500 tons. Groundnuts. During the year Government tried the experiment of growing cash crops by the Province of Uganda but owing to the failure of the crop, it was not possible to discover whether the scheme was successful or not. As the Government was desirous of promoting the production of an economic crop in the Eastern Province, it is a stand-by to cotton. It was hoped that this crop would be successful during 1934. Given average weather conditions, there was no reason why this district of Uganda should not produce 10,000 tons annually in a very short space of time.

Chilies. The price of this produce was never very high during 1933 and consequently the production was small. The natives only cultivated and picked this crop in quantities when prices had risen over 20 cents per lb. Uganda, as the picking of chilies was not an important task.

Sisal. Owing to the failure of the rains, this crop was planted with the idea of growing a vegetable crop, especially suitable for Uganda and the prospects of a valuable industry are bright.

Rubber. The negotiations which have been carried on for some years between the various rubber interests in the East had now reached a point at which there was some hope of agreement. This hope was reflected in the rise in the price of the commodity and the fact that the price had risen to a point higher than for several years. It was stated that some estates in Uganda were about to resume tapping, but unless the price reached about 1d. was not likely that Uganda exports would be of any considerable

size. The rubber in Uganda scattered over a large number of small estates, varying from 500 acres or more down to a few acres could not be worked as economically as large blocks, and this was a serious drawback to a central factory.

In a Sessional Paper. DIFFERENTIATION BETWEEN FUTURE ENTRANTS AND THOSE ALREADY SERVING.

Legislative Council yesterday debated the proposals for a European Local Civil Service as laid down in a Sessional Paper, embodying the recommendations of the Civil Service Board appointed by the Governor in Council in December 1932.

In this report salary scales are laid down ranging from £600 per annum for the lowest grade clerical officers to £900 per annum which is the maximum suggested for any attention will be free to officers and their families. There will be no pensions but in substitution a Provident Fund, contribution to which will be compulsory.

The Colonial Secretary moving that the proposals be approved pointed out that the original problem of making regulations for future entrants had been complicated by the fact that it was now proposed to make the Service suitable for the transfer to it of officers already serving.

the age of 60 years at the time the passage is taken.

Quarters.—Not a rental shall be charged for Government quarters at the rate of five per cent of the actual salary when the salary drawn does not exceed £200 per annum, and seven and a half per cent of the actual salary when the salary exceeds £200 per annum, but not exceeding £200 per annum, of 10 per cent when the Government is obliged to provide quarters.

Medical Attention.—Free to officers and their families the use of facilities on the ground of the present system as applied to the case of the Overseas Service, being modified in certain respects by a doctor and accommodation in Government hospitals for families of officers to be charged for at such rates as may be laid down in the Code of Regulations from time to time.

Pensions.—None, but in substitution of a Provident Fund—compulsory contribution by a male officer at the rate of five per cent of his annual salary and by a female officer at the rate of seven and a half per cent of her annual salary. Married female officers, other than widows—not to contribute.

Gratuities at the rate of one week's salary for each completed year of service after continuous satisfactory service of not less than 15 years.

Age of Retirement.—In accordance with the Colonial Administrative Service (Retirement) Act, normal age 55 years—no case later than 60 years with a modification that in the case of women the age of retirement to be reduced by 5 years.

Conditions of Transfer.—The report includes suggested terms and conditions for officers serving on agreement who, on January 1, 1933 had not completed six years continuous Colonial Service and also terms and conditions of transfer to the new Service of officers serving on agreement who, on January 1, 1933 had completed six years continuous Colonial Service.

Pensionable Rights.—The Governor in Council further recommended that, in the event of officers who are on a pensionable basis, or who will be granted pensionable status in accordance with the foregoing

recommendations, being selected for promotion to posts attached to the Local Civil Service, corresponding to posts at present carrying pensionable status, their pensionable rights and other privileges at present attached to their service, and, as an arrangement personal to themselves, enter the salary scale laid down in the existing regulations for the pensionable service. It will thus be seen that for a considerable time to come the parallel terms and conditions of service will be those of the Local Civil Service. This is unavoidable at certain officer's reasonable expectations of service are to be maintained. The number of such cases will, however, gradually diminish and in course of time disappear altogether.

The proposal outlined in this paper is the outcome of the most detailed examination of terms and conditions of service of an European Local Civil Service Board, and finally by the Government. They are now submitted in an concise form possible for the approval of the Legislative Council.

COUNCIL DEBATE.

Proposing the resolution that the motion for the inauguration of the Service be approved, the Colonial Secretary announced that the House that the question had been considered exhaustively by a series of committees. The Financial Committee, which reported in October, 1933, the Merrick Committee, which reported in October, 1933, since when there had been the four interim reports by the Civil Service Board during 1933. Those reports had been summarized in the previous paper, in accordance with the pledge given by Government to Mr. F. J. O. O'Connell, a member of the last Council that when Government had formulated its final proposals, the Legislative Council would give a full opportunity of consideration and advising them. Hence the present motion. Had Government been merely concerned, he continued, explaining the delay in dealing with the underlying issue of the Financial Committee to formulate terms for a Local Service and applying them to future recruits, the matter would have been a comparatively simple one. But as time went on and as the financial depression raged, Government were impressed with the need of reducing recurrent expenditure if it could be done without hardship and injustice to the serving officers. The problem therefore developed from the simple one of future entrants into one of seeing whether a Local Service could also be made suitable for transfer to it of serving officers. Another difficulty was the possibility of going back to the additional posts to overseas pensionable establishments would be made without reference at least to the Council. The result was that many officers who in accordance with the original practice came out on a four years agreement with a reasonable hope that, provided their service was satisfactory their appointments would be confirmed and made pen-

tionable, were kept in suspense. When, therefore, Government came to consider the question of who should not form part of the Local Service, they were confronted with the problem of having many officers on agreement who did not fall into the same category. Hence the inauguration of this Service had been complicated matter.

Scale of Salaries.

Turning to the Seasonal Paper, the Colonial Secretary explained that, in regard to the scale of salaries in Appendices I and II for clerical and non-clerical posts, that they had been revised by the Civil Service Board after a very full examination. At the same time, however, the work of those earlier committees as having been of the greatest value in the differentiation between the salaries for men and women. The latter being somewhat lower than those of men on a comparable scale, although at home the salaries were to be maintained both for men and women. The scale of salaries for non-clerical posts, one or two minor modifications might be required and so forth to the proposals were submitted to the Legislative Council. The Colonial Secretary emphasized that the general principle of these salaries had been accepted by the Government and that there was no intention of asking the Council to pass any resolution that day and then later raising them to 50 per cent of what was said to be a minor change, and when introduced, the estimates, the opportunity would be given the Council of examining them.

Leave Conditions.

Turning to leave passages, the Colonial Secretary pointed out the differences between the different provisions regarding leave, and explained that the basic underlying principle for the Local Service was that it was not essential for local people to go home for leave every two or three or four years. At the same time, it was suggested that apart from health reasons, which might exist in some cases, it might be desirable for those officers to have the opportunity of going home for leave, provided their services were satisfactory.

to time. It was so arranged, however, that normally an officer would not go on leave until the fourth year, but if for any reason he wished to earlier, he could be proportionately. Furthermore, unless he served four years the same percentage allowance of £25 would not be available. With regard to quarters, normally none was to be provided. Medical attention was to be provided to an officer and his family. It was considered that as the light of the low rate of salaries provided plus the contribution to the President Fund to be established, and to the Widow and Orphan Scheme, this concession was not unreasonable. The Government had been urged by the Medical Department that the economies if any effected in the departmental side by the elimination of the private pay would be very little. No provision was to be provided, because of the President Fund to which contributions were compulsory. The Government Secretary's next dealt with the question of officers now in the Service, and the transfer to the Local Service as contained in the Seasonal Paper starting that he thought the proposals were fair and that the number who could be transferred was approximately seven per cent of the total of 220 officers. That means that at present and for some time to come other than those going to recruit direct from home for the Local Service or those who would take up, as has frequently been done, people who have to Kenya for one reason or another but who were not locally born, Kenyan and incorporate them in the Service, it was therefore not unreasonable to have made some provision for leave for those whose homes could not be present. Electoral Members last year that they accepted those taxes on behalf of the Colony, on the distinct understanding that they would operate for a period of two years only, to give effect to the same while the opportunity of balancing the budget and would then be withdrawn. That understanding was accepted by Government, which was shown by the fact that the Bills themselves provided for their demise at the end of 1934. Moreover, the late Attorney-General, in moving the introduction of these Bills, made it clear that they were only temporary measures.

"When I went to my constituent last year, that I had been elected, Members wish to make it quite plain that they have not retreated from the position they took on last year and that they hold that it would be unwise to operate, as from the end of 1934 and that in place of the present Ordinance, the former Bill Tax Ordinance, which was repealed, by the present Ordinance should be brought into force. Elected members therefore should be made known to Government at the earliest possible moment and that Government should agree to the introduction of the former Bill for 1935.

The statement by Lord Francis Scott of the fact that the Select Committee, which had been appointed to inquire into the matter for last year and this year, had reported that the Government should be asked to consider the additional expense involved in such a request to the Income Tax Officer, Government has understood had taken the same Government's attitude.

Although the temporary character of certain of the alternative taxation measures in Kenya is established by the terms of the legislation, Government is unable to state whether or not it may be found necessary, in printing the bill of 1934, to amend the Bill of 1933.

This statement was made during the course of a reply to a question put to Government, contained in a Legislative Council debate, the Hon. J. B. Pandya who asked: "Will the Government give an assurance to the House that the Alternative Revenue Measures introduced last year, on temporary and emergency measures, and that before any change of a permanent nature, an alternative committee will be appointed to consider the whole fiscal system of this country with a view to making taxation equitable on all contingencies."

The Colonial Secretary replied as follows: "The temporary character of certain of the Alternative Revenue Measures is expressly safeguarded in the form of the legislation enacting them, which falls to expire at the close of the current year. It is not possible to state definitely whether or not it may be found necessary or desirable to prolong the life of any or all of these measures in order to meet the present as well as the future needs of the Government, but it is a consideration of the Government's duty to consider the whole fiscal system of this country, in the manner proposed by the Hon. Member."

NO NEW CASES REPORTED FOR OVER A MONTH.

Lymph Dispatched by Air.

TWO HUNDRED THOUSAND VACCINATIONS CARRIED OUT.

There was a total death toll of 470 out of a total of 1,405 cases in the recent smallpox outbreak in Kenya.

Twice during the course of the campaign against the outbreak, vaccine was sent to the Tana River by air.

Thanks to the thorough and expeditious manner in which the Medical Department had dealt with the outbreak, said the Colonial Secretary in Legislative Council yesterday, no new cases had been reported for over a month.

Protected Belts.

Details of the small pox belt in the Northern and Coast Provinces of Kenya were given by the Colonial Secretary in yesterday's sitting of the Legislative Council.

It was stated that the outbreak was reported from the Tengeru area on January 13, and on the 16th a medical officer accompanied by a European vaccinator, staff nurse, left Nairobi for Lamu and the Tana River. The outbreak had reached considerable proportions by the time the small belt was reported, and owing to the fact that the infection was being transported by the river, it was necessary to have a wide belt.

On two occasions, namely on January 14, 1924, and on January 15, 1924, 845 cases with 229 deaths on the Tana River, and 1,405 cases with 470 deaths on the Tana River, were vaccinated. The majority of vaccinations were carried out along the Somali and the Tana rivers, and in the Lamu, Malindi and Kilifi districts. Lamu and Malindi with 129 cases, Kilifi with 123 cases, and the Tana River with 53 cases and seven deaths.

Intensive vaccination campaigns were also instituted in all the districts to the west of the river, which was threatened by lines of

travel from the coast. The river and the Northern Province, the ordinary medical staff being recruited from four European and five African medical officers. As a result, the vaccine was long protected belts in the Kilifi and Mory districts, and around Lamu, Malindi, etc.

EDUCATION TO BE COMPULSORY.

Advisory Council's Recommendations.

FUTURE POLICY.

For Kenya's Increasing European Population.

Lord Francis Burt, East Valley, had given notice of his intention to bring forward a Bill in the House of Commons on the following question:—Has the Advisory Council on European Education made any recommendations in favour of compulsion on the subject of the education of European children and if so, what Government action is contemplated in the light of the recommendations?

The Director of Education and the Advisory Council on European Education have considered the question and the Director of Education has advised the Advisory Council on European Education that he is unable to recommend any Government action in the matter.

The Advisory Council on European Education has considered the question and has recommended that the Government should consider the possibility of making the education of European children compulsory.

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Activities of Population.

At present the European population is engaged in the following activities:—Administrative, Nursing, Teaching, and Government Service generally including the Judiciary, which latter, however, has been much recruited from overseas, but which in an increasing extent are affording opportunities to local recruits, agriculturists, both crop and animal husbandry.

with a tendency towards minor farming, commercial and distributive services generally; mining; professional.

The presence of a very large supply of cheap labour makes it impossible to absorb the European labour force in the unskilled labouring class. It is essential that the position in whatever sphere of industry should be the highest possible one commensurate with the capacity. It would be generally accepted that capacity and intelligence can in the main be best developed by an efficient general education though it must not be considered that we can provide from the term general education the practical training which comes in an integral part of such education.

Foundations of Policy.

That being so, the foundations of our policy must be the provision of the facilities for general education. The question arises whether the facilities can be provided on a self-sufficient basis.

At present the Government has established a number of primary schools and two secondary schools in addition to those Government schools there is a considerable number of private schools. These figures call for reflection. The age of admission for the course for two sub-standards. In Standard III, the average work of the class takes a year, as indicated by the ages. In Standard IV, the age improves a little.

Preliminary Examination.

The age in Standard VI shows a marked increase. A report is expected to be issued in a few days, instead of which it is over 15. The extension of the standard VI is the class in which the Government Primary Examination is taken, and it is a criterion of the number of pupils who fail at the end of the year. 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Regular Attendance.

The outstanding necessities therefore are:—The securing of regular attendance at school, and provision to enable boys and girls to proceed without difficulty to a commercial education beyond the Primary Stage.

Compulsory Education.

Under the present arrangements provision exists for the admission and retention of free in the case of those who are unable to pay fees. The Council is therefore of the opinion that there is no need for compulsory education, and that provision should be imposed between the ages of 7 years, and 16 years, provided that the Director of Education has issued instructions not to enforce compulsion in the case of children under the age of 8 years, whose attendance at school involves boarding.

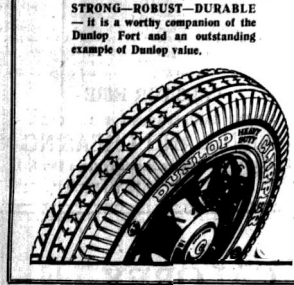

time. This, he claimed, would not cause a plaintiff to suffer any hardship in the long run.

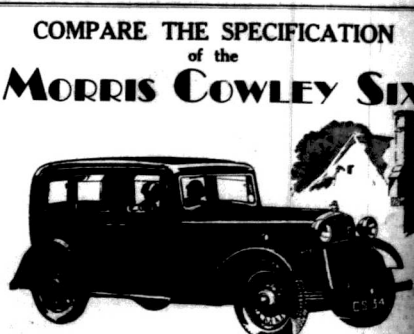
