FRONTIER. AN EFFORT TO PREVENT NEWS PIRACY.

A Special Poll Tax Ordinance Continued.

The Northern Frontier Poll Tax Ordinance, 1930, which expires at the end of this year, was continued by Kenya Legislative Council on Wednesday for a further period of three years.

It was explained by the Chief Native Commissioner that this Ordinance regularized the system of taxation throughout the Northern Frontier Province, and had been designed to deal with conditions not so prevalent in the other parts of the Colony by providing for the commutation of the tax by tribes or sections of tribes by agreement, and also empowering the Governor to fix the lump sum payable in the event of the tax not being realisable in any other way. Hence the measure had been to some extent an experiment, one, but the three years of depression it had been in operation had been of particular difficulty to the people in the Province. The persons liable to pay the tax were nomads, who roamed over vast areas of country not particularly fertile and the only source of their wealth was their stock. The Ordinance had therefore been put to a very hard test, so that members could not expect it to have done all that was anticipated.

Estimated Revenue. The estimated revenue in 1931 was £8,000, but the amount actually realised was £4,774 in 1932 the estimate required £4,283 and £6,964 was obtained. In 1933 the estimate was £4,730, but as that was likely to be exceeded it was altered to £4,850 and it is likely that more than £5,000 would be realised.

Taking all conditions into consideration, the Chief Native Commissioner thought the Ordinance had justified itself, and it had been administered with less difficulty and friction than many people would expect. The policy of commutation of tax had, however, gradually grown to the policy of individual payments, and the latter was almost entirely through- out.

The motion gave Capt. the Hon. J. Cotter, the opportunity of stating that while the best cases came from the Province this condition when it came to Isalo was such that only the hides really paid the tax, which means really paid the tax, which is economic value of this cattle could be put on the world market. This brought up the old question of whether it was possible to tax the cattle to the best possible advantage, whether in the form of meat products, tanning products, or in any other way.

The Chief Native Commissioner believed that Capt. Cotter was right in his assumption regarding the hides, and admitted that the tax on the hides was a problem the seriousness of which was realised by the Director of Agriculture. With reference to the export of cattle from the Province had been worked out it was always found the Colony could not afford it.

There was an other discussion, and the Ordinance was thus continued for three years.

Bill Which Seeks to Impose a Copyright.

A NECESSARY MEASURE.

To be Considered by a Select Committee.

Eight Bills were considered by the Kenya Legislative Council at its sitting on Wednesday, seven passed their second and third readings, and one was sent to a Select Committee for consideration and report.

This was "A Bill to confer temporary exclusive rights in respect of telegraphic Press messages" by imposing a copyright period of 72 hours from the time of publication, i.e. when the first copy of a newspaper leave the printing press to be put at the disposal of the public.

Press, news, stated the Postmaster General, in charge of the measure, had a definite commercial value, and large sums of money had been expended in its collection and distribution. It was, therefore, obviously wrong for those newspapers who subscribed to agencies, to suffer loss through piracy on the part of non-subscribers. This applied with greater force in the case of news received by newspapers from their own correspondents.

The Bill should go to a Select Committee was the request of the Hon. member, Mr. Lake, whose criticism was directed in detail for he welcomed the principle of the measure. It was undoubtedly high time there was such a Bill for there had been most flagrant piracy of news gangs on all over Kenya for a considerable time. He wondered whether Government had any information as to whether a similar measure was to be introduced into Zanzibar, Uganda and Tanganyika Territory, for reciprocity would then only apply to Kenya. Mr. Harvey asked whether the copyright would extend beyond Kenya if similar legislation was not introduced. In his opinion, the measure could be taken as a point as to whether a Kenya Bill could be made to apply outside the Colony.

Restricted to Kenya.

On the latter point the Attorney General very definitely informed him that a Bill passed by this Council could only apply to Kenya. As to the neighbouring territories adopting similar legislation the answer was in the negative, but "I submit that in no manner way should not be allowed to lead the way in the matter as Kenya always does."

Captain the Hon. H. E. Schwab, Nairobi South, had a comment to offer on a clause which in its present phrasing would prevent the omnibus by one paper or reference to telegraphic news received by another. Surely it was wrong to stop a newspaper commencing on what might be news of local importance.

LA. Col. the Hon. J. G. Kirkwood, Plateau North, expressed the view that the whole case rested at the expense of the Colony being they did not contribute to the revenues under the Licensing Ordinance.

The second reading was agreed to, and the Bill was referred to a Select Committee of the Attorney General as Chairman, the Postmaster General, the Provincial Commissioner of the Province, the Hon. H. F. Wood, (Nairobi North), Major the Hon. J.O.K. Delap (Ukamba), and the Hon. Abdul Wahid.

said the Acting Director of Agriculture. One gap had been the exclusion of wheat for animal consumption, "which appears to have been done for a shaggy, in the dietetic habits of many animals," he remarked, "in the country, for they have gone over to wholesale diet."

The other was an extension from the operations of the Pool of wheat sent to neighbouring territories, Tanganyika and Uganda. His assignment to the first Bill, Trading in Unwrought Precious Minerals Ordinance, 1933, consisted of the insertion of the word "or" so that a person had no need to take out two licences in order to do business under one while it also revoked the Commissioner's power of revoking a licence without reference to the Governor in Council, although such power has not as yet been exercised.

The Arms and Ammunition Ordinance, 1933, was amended so that the holder of an arm licence for a rifle, could not lend the weapon to a person who only held a licence for a shotgun; the licence of both must be of the same class. The next was an amendment of the Registration of Titles Ordinance, 1927, closing up certain ambiguities in certain provisions of the Bill of Exchange Ordinance, 1927, was altered so that those sections which relate to crossed cheques be not applicable to bearer cheques. The Drugs and Poisons Ordinance was amended by excluding metallic mercury and the specifics of the metal, metals used exclusively in mining operations from the provisions of the Ordinance. The final Bill amended the Bankruptcy Ordinance of 1930, first by giving to bankrupt's agent authority to sign papers on his behalf, secondly, by allowing the Official Receiver to give a trustee permission to take any such action on behalf of the estate of an applicant to the court; while this Bill will enable amendments to be made to the Rules under the Ordinance.



ROAD AND WEATHER REPORT.

Mr. Galton-Fenzi writes as follows— "The week's rainfall has been very patchy practically all over East Africa. Good rain however has fallen between Nairobi and the Lake, in various parts of Uganda and at the Coast."

In Kenya the wettest place this week was Makindu with nearly 5 inches of rain, then comes Simba with 4 inches, Mackinnon Road 3 1/2 inches, Mombasa, Kabete, Nyeri and Thika 2 1/2 inches, and Fort Hall, Lamuru, Mtschokos and Voi 1 1/2 inches. Uganda, the roads were wet and in certain parts chains must be used.

In Tanganyika there have been very few local showers, and all roads are very dry. In fact condition I would also like to mention that the Arusha Longido road is now in fair condition having been under repair for the last few weeks. The repairs to this road are not yet completed, but motorists can travel along this section in two to two and a half hours in comfort. The Broken Hill area has had more than its share of the rain this week having registered 6 inches to date.

In Uganda there have also been a few local showers, but as usual all roads in that area are excellent everywhere.

Disarmament, War Debts and Unemployment.

OPPOSITION CRITICISMS. Labour Party in Minority Elections.

Parliament met today for the first time since the election and clear up some of the work left over from the summer.

The bonds of co-operation between parties set up two years ago was as strong and as necessary as ever.

He also stated that the figure was 75 per cent less than the rate of interest for the same service and with the same type of personnel of the K.U.R.R.  
Now considering that the K.U.R.R. has been rebuilt from the coast to Nairobi, that the route, and that the Tanganyika Railway, Uganda Railway, and East African Railway have all been built from the coast to the interior, the enormous difference in maintenance cost is considerably more than 75 per cent. I am glad to see the attention of the administration of the K.U.R.R.

**OUTBREAK OF DISEASE AMONG NATIVES.**

Kampala, Nov. 28.—The Veterinary Department are busily engaged in dealing with the outbreak of rinderpest in North Ankole as we have not heard of any other outbreaks since the first outbreak was broken out among the local natives on the 17th. The outbreak has spread over an area of 100 square miles. The disease is spreading rapidly. It is necessary to place a number of schecks in the area in order to quarantine which, of course, seriously interferes with the movements of cattle that can be dealt with.

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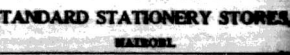
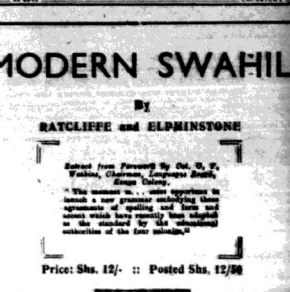
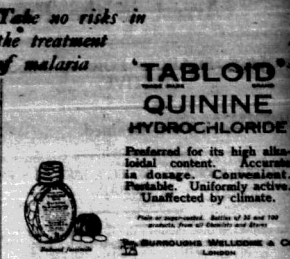

**HOW TO TAKE CARE OF OUR PETS.**

No. 7.

**GOATS.**

Dear Children, I will tell you how to take care of your goats. They are not so often kept in Kenya as they are in England, but still you may be interested to hear something about them.

There are many different breeds of goats, but in this country we only see a few of them, for instance the Angora goat, the Bechuanaland goat, and then there are the Angora goats, with their long white silky hair. These are much more attractive to look at, but are more difficult to keep, as their long hair gets matted, and has to be carefully brushed and combed.

As regards food, if you have a garden with plenty of grass, your goat can feed itself sufficiently by grazing through it advantageously. Very cold weather to give it a warm bran mash. Goats fed by hand, eat about 14 lbs. of food a day, though of course it rather depends on the size and the appetite of the animal. Some goats are more voracious than others.

They should be fed three times a day, and always have a good supply of water to drink. Book says is very good for goats, and

jump should be placed in the goat house for them to lick when they feel inclined.

Their food should consist of cereals and fresh vegetables, especially cabbage, and brass rubbers in cold weather.

The goat house should be light and airy, but not draughty, and your goat should be kept in it during rain storms and at night.

See that the bedding in the goat house is not damp. If it is hay or sawdust, it should be changed every other day.

Goats moult once a year and as soon as this starts the goat should be given an extra bath brushing and combing every day. The moult usually begins round the head and neck by and removing the old hair by combing you help the growth of the new hair.

Goats must have a certain amount of exercise and can be taken out when quite tame on a lead and allowed to browse as they go along or they can be turned out to graze in a field. A wire fence is the best arrangement so that it is not necessary to look after them.

If this is not possible, and you are compelled to use your goat out here it should during the day, so that it can get a change of grass. You will probably find that your goat will treat its rope with round the post, so try this way of tying it. This is a bad rope, say 4 to 2 1/2 in. in diameter, made of twisted rope, and ground, and round it place a loose wire ring. Now fasten the goat's rope to the ring and it will be able to run round the post without fear of getting caught up.

Place your goat where it can do no damage to your garden, for goats are very destructive animals, and will soon spoil your flowers and shrubs.

Choose a well drained piece of ground, for if a goat is tied in a swampy place it may develop foot rot, and die not only by the roadside where it may be worried by passers-by or by straying dogs.

If the post stands with its back up and its head down facing the wind it is a sign the weather is unseasonable and it will be better to put it in the goat house to avoid a storm.

Goats soon become very tame and will follow like a dog. Being friendly, they can soon be taught to do many things, and I have found that other animals in the household will be very friendly to them.

In their wild state goats live in high rocky places and so have become very active and sure footed. They are much heavier than sheep, and will often turn and face the wind when they are grazing. They live in herds, led by a certain one called the head-goat, but by some one else, the head-goat is usually followed by thought to be the leader, but in fact it is only a follower, and when there is any fighting so be done.

This is the case with many wild animals, living in herds or packs, the leader being chosen because he knows the country and the places where animals are concealed. Those who disobey him are turned out, and usually get caught by their enemies, unless they join up quickly with another herd.

Goats milk is very nourishing, and they are much easier and less expensive to keep than cows.

# Colonial Small Bore Rifle Shooting.

## KENYA WIN THE TROPHY WITH AN EXCELLENT SCORE.

### Eight Colonies Enter.

#### A MARGIN OF 21 POINTS — MRS. IRVINE MAKES TOP INDIVIDUAL SCORE.

Kenya, competing against the eight other Colonial Teams, have won the 1933 Colonial Rifle Association Small Bore Match. Kenya scored 1946 points against Trinidad's 1915, and thus won the Challenge Cup and ten silver medals.

This is an exceptionally fine performance and should go a long way to further the popularity of shooting in the Colony. Captain Irvine is to be congratulated on the success of his team and also that of his own family. Their success is due in no small amount to the trouble he took to get the team together and to arrange practice.

**Little Practice.**

Most of the members of the Kenya Team had only about four practices before competing in the match, and under these circumstances, and with the shortage of rifles, it was impossible to ask a great number to attend the practice. "The shooting in the trials was satisfactory," writes the Captain of the Kenya Rifle Club, "but not nearly what it would have been if every member had had his own rifle and could have had his own silent practice three or four days a week."

**Conditions for the Shoot.**

"This year the conditions of the shoot had been slightly changed and it was not necessary for all to shoot at the same range nor on the same day. I took advantage of this alteration and decided that members of my own family should shoot on my farm on September 22. Captain W. W. B. Irvine shot down approximately 200 birds, and I was able to act as witness. The remainder of the team were to shoot at Nairobi on October 1st when a final selection was made."

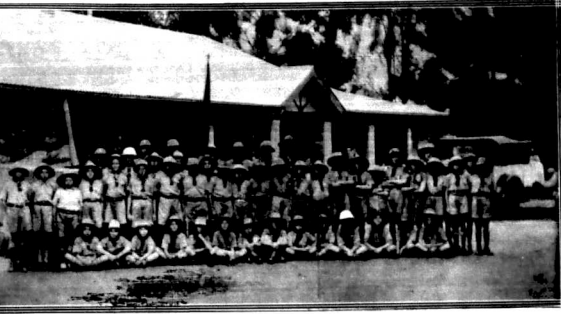

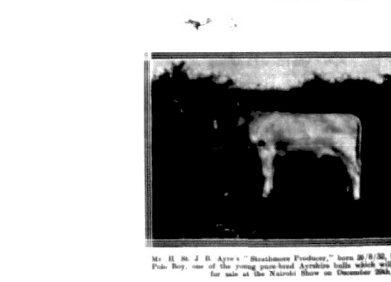

# Sail Replaces Steam on East African Coast.

## LAST CALL OF PACKET AT LAMU.

### Unable to Compete with Dhows.

### HIGH COST OF SUPPLYING A REGULAR SERVICE.

In the battle for trade on the coast, north of Mombasa, the dhow has temporarily defeated the steamer. Owing to the high cost of running a regular service the steamer is unable to compete with the sailing vessel, and as a result the a.s. "Aryamonte" has made its last call at Lamu.

While the steamers have matters all their own way during the four months of the south-west monsoon, the dhow secure the bulk of the coastal trade during the other three months, while they also have the additional advantage of being able to put in and trade in a number of small creeks and harbours at which the steamers cannot call.

A steamer service for Kenya ports, is however, considered to be a necessity, and various suggestions have been put forward to Government whereby a regular call at Lamu, Mombasa and Zanzibar, which should not be undertaken by dhow is important from the point of view of coastal development.

## A Serious Position.

Lamu, November 18.—The coastal steamer trade is advertised to make its last call at Lamu to-day. From Lamu it is proposed to pass on to the coast, and to pass from the coast to Lamu. With its withdrawal from the coast run the facilities for communication by sea between Lamu and Kisumu, Mombasa, Zanzibar and other ports, revert to those available in the days when the Phoenicians ruled the waves of the Indian sea.

## Governor's Address to Legislative Council.

### ENCOURAGING FACTORS IN COLONY'S OUTLOOK.

#### Importance of Mining.

#### FIRM REPLY TO RECENT CRITICISMS BY CHURCH DIGNITARIES.

In opening the new session of the Kenya Legislative Council in Nairobi on Tuesday His Excellency Sir Joseph Byrne announced that the Budget for 1954 would be balanced with a surplus of £4,448.

The Governor stated that he approached his third Budget with a lighter heart and he stressed the many encouraging factors both in Britain and in Kenya which suggested a greatly improved outlook.

He invited the co-operation of the country in the tasks which lay ahead.

The Governor reiterated his faith in the mining industry and gave an assurance that he would do all in his power to encourage its development.

In a reply to critics of the Colony, His Excellency recorded the fact that during the past eight months no complaints had been made either against natives or by natives in the Kakamega area and he quoted the view expressed by the population in the southern section of the field that they would welcome more miners and were disappointed that so few had arrived.

The Governor expressed that in common justice men of position and influence should be afforded the opportunity of ascertaining the true facts before commenting on happenings in regard to which they could not possibly have any first-hand knowledge. His remarks in this connection were greeted with applause.

#### Appeal for Co-operation.

The budget session of Kenya Legislative Council was opened in Nairobi on Tuesday morning by His Excellency the Governor, Sir Joseph Byrne, K.C.M.G., K.B.E., C.B., with seven ceremonial hosts. #### CO-OPERATION WITH NEIGHBOURING TERRITORIES ESSENTIAL.

The policy of development and expansion in Uganda, which has been interrupted during the past two years by world conditions, will now be resumed, was the keynote of the speech by the Governor, Sir Bernard Houston, at the opening of Legislative Council last week.

He said that the Protectorate struck him as a fertile and pleasant country estate, which was only partially developed. In the centre stood an unpretentious building, badly furnished with little in the way of adornment, but the structure was built on very solid foundations, while the estate was but lightly encumbered.

Although a poor country, Uganda was not in a state of poverty, owing to the fact that no attempt had been made to live beyond its means. Any increase in prosperity could, therefore, be devoted, not to offsetting past extravagances, but to definite development.

After referring to the satisfactory state of the Protectorate's finances, the Governor said that he was not advocating a policy of wide expenditure and expressed a warning against undue optimism, but the country could not stand still and they must set the house in order.

It does not mean that we are in the state of poverty which we see little hope of improvement in the country. We have had the good sense in the past to make no attempt to mortgage our future. Any that we have had to do with therefore is devoted, not to offsetting past extravagances, but to definite development. You will have gathered my general impression of the country. It is not so bad as it is made out to be, but at the same time would seem to require a more systematic and modest rather than the soundings. I have done so because I am sure that the only way in which my opinion we should not be content with our present standard of living, but should make every attempt to improve it.

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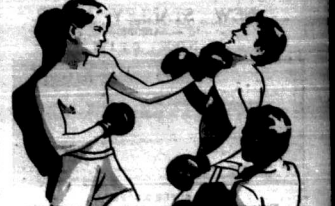

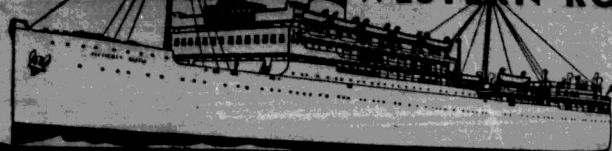

## UNTIL TANGANYIKA'S PEOPLE CAN STAND ALONE.

### Lord Lugard's Geneva Formula.

#### MANDATES COMMISSION'S HINT OF SUPERVISION OF KENYA AND UGANDA.

After the long and critical debate at Geneva on Britain's policy of closer co-operation in East Africa it was left to Lord Lugard to provide a formula which would be acceptable to the Mandates Commission.

He dismissed most of the criticisms as not being based on facts and in a note of two paragraphs expressed the pleasure of the Commission on learning that there had been no intention of putting into execution any scheme of closer union of a political or constitutional character which would now or in the future divide the separate entity of the country as a constitutional unit.

His second paragraph referred to the phrase "the time is not yet ripe" used by the British Government and placed on record the Commission's view that the time could not come until the inhabitants were able to stand alone and until that time arrived steps should be taken which tend towards political closer union.

Japanese and Portuguese delegates allied themselves with the criticism of British policy and the Chairman tentatively expressed the view that if administrative unions such as had been discussed were effected, no logical consequence must necessarily ensue—the Commission's supervision must extend also to the territories united to Tanganyika.

### Critics of Britain's Policy.

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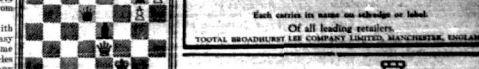

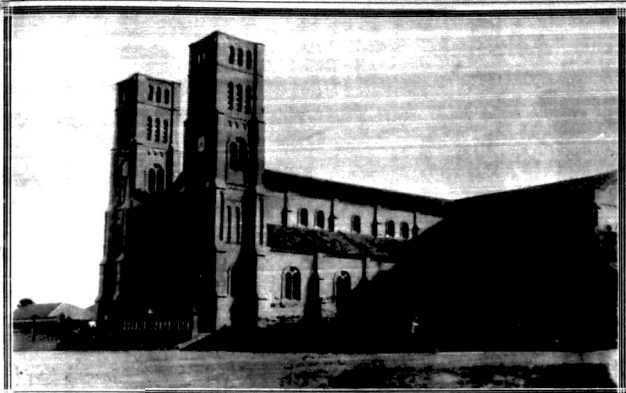

TRAGIC DEATH OF MR. HENRY TARTON.

Attacked While Fishing. Tragedy in a Boat.

Well-known Figure in Colony's Life.

Mr. Henry Tarton, the well-known Kenya settler, was found dead in the dam on his farm some eight miles from Nairobi early on Monday morning.

Mr. Tarton left his home which is about two miles from the dam about four o'clock on the afternoon with the intention of fishing in the dam.

The Discovery. Between eight and nine o'clock on Monday morning two fish boys employed on the farm went to the dam with the news that they had seen their master's body in the water.

Members of the family hurried to the spot where they found Mr. Tarton's body and the dam had the edge of the dam and quite close to the boat from which he had been fishing.

It seemed evident that Mr. Tarton had been attacked from behind while sitting in the boat. The police have not been able to find any marks on the boat and his head had been terribly mutilated, evidence suggesting that he was struck on the head with a pole or other sharp object.

Sabukia has always had a reputation for faith in itself as a district. That faith is being demonstrated now in a steady movement towards mixed farming on smaller acreages.

# FINANCIAL CRISIS IN U.S.A.

## Resignation of Adviser to Treasury.

### DISAGREES WITH PRESENT MONETARY POLICY.

#### Country's Credit in Danger.

#### THREATENED WITH A COMPLETE BREAKDOWN.

President Roosevelt's present monetary policy threatens a complete breakdown of the United States Government's credit.

This statement is contained in a letter to President Roosevelt from Mr. O. M. W. Sprague, an Adviser to the Treasury, resigning his appointment as a protest against the present financial programme.

Mr. Sprague is fundamentally opposed to the purchase of gold abroad, on the ground that it will be ineffective to secure a speedy rise in prices. Depreciation of the dollar has not increased the demand for labour or material.

He warns the President that there is no defence against the drift towards unrestrained inflation other than organised public opinion. Distortions of currency is already manifest and will extend.

The effect of Mr. Sprague's resignation was reflected on Wall Street by a further fall of the dollar.

#### President Remains Firm.

(BY WIRELESS.)

A conference of Senators, industrialists and economists at Washington, November 18, 1920, was convened by the influential Senators Thomas and Smith, passed a resolution that the purchase policy be continued until currency prices reached the level of the gold standard. The conference appointed a committee to submit recommendations for the broadening of the money base by the use of silver.
