## THE HOUSE OF COMMONS TO EUROPEAN PEACE

### Debate in the House of Commons

#### "GERMAN PREDOMINANCE CAN NOT BE ALLOWED"

#### More Troops for French Frontier

#### REJECTION OF NOTES FROM FRANCE AND ITALY

The grave view taken by Britain of Germany's rearmaments policy was reflected in the debate in the House of Commons on Thursday. The House cheered when Sir Herbert Samuel declared that German military pre-eminence could not be allowed.

Sir John Simon whose forthcoming task in Berlin is recognised by all parties in the House as a formidable one said that by one means or another peace in Europe must be preserved.

Germany has repudiated Notes of protest by France and Italy on the ground that they are not signatories to the Versailles Treaty had already broken its provisions.

The tension in France may be gauged from the news that the Franco-German frontier garrisons are being greatly strengthened.

It is probable that Italy will increase the size of her Army in view of the present European situation.

#### Sir John Simon's Difficult Task

[THROUGH BRETHER'S AGENCY.] London, March 23. An attempt was made by Mr. George Lansbury, Leader of the Opposition, to move the adjournment of the House in order to discuss the international situation.

He said Germany had thrown a challenge in demanding the right to destroy a Treaty and to embark on a policy of armaments which would inevitably plunge us into a war which would destroy civilisation. He urged Sir John Simon not to agree to German rearmament but to make it clear that British policy was based on disarmament.

Sir Herbert Samuel, the Liberal Leader, stated that nothing should be done that would embarras Sir John Simon in his most difficult and momentous negotiations, but Germany should not misunderstand Britain's attitude.

No Prejudice The House cheered when Sir Herbert Samuel said "Equality of status for Germany, yes, but German military pre-eminence, no."

He added that Sir John Simon would go to Berlin with the full support of the House. Sir John Simon said that the Berlin visit demanded complete frankness. He said that personal visits would be exploratory and he emphasised that the main debate as to whether it was sometimes necessary to obtain the views of others rather than to prove one's own views on other people.

Fourfold Purpose He disclosed that his visit to Berlin would have a fourfold purpose, namely an exchange of views on security arrangements, Germany's return to the League, and the proposed Air Treaty, and to satisfy that present commitments could not be altered without negotiating an agreement on all these points.

Germany's Replies Berlin, March 23. Baron von Neurath's reply to the French note states that the French explanation given by the French Government does not take into account the actual position, and must therefore be rejected by Germany.

Baron von Neurath has informed the Italian Ambassador that Germany repudiated the provisions of the Versailles Treaty which provided for the disarmament clauses in the present Treaty but previously been violated by other signatories.

DO KENYA OTTERS CATCH FISH?

Evidence to Support View That They Do

PROBLEM OF PREVENTION

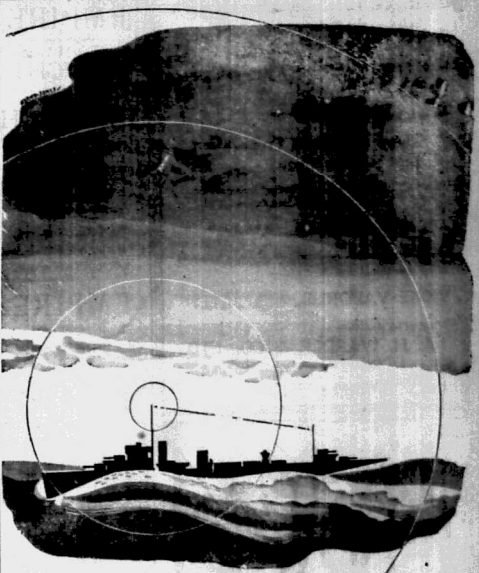
[FROM A CORRESPONDENT.] On March 21, the so-called grass rains hereabouts have been very 'unfair' in the matter of distribution. Some of the best known dairy farms in the district have had none at all and the farmers concerned fix at their wits end to keep their cattle alive but alone get any milk.

The Malava river is now needing a scouring out and also the falling flow has demanded a close season. For the past 18 months the river has never been unobtainable for more than a couple of days at a time and it is wonderful how the high standard of sport has been maintained. A good fish will bring two stacks of fish from the latter reaches. It is found that otters have taken a toll of fish during the long period of low water and although there are still signs of their feeding on fish there is no doubt of their having taken to trout.

There is no such thing as a cat-fished otter and their method of capture is to swim underneath a fish and catch it before it moves although they can take a big fish on the run. The Kenya otter is a beautiful creature and larger than any other that give such sport with bounds at home but unfortunately we have few if any trout suitable for sale as hand work.

The only method to keep otters from fishing is by trapping and as the fish are very valuable any captures entered into by fishing clubs would pay the otter and the good old English proverb there are no natives capable of catching anything.

CURRENCY PROBLEM IN SOUTH AFRICA

World Deviation Not Far Distant?

['STANDARD' CORRESPONDENT.] The Durban (By Air Mail). The Government's economic advisers have been watching financial tendencies overseas very closely during the past few weeks, and they believe that a period of currency fluctuations lies ahead. The difficulties of the gold countries, notably Belgium, were anticipated by the Treasury, whose advisers for some days past have gone to show that the fall in sterling is having serious effects in Belgium and Holland in particular. The Treasury experts are right-minded to forecast that the future may hold, but there is a very strong impression that a general movement towards devaluation may be closer at hand than most people realize. In its narrative the movement of sterling are beginning to have a visible effect on German trade with the United States the Johannesburg 'Sunday Times', and suggestions for an extension of the barter arrangements are being shored down pending a firmer tendency in the sterling position.

on a Tuesday, as also did four other Sovereigns. Five died on a Sunday, six on a Thursday, and six on a Wednesday. Now begins and ends their reign on the same day of the week, Henry I. and Edward III. began and ended their reign on a Sunday, Edward II. on a Monday, Edward IV. on a Wednesday, George I. on a Wednesday, Mary on a Wednesday, George III. and George IV. on a Saturday. His present Majesty, George V. is the first of the Sovereigns who have sat on the English Throne since William the Conqueror who has succeeded in May. Each of the other eleven monarchs has been not only for one occasion or more, but so far, no monarch had ever succeeded the Throne in May.

Prince Edward will be the twelfth Prince of Wales. King George was Prince of Wales for a little over nine years and three months. King Edward was Prince of Wales for fifty-nine years and ten weeks.

The House of Hanover was blessed with remarkably long life, the average age of its reigning monarchs being seventy-four. Queen Victoria lived to be the oldest monarch who ever sat on the Queen's throne. All the Hanoverian rulers lived to be over sixty-six years. Two were octogenarians, two septuagenarians, and two were in the eighties. The fact is the more remarkable because there have been only eight monarchs in our national history who have lived to be over sixty, and only one before the accession of the House of Hanover who lived to be seventy.

Nine years ago a prominent insurance manager in New York stated that King Edward VII. was the most heavily insured man in the world. Even as early as 1903 his death would have cost the insurance companies some 10,000,000 dollars, and the amount now would be much larger. More than 22,000,000 have been placed on the life of the late King by persons who did not know him and had no relations with him. They simply insured his life as a gambling speculation. Therefore many people have reaped a financial benefit by his death. King Edward was perfectly aware of all this.

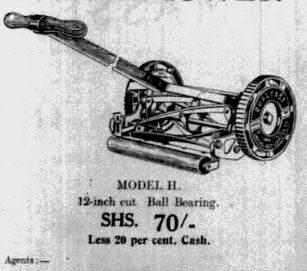

Paris, March 25. - The meeting at Paris between representatives of Britain, France and Italy has resulted in an improved atmosphere and the recognition of complete unity of purpose of the three Governments. A further conference will be held after the British Ministers' visit to Berlin.

Meanwhile Italy has called up the 1911 class to the colours with a view to increasing her standing army to 5,000,000. With the armed Fascist militia, Italy will have over 1,000,000 men under arms.

During the course of a speech to a gathering of "Black Shirts," Signor Mussolini said: "Our desire for peace and collaboration in Europe is based on millions of steel bayonets."

The United States are also closely watching events in Europe, and the Secretary of State, Mr. Cordell Hull, in a speech, stressed the necessity for the strict adherence to all treaty obligations. The United States has decided to increase the strength of her army.

Unity of Purpose

London, March 22. - While French Press commentators were Sir John Simon's speech in the House of Commons, the Berlin newspapers generally, the attitude of the House of Commons debate, Sir John Simon's allusion to German agents in Berlin and the collective responsibility refers to the aloofness, tactful and was attitude of the French.

League Council Meeting

Geneva, March 22. - It was noted that the ordinary meeting of the Council of the League of Nations will be held during the first week of April to discuss the French request in regard to the German ultimatum.

Coffee Board's Revised Plans

MARKETING AND FINANCE SCHEMES POSTPONED

Local Auctions

The Kenya Coffee Board has abandoned its controversial marketing and finance plans for the time being.

It is now proposed to organize independent Local Auctions and to set up in London an Advisory Committee to keep the Board and the planter in touch with the markets.

The Chairman will travel to London by air this week to discuss the functions of the Committee and to clear misunderstandings out of the way.

London Advisory Committee

At the 10th Meeting of the Coffee Board of Kenya, held on Friday, the question of the Board's investigations into the marketing and financial conditions of the coffee industry of Kenya was exhaustively discussed and it was unanimously resolved that the Board should be asked to prepare a report on the subject.

As a first step and as an immediate impetus the Coffee Board of Kenya shall concentrate on the establishment of (a) a Local Coffee Auctions and (b) an Advisory Committee in London, postponing further action in the interim.

At the same time, the Chairman will endeavour to clear up any misunderstandings that have arisen in connection with the Board's proposals for marketing and finance and will stress once a thorough investigation into all the points raised by the Board so that the Board may be in possession of first-hand information to be before the 1935 Coffee Conference in July next.

# Employment Problem of East African Youth

## EVERYTHING POSSIBLE DONE BY GOVERNMENT

### Present Difficulties

### LACK OF FACILITIES FOR TRAINING FOR HIGHER POSTS

A statement has been forthcoming from Government in regard to a suggestion made some little time ago by the "E.A. Standard" that everything possible should be done to absorb young men and women born in East Africa.

It is stated an increasing number of locally born Europeans are being employed in the Civil Service, but there are, however, difficulties in the way of expansion of the number, particularly in regard to the Administration.

Certain qualifications, academic and otherwise, are necessary for the higher posts in the Service, and it is considered that there are no adequate facilities in East Africa for the suitable training of candidates.

### Qualifications Demanded

The "East African Standard" has published a list of the criteria for a leading article on the subject of the "East Africa for East Africans" which points out that increasing attention is being devoted to the problem of placing in employment young men and women born in East Africa. The East African Governments should create facilities for training such people in the Civil Service. The article aroused considerable interest and the Kenya Government officers offered a statement on the position which does show that there is an increasing number of locally born boys and girls who are being employed in the Civil Service of the Colony. It also discloses, however, that there are still difficulties in the way of the expansion of this number, particularly so far as the Administration is concerned, where certain qualifications, academic or otherwise, are considered necessary for the higher posts in the Civil Service of the Colony.

### A New Grade

So far as agriculture is concerned, there was recently established a new grade, under the Local Civil Service scheme which will enable suitable local youth to take a part in the non-technical work in connection with the expansion of the service. It is again, for the higher posts in the Administration, it is considered that in the Colony for the adequate training of youth.

Another interesting aspect of the situation is the revelation that for a number of years the statistic of the number of young men and women has been low, but that an improvement has occurred recently.

### Locally Engaged Officers

Government in the course of its statement pointed out that of the 1,140 Europeans in the Kenya Civil Service, 27 per cent were found to have been born in Kenya.

According to the 1961 Census there were 627 persons of 16 to 19 years of age in the Kenya Colony, of these 528 either were not at school or had left school; and only 55 boys and 44 girls were at school. The total of 55 boys and 44 girls were between 16 and 19 years of age, and were receiving education, even assuming all were at school. It will thus be seen that in the Civil Service, it is considered Government considered, with regard to the prospects for local recruitment. It was also considered that for some young persons in this age category would be in a good assistance in a department.

The question of a supply of recruits for the Local Civil Service is one of the statistics of population. In its Fourth Interim Report, the Board stated that it would be the minimum estimate of the number of persons to enter the Service. Government considered that it was essential that there should be standard qualifications and suggested that "it was desirable that the standard of the record of European education in East Africa should be raised, making 1961 was as follows:—

# TRADE RETURNS IN TANGANYIKA

## Increases During January

### Favourable Balance

### HEAVY IMPORTATIONS FROM JAPAN

Tanganyika Territory has started the year 1968 well, showing a favourable trade balance, amounting to £24,197, for January. According to the "Official Gazette" of Tanganyika Territory, the total value of the principal exports from the Territory for the month of January 1968 was £229,552 (inclusive of bullion and specie) in the value of 295,670 and imports in value, valued at £109,049. The principal exports from the United Kingdom were valued at 267,427, Kenya and Uganda, £24,749; British India, £10,000; the United States, £12,941; Japan, £39,490; Germany, £15,000; Holland, £3,086, were also among the principal contributors. Among articles of greatest value were included: boats/boats, £12,775; manufactured iron and steel, £10,000; machinery, £14,100; cotton piece goods, unbleached, bleached, printed and coloured (mainly from Japan), £50,977; motor spares £10,276; and rice.

Exports for the same period (January 1968) totalled £269,749 (inclusive of re-exports, £19,989 and transit exports, £19,107). Of these exports, £18,490, the value of 891,422 metric tons, the United Kingdom to the value of 74,000 metric tons, and Zambia and £3,113 to Zanzibar. British India took goods valued at £31,640; Germany, £11,984; Belgium, £25,497; Other Foreign Countries, £12,600. Japan, despite her big import trade, took nothing worthy of mention from the Territory. Among the most important items in the exports were: Coffee, 1,417 tons valued at £46,992; cottonseed, 9,917 metric tons, valued at £1,282 (all for Kenya and £1,282 for other countries); sisal, £8,289 (also chiefly for Kenya and Uganda); cotton, 19,065 metric tons, £20,742; kauri, 6,979 tons, £70,738; beans, 34 tons, £2,929; hides, 230 tons, £11,395; copra and rope, 108 tons, £1,995; gold, 100 bars, valued, £150,000. Compared with the equivalent period in 1967, exports were up by an increase of £59,334, or 54.0 per cent, over the total for January 1967, of £170,218. The increase is a progressive one since for the month of January 1968 totalled £1,648,170. Reports also showed an increase in exports of agricultural products in January 1968 of £1,929,700. The value for the January 1968 period was £13,317. This was a visible, favourable balance which is a credit to the Territory, valued at £24,197, compared with the credit balance of £22,542 for 1967.

### RELIEF WORKS IN AMERICA

#### Huge Sum Voted by Senate

# THE AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY

## Review of Activities During Past Year

### FINANCIAL POSITION

#### Satisfactory Increase in Membership

The annual report and financial statement of the Royal Agricultural Society of Kenya will be submitted to the annual general meeting of the Society, which takes place at noon on Wednesday next, in the New Stanley Hotel, Nairobi. The document, which comprises a booklet of some 20 pages, shows that the Society's membership for the twelve months ending December 31, 1967, was as follows:—

Members' subscriptions, Shs. 16,448.25 (as compared with Shs. 13,679 in 1953); rents received, Shs. 3,237.70; from Society's hall, Shs. 1,900.; from Nakuru Show, Shs. 5,088.78; Government Grants Aid, Shs. 8,788.90; Donations, Shs. 6,086.21 (as compared with Shs. 400. in 1953); the total income amounted to Shs. 39,158.72 (as compared with Shs. 23,435.95 in 1953).

During 1953-54 Government agreed that the grant-in-aid to the Society should be £10,000 (in the form of the general income and expenditure account instead of the Building Fund, in which event it would have become a contingent liability).

### EXPENDITURE

The expenditure for the year amounted to Shs. 29,156.42, a decrease of Shs. 7,412.55 on that for the previous twelve months, which amounted to Shs. 36,569.97. The principal items of expenditure were as follows: these being more than in 1953 in practically every instance: General administration, Shs. 18,765.73; maintenance of the Nairobi, Nakuru and Eldoret Showgrounds, Shs. 7,962.25; depreciation on equipment, Shs. 912.15; special expenses on appeal for new members; Shs. 1,222.77.

# Unification of Transport Services

## MEMORANDUM BY A FORMER DIRECTOR OF AGRICULTURE

### Lower Working Costs Essential

### NEED FOR REDUCED RATES TO AID AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTION

The Joint East African Board has approved a memorandum prepared by Mr. Alex Holm, former Director of Agriculture in Kenya, dealing with the need for the unification of transport services in East Africa.

The memorandum states that the present overhead charges of the services are disproportionate to the traffic carried and argues the case for a more rational transport system to the lowest possible level compatible with sound railway finance in order to encourage increased agricultural production in the territories.

### Approved by Joint E.A. Board

At the March meeting of the Joint East African Board, members' discussion took place on the "Close Coordination of the Services and the following memorandum by Mr. Alex Holm, was submitted to the Board. It was decided to send on the memorandum to East Africa for the views of those on it.

The Board notes with satisfaction that a definite and progressive step, that the Governors' Conference, constituted for this purpose of the Governors of Kenya, Uganda and Tanganyika, will be constituted an East African Transport Policy Board to advise the Secretary of State on questions of railway, water-borne, road and rail transport in the three territories.

The Board has ever recognised the advantages to be derived from the unification of railway policy and would take this opportunity of registering a statement of the objects as defined by the late General Manager, K.U.B. (Sir Christian Pulling) in his memorandum as follows:—1. The adoption of a considered, comprehensive and definite policy in new railway construction; 2. The avoidance of competition between different railway lines for traffic to and from the same area; 3. The development of ports to the extent necessary to serve the territories offensively and concentration of large-scale development on selected ports rather than on a multiplicity of small ports; the prevention of wasteful competition between ports; 4. The stimulation as far as practicable of railway and port charges to the maximum of the management and working and avoidance of duplication of work.

The Board recognises that the present financial position and commitments of these two organisations will require close co-ordination, having regard to the interests of Governments and users of the territories, which they serve but believes that if the

...not surprising to his mind what set of Memorandum was desired. He had one of the necessary data in the form of a statement of the case worked by statistics. It seemed to him therefore that he had better... with the whole principle of amalgamation and unification and which would not cause controversial issues.

Overhead Charges

6. It is desired to draw attention to the present overhead charges which are out of proportion to the traffic carried, also the organization and equipment is required to track, rolling stock and harbour facilities, which are capable of providing a large increase in services without relative additional cost, and to urge upon Governments the need for redressing the lag which at present exists between railway development and the rate of increase of production.

Low Transport Costs Essential

7. The Board desires to urge the essential need for reducing the cost of transport to the lowest possible amount compatible with sound railway finance, in that the production of these territories may be successfully marketed in competition with other countries at the ruling lower price level of commodities, while the importance of reducing the cost of import traffic in order to reduce the costs of living, and therefore costs of production, should also be recognized.

8. Economic and greater efficiency will assuredly follow unification. Relief may thereby be afforded to producers and consumers—Native and Non-Native alike—and trade and commerce will be fostered and promoted, while a sound financial structure of the transport organization may also be maintained.

9. The Board desires also to take this opportunity of recommending that periodically—every three to five years—the financial position, working expenses, and rates payable should be their basic outline be brought under a review by independent authority of high standing. Such an enquiry should in the Board's view be regarded as an established practice, justified because of the important issues in which the Board is concerned and not implying that the enquiry is prompted by any immediate cause for dissatisfaction or complaint.

10. In conclusion the Board desires to express its firm conviction that no single act will prove to be more contributive to the promotion of economic development in Eastern Africa than the organization of the main transport services—railways and harbours—under one executive and administrative control.

£15/6 for certain essential work in connection with water supply to the Nairobi group.

The year was one of extreme financial anxiety for the Society and at one time it was thought that its existence would have to be terminated. However efforts and a generous response to the appeal for funds averted this, and it is now reported that despite heavy liabilities the position is much better.

The estimated expenditure for 1935 has been reduced to Shs. 27,407/6/3, a sum of Shs. 1,748/9/2 below that for 1934. Every effort has been and is still being made and the Society appeals for continued support from all classes of members.

Membership  
The membership of the Society is higher than at any time for the past nine years, the Full Members numbered 202, District Members, 254, and Associate Members 6 (a new class instituted in 1934). There are also...

Fifteen Honorary Members, including H.R.H. the Prince of Wales, ten Life Members and nine District (Native) Life Members.

The purity of entries compelled the abandonment of the Egg Laying Trials, but the Maize Sweet Corn Competition was again held, with the assistance of the Department of Agriculture. At December 31, 1934, incidentally, a sum of Shs. 1,206/7/5 stood to the credit of the competition account. Displays of original seed and progeny were staged and the results of the competition announced in the Press.

The Stud Book

Volume VI of the East African Stud Book was published last October and represents a considerable increase over the number of entries in previous volumes. Considerable attention was given to a milk recording scheme during the year and one was developed that, while not perfect, was as good as possible with the limited funds available. It will come into operation on April 1, 1935 and should be of considerable benefit to the dairy industry.

Sites for Show Grounds at Nanyuki and Kitale have been chosen and Government has agreed not to allocate the selected land for any other purpose for at least five years.

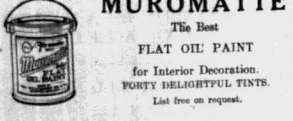

# White Settlement in the Tropics

Question Reviewed by Australian Professor

## 'AN UNSETTLED PROBLEM'

Examination by Scientists Throughout the World

The question of whether the white man and particularly the Nordic white man, could settle permanently as a worker in the tropics was outlined by Professor A. Grenfell Price, C.M.G., D.Litt., F.R.S., of the University of Adelaide, in a broadcast address given in Australia last year. He said the question was still unsettled. Throughout the world leading scientists were disputing over the question.

The speaker defined settlers as people who lived, worked, and had families for generations in the tropics. He excluded officials, missionaries, soldiers and traders who went to the tropics only for a time. The most important areas of inquiry, he said, were North America, parts of North, Central and South America, and the West Indies.

### Three Methods

"There are three ways in which scientists are attempting to examine the question of the ability of white people to settle in the tropics," he continued. "They are the methods of history, of statistics, and of the laboratory. Unfortunately, history is not a very accurate guide, as the progress of medical science has completely changed white prospects in the last few years. The statistical method is not wholly reliable. It is difficult to secure absolutely satisfactory figures of climate, hereditary, etc., even in civilized countries.

"The laboratory method is also uncertain for when you test people under artificial conditions of heat or moisture in a laboratory you cannot reproduce the exact conditions which face them when they have to undergo acclimatization in a tropical zone. By combining the three methods, however, one can find out to a great deal about whether the whites are really making progress.

### Early History

"The history of the white man in the tropics is very fascinating. From 1500 onwards European nations carried out a great prehistoric conquest of the tropics. The Portuguese, Spaniards, English, Dutch, French, and other nations pushed into tropical Asia, Africa, America, and Australia, and either conquered or destroyed the native colored peoples. Before very long, however, the tropical diseases and tropical peoples began to regain their own.

"In India, Java, Africa, or Mexico, the whites continued to hold sway as governors or traders, but each generation returned home, for if they remained they were absorbed like a river flowing into an ocean. In sparsely-inhabited countries, such as the West Indies, the whites destroyed the natives, but instead of working themselves, the whites brought in negro slaves, and these negroes increased so rapidly

that the white masters were soon absorbed. In India, the Portuguese tried the interesting experiment of deliberately breeding a half-caste people, but even this proved impossible, and ultimately the half-castes were exterminated.

### Survival of White Races

"Nevertheless, this white prehistoric was of some interest. Britain and Japan, and many fascinating books have been written on the little communities of whites in Central America and the West Indies. These are full of such groups of white people, and perhaps, we might even call the settlement at Berwick one.

"In 1822 and 1823 I was lucky enough to examine a number of such communities—Costa Rica in the Central American highlands, where an almost pure Spanish community has survived for 400 years; Jamaica, where a German community came about the same time; and the little and almost unknown island of Bali, where an English-Dutch community has kept almost pure white since the days of the Dutch planters, a period of 200 years.

"Without going into scientific details, I will simply say that the evidence shows that white men can live and work for generations in the more favorable tropics, provided that they are protected both from disease and from the presence of colored races, who are usually unhealthy, and are far more dangerous to the white man than any tropical climate.

### Control of Tropical Diseases

"After the old pre-scientific invasion of the tropics by the whites had failed, a new and far more powerful invasion occurred. From 1850 onwards the British and American scientists learned the control of hookworm, yellow fever, malaria, and many other tropical diseases, and the worst enemies of the whites were partly subdued.

"We must not, however, be too optimistic because of these successes. In reality, we are just beginning to understand that we are facing a huge and complex scientific problem, and that the future progress of white people in the tropics depends on a large number of geographic and economic circumstances. To take only one example, even a small region like Panama has great local varieties of climate, and there are probably many, a number of factors which in the climate, as affecting white people, are not yet understood. Similarly, one race is more suited to the tropics than another, and even in a single race there are some individuals who are suited to the tropics, and others who can never acclimatize.

"Another vital control is soil. The world is gradually absorbing the old fallacy that almost all tropical soils are fertile. Australia, for example, would have served a vast wastage in lives and expense had it not been found that her Northern Territory soils are some of the poorest anywhere.

### Housing

"Housing is also important. We are beginning to realize that length

and inter-breeding have harmed many white communities (more than tropical climates), and that small scattered settlements, such as those in North Africa, have little chance of meeting with any success.

"Comfort is also vital in tropical climates, particularly for women. One of the greatest hopes for the white settlement in the tropics lies in air conditioning the houses. Very soon the white man on the tropics will be able to control the temperature of his dwelling as easily and effectively as the American controls the winter temperature by central heating.

### Social Habits

"Then again, there is the importance of social habits, and of food and drink. Many failures in the tropics, particularly British failures, have been partly due to extraneous factors—heavy, unsuitable diets, and alcoholic excess. And again, even a young man who died of drink in the West Indies, his parents were charitably led to believe that he had died of fever, and that good old whipping would be the tropical climate—take the blame.

"Again, we are beginning to realize how dependent the white people of the tropics are on home-produced goods and markets. The Americans raised Puerto Rico and Cuba into lands of no crop as dependent on the good European market. The United States is refusing to pay a profitable price for sugar, and the sugar-growers are beginning to import in raw and provision, the supposed inadaptability of a tropical people is being proved.

### The Colour Barrier

"Most important of all we are beginning to realize, that the greatest barrier to white settlement in the tropics is neither climate nor sickness, but the presence of vast masses of colored peoples, who, as we know from the history of the Kanakas in the West Indies, have the standard of living, create the standard of disease, and form the means by which the whites can work down the essential physical work.

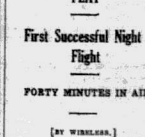

## Opportunities Never Repeat Themselves

One of the most interesting places in East Africa from the point of view of mountaineering is the Nagrogo crater. It is 125 miles from Araba and the most excellent road to it has recently been completed. The Nagrogo crater used to be called times to be an active volcano, now it is extinct. The present crater consists of a huge plain, some 10 miles in diameter with two big lakes in the middle. Around these lakes are to be found large quantities of game such as wildbeest, zebu, eland, topiaries, Grant's gazelle, dikor, and ibex. On and around the lip of the crater are elephant, rhino, buffalo and leopard. The great difficulty has always been where to sleep, but this has now been solved by the Araba Hotel, which have erected a camp on the very rim overlooking the crater with cook and personal attendants. The camp consists of large tents, together with complete camp equipment and is, I believe, most comfortable. This, therefore, enables motorists to see one of the wonders of East Africa at the minimum cost of expense and inconvenience, as the cost of transport of camp kit, servants, etc., has been eliminated. The minimum charge for food, accommodation and attendance is Shs. 25/- per day per person. Clean linen, together with food supplies for the period required, are sent with each party on departure from the hotel.

A most interesting day can be spent driving round the lip of the crater, and then down the western slope to the Olduvai Gorge of "Pithecanthropus" fame. This gorge is a transverse cut in the lower plateau about 20 miles in length, the walls being some 200 to 300 feet high, and it is in this gorge that the relics of prehistoric man were found. The round trip from the camp and back is 70 miles. The 10 per cent. discount on board and lodging will be according to all members of the B.E.A.A., which staying either at the camp or at the hotel. 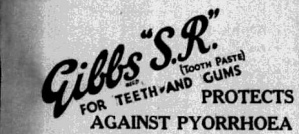

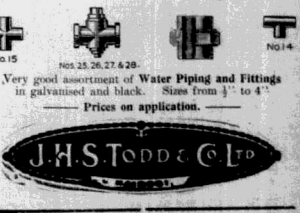



More About British Justice in Africa FORMER CHIEF JUSTICE REPLIES TO AN EX-GOVERNOR

The Protection of the Law NECESSARY FOR AFRICANS AS WELL AS FOR EUROPEANS

Governors, with rare and notable exceptions, are inclined to desire to diminish the prestige and authority of the judiciary, they desire that justice should be administered by executive officers and not by judicial officers, and they write, with eagerness, about referring to particular cases, about 'technicalities' and 'common sense' justice.

The above is an extract from a letter to "The Times" written by a former Chief Justice of Tanganyika, dealing with the points raised in a criticism by Sir Hesketh Bell, formerly Governor of Uganda, of the recommendations of the East African Legal Commission.

Request for Examples

London, March 19. (By Air Mail.) Sir Allan Hume, Chief Justice, Tanganyika has replied at length to the letter by Sir Hesketh Bell, formerly Governor of Uganda, dealing with Sir Allan's letter in "The Times" of March 18. The letter in question is written from the point of view of a Governor, and it seems desirable that these matters should be submitted for the consideration of your readers from the point of view of a Judge who has served in East Africa.

(Continued from page 7.) nominate a member for election on March 11 last, showing citizens a total lack of appreciation of a most respectable spathy to the voters concerned.

District Roads

It was pointed out that in 1931 the Council took over 251 miles of built-up roads and were granted £8,022 for maintenance, plus £2,705 for further construction. Today they were maintaining 890 miles of road in first class condition on a total grant of £47,710. During the last four years roads had been converted into all weather roads and the Council's energies were being concentrated in extending this activity.

Several one bridge had been rebuilt (seven in concrete) and 23 repaired; three miles of new roads had been built and 10,520 feet of culverts installed. In addition 100 miles were graded each year and an effective drainage system carried out. Col. Duthan commended the Council for the work done by the staff, particularly to Capt. and treated that the Engineer-in-Chief by the Council would be essential for their success. He also thanked his colleagues for the very loyal support that they had given him during the past year.

On the subject of the pollution of the river, Mr. J. O. B. Baker asked if any reply to the letter of the Council to the Government had been received. The Council Government had been asked and stressed the vital importance of the water question and the advisability of the formation of a Water Board for the Colony. It was decided to ask Government for an early reply to the Council's letter.

Council Vacancies

In connection with the proposals to nominate persons to fill the vacancies in the Council, the Chairman expressed some disappointment that the matters had, apparently, been left to lapse. He considered that it was an injustice that public interest in affairs was lacking. It was stressed that there were many difficulties in the districts in getting in nominations in time and it was suggested that if the Clerk to Council gave the necessary notifications of impending vacancies, the complaints of spathy and lack of interest would be removed. Eventually it was decided to nominate to H. E. the Governor that Capt. A. R. H. H. Major J. O. K. Dohp and Capt. H. Jackson be nominated to fill the vacancies in Wards 5 and 7, respectively. Following a discussion on the subject of unauthorised irrigation works in native reserves and their effect upon the water supply in European farms, in which Col. Maxwell, the District Commissioner and others spoke, a 52-losing resolution was passed nem. con.—

I knew that the express was due to give a minute and I had got to say it. I was just in time. The express was pulled up at Abbots Langley, a short way up the line.
