

U.S. Vietnam withdrawal may start in August

South Vietnamese forces may begin receiving U.S. and allied troops in August, President Lyndon B. Johnson told a press conference in Dallas at the weekend.

Mr. Johnson said that the present military situation was "very good" and that the South Vietnamese troops were ready to begin receiving a number of allied contingents by August.

He said that the head of the U.S. Pacific Command, Gen. Paul H. Ryan, had not responded to the news.

He said he had asked Ambassador Paul Durgan Lam, who had returned to Saigon to report on the subject of the first 15 negotiators.

He said that a question about the possibility of a withdrawal from Vietnam would be asked at the press conference.

Air pioneer's niece heads transatlantic air race

The great transatlantic air race started yesterday when the niece of Sir John Alcock, the air pioneer, darted out of London's Post Office tower headed for New York's Empire State Building, via tube, car, chartered flight and helicopter.

But Miss Anne Alcock, aged 18, is not given much chance of winning the fastest time prize in the £260,000 contest organised by the Daily Mail to celebrate the first transatlantic crossing 50 years ago by her uncle and Arthur Brown.

Miss Alcock's chartered flight was not due to leave until noon, but she took off at 10.30, accompanied by a pilot and a navigator.

Some 300 competitors are entered in the race which offers 21 prizes totalling £260,000, including awards for the fastest times in either direction and for the most economical ways of getting there.

More than 100 entrants were scheduled to leave London yesterday, but many were to take scheduled flights.

Emergency repairs were under way aboard the stricken French liner Tahiti yesterday in an effort to make her seaworthy enough to continue her voyage to Tahiti and Australia.

The vessel, with 418 passengers and 147 crew on board, was 600 miles south-west of Panama City on Saturday when a serious fire broke out in the engine room. Passengers and crew escaped uninjured.

Captain R. Dhermain radiogrammed yesterday that, if repairs to the ship's generator and engines were successful, then the Tahiti would continue her voyage. But it might be necessary to spare parts out to the vessel.

Another French ship in the area, the Marquis de Lafayette, agreed to tow the Tahiti to the Canal Zone at Balboa in the event of a successful repair. The Marquis de Lafayette will arrive on the scene today.

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Migrants angry at U.K.

Leaders of Britain's immigrant organisations have attacked the Government's new entry permit rules as a disguised attempt to curb immigration.

In a letter of protest to the Home Office, Mr. Marilyn Rees, the immigrant associations, among them the Joint Council for the Welfare of Immigrants, denied a claim made yesterday in the House of Commons on Thursday by the Home Secretary, Mr. James Callaghan.

According to Mr. Callaghan, the obligation to get entry certificates before setting out is designed to end hardship while qualifications are checked at British ports.

But the associations say that permits are nearly impossible to obtain before embarkation, even when prospective immigrants have the qualifications for entry.

The latest comment was by the chairman of the Committee of the Unity of Pakistan, Mr. Akram Malik, was: "Under the new rules the suffering of people in Britain will become insupportable."

Mr. Wilson under fire

The strength of the demand inside the Labour Party for Mr. Wilson to go is difficult to gauge. The wave of despondency is said to be the greatest since the Premier came to power. But when the position is examined more closely it is obvious that for his headstrong but basically the defence of the malcontents in British industry they are not their motives with well-rounded phrases about the sacred rights and freedoms of the workers but basically they fall into two groups: those who feel the same way as the Communist shop stewards but those who are coming from a small number of left-wing hatched men. They are noted for their lack of loyalty to the party when they fail to achieve their way and, though they make a tremendous noise, they represent a minority view.

More powerful in the long run are people like the Labour Chief Whip, Mr. Mellish, who said at the weekend that Mr. Wilson was secure. "There is no other contender for the post," he added in an unintended but devastating commentary on the paucity of present-day British political leadership.

Mr. James Callaghan, the man most often tipped to succeed Mr. Wilson, also came out in his own defence claiming that the leadership of the Labour Party had never been decided by a small group of plotters. The Tory paper yesterday tried to make out that because Mr. Callaghan had been elected by the democratic vote of Labour M.P.s in a full party meeting he was out of question. This is making Mr. Callaghan out to be another Machiavelli and the thinking is so devious as to carry little weight.

The Tory Press in general has been enjoying itself at Mr. Wilson's expense for the last few days and it is perhaps significant that almost all Britain's leading newspapers chose to splash the "Wilson must go" stories on the same day. Could they have been inspired by someone at the Conservative Central Office?

Mr. Wilson has long shown his contempt for the extremists in his party. This has naturally not endeared him to them but the main reason why they have their knives out now is his attempt to bring a little discipline into the industrial and economic scene in Britain.

His move to outlaw the continual wildcat strikes in factories essential to the export drive, such as those of the car firms, has brought a reaction which shows many of them in their true light.

When a Communist shop steward persuades workers to strike against the advice of their union it is accepted that he is trying to bring about a change in which revolution can flourish.

When people who are supposed to be responsible Members of Parliament advise their constituents to strike against the advice of their union it is accepted that he is trying to bring about a change in which revolution can flourish.

This attack on Mr. Wilson's critics should not be construed as a defence of him. Far from it. To outside observers it has long been obvious that he should go as a party politician but as a statesman he is a non-starter.

A couple of weeks ago A.K.K. Teleshov showed a film on Mr. Wilson made about six years ago when he was still Lord of the Dapin. The contrast with the man of today could not have been more marked. He has then at the height of his popularity, running rings at the schoolboy abuse level round his opponents and firmly in charge of his own party.

Today nobody loves him, nobody believes him and if a General Election were called almost nobody would vote for him.

As far as controlling his enemies in his own party are concerned the threat of a General Election is Mr. Wilson's main weapon. He has the right to dissolve Parliament and if he did so the Labour Party would be in the wilderness for years to come, despite the low-calibre leadership of the Conservatives. So he is likely to survive the present crisis in his ranks.

Yesterday he made a strong appeal for unity and pledged that his Government would not be diverted from its task by petty divisions. For his country's sake as well as his own it is to be hoped that he will keep this promise.

If by some strange chance he fails to survive his downfall will be more than a little ironic. For years his critics have been accusing him of not running the country. Now he is under fire for trying to do it.

OBITUARY

Dr. Zakir Husain

Dr. Zakir Husain, who died on Saturday, became the first Muslim President of predominantly Hindu India in May 1967.

The soft-spoken scholar, whose hobby was collecting fossils, devoted many years to developing India's National Museum University, but also served as Governor of Bihar State and Vice-President of India before being elected President.

Born on February 8, 1897, at Hyderabad, he graduated from the Muslim Anglo-Orignal College in Aligarh and later studied in Germany and the U.S.A. He travelled widely in Europe and America.

The influence of Mahatma Gandhi, a Hindu, was profound on him as an educationist. He helped to set up the Jamia Millia Islamia, the Muslim University, which opened in Aligarh in 1920. He and guided its new laws in education for 22 years.

He was fluent in Persian, Urdu, English and German. He was elected President of the Indian National Congress in 1955.

Condolences

Telegrams of condolences from world leaders have been pouring into Delhi. The West German President, Dr. Heinrich Lübke, cabled that Dr. Husain "personified the best tradition of the Indian spirit allied to a profound familiarity with Western culture."

The Soviet Premier, Mr. Nikita Khrushchev, cabled the death of Dr. Husain, "an eminent statesman from friendly India, a humanist and militant for peace and progress, will remain forever with the Yugoslav people."

The Pakistani leader, Gen. Yahya Khan, expressed "great and deep regret" and said that India had lost a "greatly respected leader."

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Once again trouble has broken out in Rhodesia's long-suffering University College. The college is in fact the only entirely non-racial educational institution in Rhodesia, apart from some of the better private schools. It is an island of what could be said to be an ocean of prejudice and hatred.

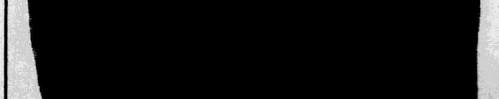

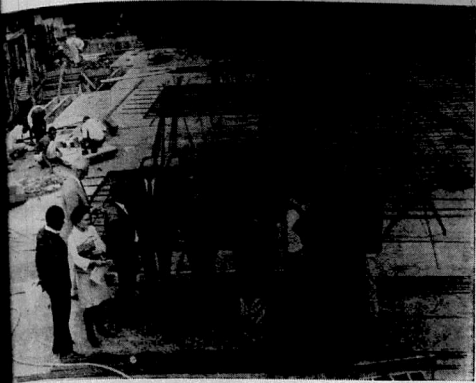

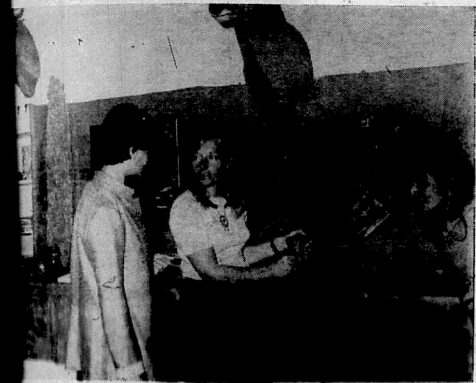

Tributes to Dr. Husain

On behalf of the Kenya nation, President Kenyatta paid tribute to Dr. Zakir Husain as an outstanding educationalist and servant of his people. This is how the character of the late President of India will go down in his country's history, for he followed in the scholarly and philosophical tradition of Dr. Radhakrishnan.

Moreover, he will be remembered as the first Muslim President of a predominantly Hindu country. Heads of Governments or their representatives from many, if not most, countries of the world are attending the solemnities associated with the funeral.

The grave is in the gardens of the Jamia Millia Islamia, the Muslim University which Dr. Husain helped to found in New Delhi, and of which he was Vice-Chancellor for the 23 years between 1926 and 1948.

During that period, which covered the transition to independence, he took a leading part in guiding the country's new thinking on education. As he had been impressed by Gandhi's teachings, so his own influence flowed out to the intellectuals, deeply affecting the progress of the campaign for independence from the British Raj, and subsequently, on political economies. He completed almost exactly two years of his five-year presidential term.

His election as India's first Muslim President was in itself a great tribute to his qualities of mind and leadership. Just as this disproved religious intolerance, could it be that the choice of his successor will 'disprove' social and political discrimination?

A veteran member of Congress, Mr. R. Govind Das, has publicly suggested Mr. Agiyvan Ram as the party's candidate. Mr. Ram is the Minister for Food and Agriculture.

The retiring Allied Supreme Commander, Gen. Lyman L. Lemnitzer, has warned that Russia and its European Communist partners posed as great a threat now as when Nato was first formed 20 years ago. He said the Soviets had coupled their enormous conventional warfare capability with a massive modern capability and modernisation of their forces was continuing steadily. 'The Soviet Union, together with its Warsaw Pact partners, constitutes as great a threat as the one that Treaty was signed 20 years ago in Washington,' he said.

Ottawa not worried by resignation

Gen. de Gaulle's resignation was noted in Ottawa with relative indifference, the Canadian Prime Minister, Mr. Trudeau, said in a television interview on Sunday night. 'Relations between France and Canada should be good,' he added. 'They were good in the past and they ought to be in future. Governments change, but the important thing is that Canadians want to have good relations with France.'

The government's plan was designed to 'break the whole intricate system of collective bargaining that we have built up in this country.' 'If we have a number of wildcat strikes, an out-of-work and the Government will be wrong.

The guards fired two warning shots in the air, but this only brought more threatening shouts from the crowd, who demanded the release of another youth who had been detained.

Chief Justice quashes defilement conviction

A young man found guilty of defiling a girl of 12 and sentenced to 12 months imprisonment with 24 strokes by a magistrate in February, yesterday had his conviction quashed by Chief Justice M. K. Mwaoga.

The magistrate's court, the Chief Justice said, the appellant had given an alibi that he was first at his mother's house at Mchikanda and then at Sericho Hall between 5.45 p.m. and 9.30 p.m. while the incident had been committed by 7.30 p.m.

The magistrate had rejected his evidence on the ground that he had called no witnesses from his mother's house or from the Sericho Hall.

The Chief Justice said it had become a rule of practice, almost amounting to a rule of law, that a statement by a girl of tender years relating to a sexual offence against her required corroboration

by two reliable, steady, established, and, secondly, independent witnesses.

He said the appellant had been implicated after being identified by the girl at an identification parade and the same was established by a doctor who examined the girl.

However, facts differed and it was impossible to categorise facts as true or false.

He said the appellant had given such evidence, it was for the court to call witnesses, not the mother or relatives from his mother's house and persons from the Sericho Hall and persons from the Sericho Hall.

If the alibi had been brought in at an earlier stage, it would have given the prosecution an opportunity to look into its genuineness.

Prosecution could have asked for an adjournment for the purpose of inquiring into its genuineness and the magistrate, being satisfied that the prosecution was surprised by the advance grant of an adjournment, he said.

For these reasons they allowed the appeal, quashed the conviction and set aside the sentence.

Housewives unhappy with new knitting wool

Kenya can be proud of herself. Local industries are manufacturing products that are as good as any made overseas and at the same time are contributing to Kenya's expanding economy. The housewife can now buy tinned foods, detergents and household articles of all types made locally and know that their quality will warrant a place in her home. There is no cause for her to lower her standards in order to "buy Kenyan". But there are bound to be some regrettable exceptions. No housewife is going to put the ideal of "buying Kenyan" before the interests of her family so if a product fails to come up to the mark the shopper returns to her old and trusted brand. Competition is vital in ensuring a high standard and for years in Kenya products from manufacturers of repute have been available. These brands act as a gauge by which Kenya's own products can be judged and should only be eliminated from the market when their quality is equalled by the local product. If a local product is first-class it should go well with its introduction to the market, but when it causes dissatisfaction there is obviously something wrong. Judging by general opinion therefore, is something wrong with the hand-knitting wool which is being imported. The supply of Emu, Patons and other excellent brands of wool is petering out in Nairobi and as their import is now restricted the local

brand will soon take over the market. Complaints have come from many quarters where knitting wool is an important commodity. After a recent investigation, the Housewife's Consumer Organisation has found that the quality of the wool leaves much to be desired and, even more important, the women who earn a living from knitting machines are not happy. According to Mrs. Wambui Fredrick, spokesman for a number of small knitting concerns along the backstreets of Nairobi, at least five of these small businesses have closed down, or taken up other lines such as dressmaking, because they are not happy with the new wool. These businesses, each employing several women, used a Dutch brand of wool almost exclusively, as it was cheap and of good quality. The very cheapest local wool is more expensive by about 25 cts an ounce, even after its price was lowered recently, and falls short of expectation when it is knitted up and washed. Mrs. Fredrick showed me two knitted sleeves of a pullover: one knitted from the Dutch wool and the other from local. The difference was not obvious until the two pieces were compared closely, but even though the two wools were the same ply, there were "holes" between the stitches of the local wool while the other had a close, bulky texture. "We cannot adjust the tension on the machine enough to get a close knit with this wool," Mrs. Fredrick complained. "We would like to support the local wool—if it were cheaper and had better quality."

Down Gurdwara Road I spoke to Mrs. Mary Wangari, who had used the new wool. "After washing a pullover made of it, it shrunk," she said. After this experience Mrs. Wangari started using another brand of imported wool which up to now has been rejected by the knitters, the local brand. But stocks are running short, and Mrs. Wangari now takes in dressmaking in an increasing quantity. "My customers will not waste their money buying pullovers of that quality." It is surprising, therefore, that the manufacturers of the new wool seem so confident with their product though I suppose restriction of competing brands makes the future brighter for them. The intention is to produce the country's entire knitting wool requirements and replace the hundreds of varieties and shades of wool that were available in the past. However, I notice the manufacturers claim that half of the full range that will be produced is now already available. It seems therefore that knitters will have to be content with a very small "full" range. The claim that the new wool is as good as any of imported varieties seems to be a debatable one. The last argument in the case of quality is what the wool expert thinks. Wool that has been tested to international quality standards and approved of by the International Wool Secretariat is always bears the Woolmark symbol on the ball band, which is a stylized sheep. I noticed the familiar ball of wool symbol on any of the local wool so far.

Plan made to unify group activities

Miss Nolege David put forward the suggestion that the group should have a joint committee to combine in efforts to help to secure funds to pay for the accommodation for secondary school girls. Another suggestion called for the issue of a calendar that one fundraising activity would not coincide with another on the same day. One suggestion put forward by Mrs. Likitani was that the organisations should hold a joint meeting in the future. One of the organisations to be formed for the purpose was the Association of Women's Clubs, which would provide the link between the various groups.

Germany's First Lady retiring

The Federal Republic of Germany's First Lady is about to end her decade in office. Frau Wilhelmine Lübke has been very much a working partner of her husband, the President, and in many ways her capacities have complemented his. When Frau Lübke leaves the Presidential residence, the Villa Hammerschmidt, with her husband on June 30, she will almost surely receive warm tributes even from those who have found occasion to criticise her. For, although Frau Lübke marked her 84th birthday this week she has given to the difficult office of First Lady the energy of many much younger women who would envy.

Frau Lübke's father was Herr Otto Keuthen, an employee of a mining firm in Rammbeck, a town in the region of Germany called the Saarland. He died early. His widow and her children moved to Münster. The second-eldest child was Wilhelmine. She wanted to become a teacher. She studied mathematics, German and philosophy. As a young teacher in Berlin she attended social functions sponsored by a Berlin club of people who called themselves the "Presidential Friends". They both loved music. They both wanted a violin. They found the only way of pooling their money could they afford one. This they did. "But what is going to happen if one of us marries?" asked Herr Lübke. "The other gets to keep the violin for in 1929 both decided to marry—each other. Today Frau Lübke tells her friends: "My husband says to this day that for him the violin is the dearest factor."

Frau Lübke's job, like that of the President, has been to preside at the Cabinet Ministers, articles of the Federal Republic of Germany, at home and abroad. Representation, she discovered early, while it often involves ceremonial duties, can be far from entertaining. It is hard work, she says, calling for patience and discipline.

The First Lady has not only taken her duties seriously, she has taken on some extra chores voluntarily. She is a member of an association to aid mothers, another for the elderly and in a community service group called the "Mother's Club". Her mail averages 200 letters a day. "Fixed working times are impossible in this kind of life. My husband and I even are busy on Sundays. Urgent correspondence comes home to be gone over and taken care of."

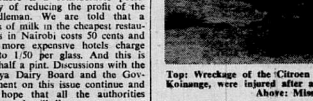

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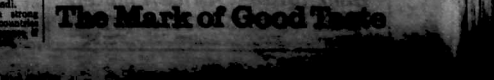

CALENDAR CONTEST PROMOTING TALENT
 Standard Staff Reporter
 Esso's calendar competition had grown from a humble beginning to become a permanent and important feature of the year, the Mayor of Nairobi, Coun. Isaac Lugonzo, said yesterday evening when he opened the exhibition of entries at the City Hall.
 In 1955 there had been only 88 entries from the whole of East Africa whereas there were 450 last year from Kenya alone. This illustrated that people in Kenya did not lack the urge to express themselves through art when the opportunity arose.
 Coun. Lugonzo said that personally he looked on the competition as encouraging art and artistic talent in Kenya. This was particularly important for the young and he was glad that the organisers had recognised this and instituted a separate school and village stations.
 Young people were destined to carry the cultural heritage to future generations and to them was entrusted the task of building a continuous history of the vital activities of the developing nation.
 The Mayor associated himself with President Kenyatta's fervent wish to preserve traditional culture, would find inspiration and be propelled to greater artistic achievements.
 In art, an individual found opportunity for freedom of expression. In a 1968 painting of a sculpture he was able to find his inner sensitivity that escaped him in spoken words. He was able to find expression on occasions when timidity or harsh conditions would have hampered him.
 In the field of culture, recent history had brought out contradictory evaluations because of political and social upheavals. On the one hand, traditional culture was disrupted by the impact of Western culture on the other, Kenya culture had been enriched through association with Western culture.
 The achievement of independence should be accompanied by an upsurge of national pride, in traditional things. People were also in a position to draw from what inspiration or advantages there were in the colonial period and together with traditional cultural heritage create a fluent cultural development.
 Already some outstanding works in the fields of literature, painting, sculpture and theatre had begun to emerge from the indigenous people.
 Coun. Lugonzo congratulated Esso on its 15 years of patronage to art, stating that it was not enough for a company to content itself with the purely commercial aspect of the developing Kenya. He also complimented the participants achieving a high standard and said they deserved all possible encouragement to go on with their work. It was his hope that the public would provide and watch talent develop. Parties were often formed by the Kenya Society of people of kindred interests.

The K.G.U., therefore, refuses to sanction the competitions as the Dunlop Tournament, and will include that event on its list of Open fixtures. Nor would it give its blessing to a Pan Am sponsorship of one assumes.

The fact remains, however, that the Kenya Golf Union is competing in such contests. It has been suggested that for K.G.U. to contradict the rulings of such an august body as the R and A would be to do so in this view, since the R and A, in conjunction with the United States Golf Association, controls the 90 per cent of the world's golf.
