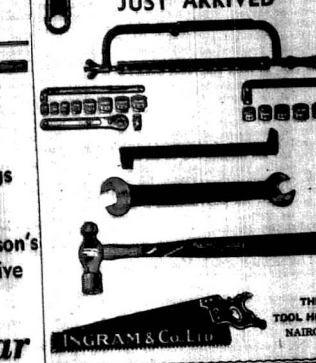

### TIGHTENING UP THE BLOCKADE AGAINST GERMANY

#### ALLIES' PLANS

##### AN INTENSIFICATION OF THE WAR BY THE ALLIES WITHIN THE NEXT FEW DAYS IS WIDELY PREDICTED.

It is considered likely to take the form of tightening up the blockade of Germany by increased supply of iron ore through Norwegian waters and also by attempting to reduce supplies to Germany from the Balkans.

April 1. There is a general feeling in Britain at the beginning of this new week that the next few days will see steps taken by the Allies in the direction of the intensification of the war against Germany. It is widely expected that the Allies have something up their sleeves.

There is general approval for the hint contained in Mr. Churchill's speech of tightening up the blockade, and the speech as a whole receives unanimous welcome in the newspapers.

Newspapers as diverse as the Daily Telegraph, Daily Mail, News Chronicle and Manchester Guardian, give their most important news columns the same headlines, namely that Britain is about to take action to tighten the blockade of Germany.

They all have their set theories but there is all agreed that something is being done with a view to putting a stop to the transport of iron ore to Germany through Norwegian territorial waters.

The newspapers also suggest that steps will be taken simultaneously to reduce the supplies of oil and foodstuffs which Germany is getting through the Balkans.

Something big soon? The Daily Telegraph, in a leading article, says that the communique issued after the meeting in Paris.

The Daily Mail says: "The warning of reprisals has a double significance in its line to closely follow the meeting of the Supreme War Council and precedes the meeting of our Balkan Ministers, called to conference in London. There is close connection between these two events."

The Supreme War Council has announced the success of the blockade, and that the Allies are now in a position to take further steps.

Messages from Scandinavian countries, continue the paper, show that Mr. Churchill's speech is similar to that of the meeting in London. Sweden is concerned about our view of her line and supports Germany, and wishes to show that they don't need the peace time quota.

Repetition of Britain's determination is a good sign. We are aware of our own strength and we are sure of the ring round Germany. We would not let it slip through our fingers.

The Daily Herald says: "Most of all, this country wants to see Britain stand together, and prevent Hitler from buying the peace of war."

Scandinavian View In Stockholm one of the leading newspapers points out that the new line is rather a wide split between Germany and the Allies, but that the latter are still in a position to maintain their position.

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### AMERICANS WANT ALLIED VICTORY

#### Striking Result Of A Survey

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The returns show that 81 per cent of Americans wish for an Allied victory and only one per cent desire a German victory.

There was important change in the intensity with which Americans have come to regard the Allied and German causes in the past six months. American opinion has undoubtedly been swayed greatly by German tactics in Poland, Czechoslovakia and by the most authentic stories of Nazi brutality. The majority of Americans, as is shown by this latest survey, believe that Britain and France are fighting for principles which are important to America.

The leading Gustavus newspaper pays a tribute to the treaty-writers of Britain and France. "The truth is, that the policy of telling the truth can stir up the public will not only get used to hearing the truth, but will have a yardstick for measuring the lies of others." The newspaper instance the way in which Allied navy ships have promptly recognized and fired at the German submarines and the British aircraft have promptly recognized and fired at the German bombers.

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The war in China is not going very well for the Japanese, according to latest reports. The picture shows a division of Japanese tanks entering a Chinese town.

### Allies Offered Aid To Norway And Sweden

April 1. The Swedish Prime Minister at a meeting of the Upper Cabinet today declared that Britain had not merely offered effective aid to Finland but had prepared to give Sweden and Norway extensive military help against Germany if the latter resisted unfavourably against transportation of military aid to Finland across Scandinavia.

### Mr. Welles And Poland

April 1. Before Mr. Sumner Welles, President Roosevelt's special envoy to Europe, left Rome for home, he sent letters to General Sikorski, the Polish Prime Minister, and to the Polish Foreign Minister. This was announced at a meeting of the Polish Cabinet held in France yesterday.

In his letters, Mr. Sumner Welles said he had been impressed by the importance of the talks which he had had with the Polish leaders in Paris and he expressed the friendly feelings for the great Polish Republic.

General Sikorski said that the recent communique of the Supreme Allied War Council confirmed agreements which Poland had signed with the Allies last September and which provided for the closest collaboration between Britain, France and Poland. They had also agreed that in the event of war they would not conclude an armistice or sign a peace treaty except by common consent. (Reuter).

### CZECHS FOR FRANCE

April 1. The first batch of Czech volunteers in Britain will leave for France shortly. They will proceed into the field forces. Each army while they are being assimilated into the field forces. Each batch will cross the Channel in civilian dress. A General Staff Officer will be in charge of the Czech volunteers in the London area at the end of January and their departure for active service is now being arranged.

Many Czechs in Britain expressed a desire to join the army as soon as it started and volunteers were registered with the Czech National Committee in London. (Reuter).

April 1. In Iraq, a new Cabinet has been formed under Rashid Ali. General Ismael was named as Prime Minister in 1933 and was re-elected in 1934. He will be the Foreign Minister. (Reuter).

### CATEGORICAL DENIAL

London, April 1. Reports which have appeared in certain newspapers of Allied intentions to police neutral waters violated by the enemy, or to send naval forces to neutral countries as measures for intensifying the blockade, have categorically denied in official statements. (Official Official Wireless Service.)

## UNAVAILING RAID ON SCAPA FLOW Driven Off After Five Minutes

Over the North Sea and the Western Front the Germans admit the loss of three planes yesterday and they may have lost seven.

**Three Against Nine**

The three Messerschmitts were shot down on their own side of the line and one of them was brought down by British casualties. The engagement started just before dawn when three British Hurricanes on patrol saw nine Messerschmitts making for them. The enemy planes immediately set up into three flights and each of the three Hurricanes engaged one Messerschmitt. The Hurricanes, however, were unable to attack and were shot down. After that for some time the men went into an engagement with another German and one of the Hurricanes was damaged. The Hurricanes were in the middle of the formation and one of them was shot down. The other two were shot down. After losing three of their number, the other Messerschmitts made for the ground.

## LAND FOR GERMANS

Common Sense And The Law

We hope the Kenya Government will not need much time to consider whether restrictions should be placed on the purchase of land in Kenya by enemy aliens, and to clear up the position about the custody of enemy property. Government may say today that it does not accept the argument that sales of land to enemy aliens would be prejudicial to the interests of the community, but the East African Standard is in no doubt that the Government should not be justified in any argument Government could bring forward and it would be useless in any case to take the law into its own hands.

So let us have those restrictions without any delay and, for the time being, until we really know where we stand in relation to enemy aliens, the prohibition should apply to all people of German descent. We are just as keen on the 'liberty of the subject' as anybody else, and accept the argument that as landowners wish to see his land destroyed, but we still maintain that to make this drive against wastage of Kenya land effective, it is needed a clear-cut centralisation of co-ordinating authority so that the need to protect individual farms can be related to the plan for a whole district.

If the application of a major Rule can be nullified merely by the other landowners, it is "unfavourable" despite the fact that the whole scheme is the expert opinion of the Colony's Director of Agriculture, it seems exposed to the risk of failure or only partial success. We have admitted already that it is better to have the co-operation of the community than an obstructive feeling of irritation, but we feel sure that this co-operation can be secured by the system of appeal which would have avoided an impasse when personal prejudices conflict with State necessity.

If every settler and every African peasant, ordered to put up with that protection, decided to try objecting first, the Boards are going to have a merry time indeed. Presumably, too, the Africans will also be able to advance for public funds to meet the cost of protecting his shamba, and be given the same sympathetic consideration as the European farmer, as long as the money lasts.

If this soil remains and water conservancy is not put over with plenty of publicity and propaganda and public opinion will assuredly be roused. We hope for a lot of Kenya that it will, and that everybody will play the game. But if the Legislature has merely passed a law, the result will be a costly morass of appeals and financial advances, everybody will know who to blame. And still the Select Committee thought that the Government of the Colony would hand the job over to a group of "fanatics" who would run amok! Government, and the Local Authorities might have been given the responsibility of saddling somebody else with it!

## Soil and Water Bill

As we expected, the Legislative Council accepted yesterday the amendments proposed by the Select Committee in the Soil and Water Conservation Bill. The Solicitor General, who was Chairman of that Committee, dealt most convincingly by his own argument in this respect: "If a Board (or Boards) declines to enforce orders issued by the Director of Agriculture on the ground that in the Board's view, they are 'unreasonable,' what steps can Government take to safeguard the interests of the producer (the country's soil and water assets) if the application of that policy is endangered by such a decision? The Government comforted the Legislature with the answer that the Board is not to be given 'orders' given to individual farmers, but to be given 'Rules' from which those 'orders' spring.

The reply depends on. We can not see a 'Rule' that, for example, all gullies must be filled up, or certain steps taken to protect the banks of a river, or that a farmer may use his practical application in the form of orders to an individual, or a number of individuals, or a dependent upon the decision of a Board against which the State no appeal or course of enforcement. We are just as keen on the 'liberty of the subject' as anybody else, and accept the argument that as landowners wish to see his land destroyed, but we still maintain that to make this drive against wastage of Kenya land effective, it is needed a clear-cut centralisation of co-ordinating authority so that the need to protect individual farms can be related to the plan for a whole district.

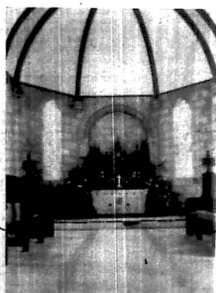

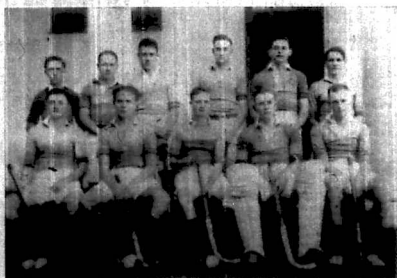

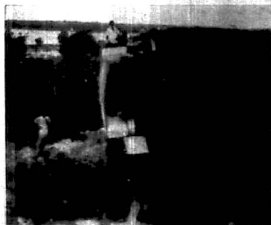

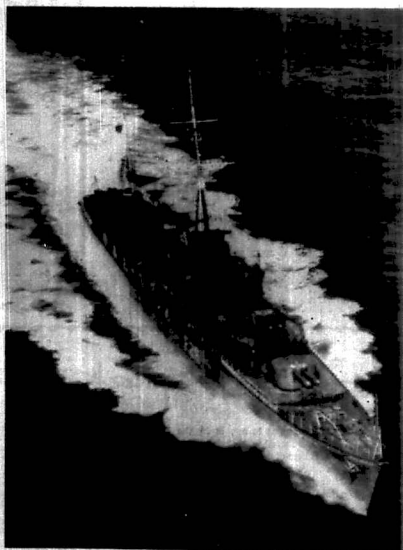

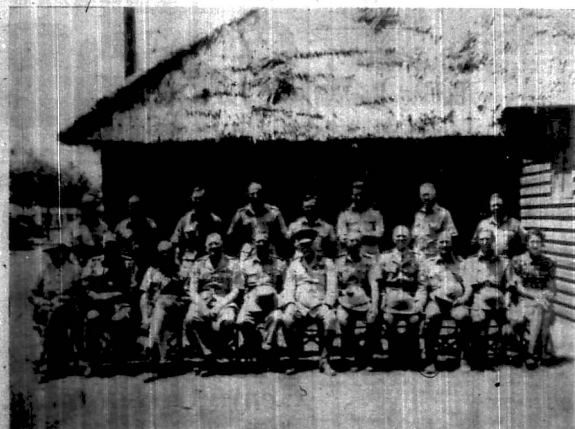

# AMERICAN PROBLEMS

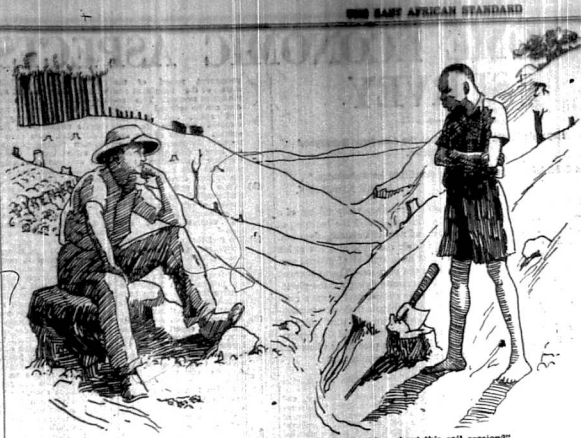
## A Survey of State Socialism and Unemployment in the U.S.A.

### PART I

THE late G. K. Chesterton, in his book "What I saw in America," gave a very sound definition of an American president. "In England," he wrote, "the king is a symbol, cheered by great crowds whenever he appears in public. He is kept out of politics. He is a king but not a ruler. The popularity of an American president is just the reverse. The American republic is the most medieval monarchy. It is intended that the president shall rule and shall take all the risks of ruling. (He is called the chief executive.) All the popular presidents of past times, such as Jackson, Lincoln and Theodore Roosevelt, have acted as democratic despots, but emphatically not as constitutional monarchs.

In short, the names have become curiously interchangeable, so that a historic reality, it is the president who ought to be called a king, while the king might correctly be called a president."

This paradoxical situation occurred chiefly in a superficial study of Roosevelt's record in Congress and his mistaken views which he himself has termed "minor legislation." The growth of imperialism under his administration has been the cause of detestable and often far-reaching gains which have been made in vain for his party and his country. The war has made possible the American Federation of Labor and the C.I.O., the former of which is a conservative body, Green and the latter a radical organization led by J. L. Lewis.

The high wages that have been demanded are crippling since industries—namely the railroads, most of which are almost bankrupt.

But the attitude of labour will have an important effect on the coming election. In this State Socialism has grown up in the United States. It began quietly and gradually through various innovations introduced by the Roosevelt Government, such as old age pensions and unemployment insurance, partly based on English models. Then came the great drive against the big utility companies—gas, electric and so on—with the object of driving them out of business and the owners in any way government plants without compensating the owners in any way. These government plants were already built.

Tens of thousands of investors were affected by these proceedings and the banks and insurance companies holding stocks and bonds suffered great losses. There were other political changes. The radicals were urged government interference with private enterprise through various restrictions. The result was a loss of confidence throughout the country was responsible for the continued economic depression, slump in the stock market and vast sums held from investment—the interference

with the highly complicated machinery of the Stock Exchange brought about the devaluation of the dollar, absurd purchases of silver at high prices and the accumulation of gold.

And yet Government ownership of the banks and the railroads was suggested.

Unemployment is rife in America. Over ten million people are out of work, and even the greatest experts seem unable to suggest a satisfactory solution of this problem. One of the main causes is the serious effect of the use of labour-saving machinery which the constant stream of immigrants, entering the country under liberal quotas, is not stopped from competing with American workers on English methods. There is, too, the claim of the women. The millions of girls and young women who are doing work once open to youths and young men are being partly responsible for the great percentage of unemployment among the white collar class.

# COVERS TO PEOPLE

It matters not how meanly skilled a worker is or how long the All-American match has been a record of success or embroilery.

I seem to have digressed a long way from the film. The *Love Song* which also made me realize the great part which youth is called upon to play in social change. I imagine the *LOVE SONG OF YOUTH* that most young men would rather cry a hurra for or a Siffin against invading Nazi hordes, than do anything else in modern war. Nevertheless the fact remains that before peace returns thousands of young men will die and millions be taken from the streets for a period which none can foresee! And when peace returns the problem of re-housing these young men into their life will not be easy. I fear that in Korea I will be certainly no easier than anywhere else. It is a great opportunity as well as a great responsibility that has been placed on the shoulders of the young men of the world. They must be trained to become virtually the preserve of the middle-aged and the elderly. Legality—Congress, Municipal and District Councils, Farmers' Associations, Boards and Societies all suffer from the same disadvantages; even the Machos critic side disbelieves because most of all players are not so young as they are. It is very necessary that a young country should be in such straits. Admittedly there are two sides to the argument, you can blame youth and you can blame the elderly generations; but you cannot deny that education is the key. After this war there will need to be a tremendous shifting of responsibility on Korea will be done to the grove; and heaven alone knows what sort of land there will be for these young heroes to live in.

I suppose that most men and women are interested by their dreams and by the cause of this active activity of the mind. I think that these intimate revelations will not cause any penalty to me, but that they may be of some use to a variety of Freudian or other curious curiosities.

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# Middle East War?

## THE BATTLEFIELD

By Captain Liddell Hart

THE arrival at Suez of the first Australian and New Zealand contingents was accompanied by a state of profound if cryptic references in the Press to the assembly of a great Franco-British army in the Middle East.

A figure of 500,000 was mentioned as an estimate of its strength. The impression was reinforced, if the figure was qualified, by a French semi-official correction saying that the total was rather less.

Many of this great army was based at a moment when there had been reports not only of German diplomatic pressure on Turkey, but of Russian military movements—readiness and troop concentrations on the Caucasus frontier.

THE first great contingency which appeared on the horizon was that of a German move in the

Balkans. More recently attention has been directed to the alternative or complementary risk of a Russian communication on the Capitan Pass in relation to two other main factors:

(1) The attitude of Turkey; (2) The time and scale of re-inforcement from French and British resources in the Balkans.

It is worth noting that the prospect of success would be largely governed by the state of the Russian communications on the Capitan Pass in relation to two other main factors:



Both the Allies and Russia would find it hard to carry out military operations south of the Taurus. The chief obstacle would be the lack of communications. neglect in the European areas of Kenya. ## Soil and Water Bill





He would give no assurance that it would be a short war, still less that it would be an easy one. But the resources and manpower of the Allies were so great that they would greatly exceed those of the enemy.
