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Three-point plan for Kenya

VOTING ON COMMON ROLL URGED BY LIBERAL PEER

LORD OGMORE, a former Labour and now a Liberal peer, said in the House of Commons yesterday that Colonial Secretary should make it plain that the constitutional status of Kenya was that one adult should get one vote.

This was one of three points put forward during the opening of the debate on Kenya. Lord Ogmore said the country must remain under British control until a fully democratic constitution is agreed which takes over.

His third point was that an independent Kenyan Legislative Council should be elected on a franchise common to all tribal communities, tribal rights, racial rights or anything of that kind.

Earlier, Lord Ogmore had called the release of James Kariuki, who was held by the Government to show that they were not responsible for his death.

'No great peril'

He said: "I am not at all worried about what is being done to prevent a coup." He added that with the number of supporters of the Mau Mau there could be no great peril to the safety of the Royal Family.

Last year, Lord Perth said, Kenya had been faced with a rebellion against the British Government. This would need the same number of Americans to take part in it as the Mau Mau did.

The professor of law said that the rebellion had been put down on a military basis.

Lord Ogmore said: "Kenya was better equipped to defend itself than Britain. We have the British Government."

Kenya had to be given more time to develop its economy.

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
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TOP SEEDS MEET IN FINAL OF SQUASH

PAKISTAN SALUTES TOURING AMERICAN LEADER

PRESIDENT Eisenhower arrived yesterday evening in Ankara on his historic 10,000-mile goodwill tour of three continents.

London hint of far-reaching constitutional changes

ADVANCES IN TANGANYIKA

Address by Governor awaited

In a dispatch from its special correspondent visiting Nairobi, the London "Daily Mail" yesterday predicted far-reaching constitutional changes in Tanganyika.

The dispatch said the Governor, Sir Richard Turnbull, would announce these changes next Tuesday and the world would like to have repercussions in other parts of East Africa.

Sir Richard, who recently was the Colonial Secretary, Mr. Michael Stewart, is expected to propose not only that the Elected Ministers be given a majority in the new Government after the 1960 General Election, but also to give a majority of voters among Elected Members in the new Legislative Council.

The proportion of their seats would be five Africans to one European, and the new Government, it was said, would be to turn Tanganyika effectively into an African State, probably under the leadership of the president of the African National Union, Mr. Jomo Kenyatta.

The "Daily Mail" quoted Mr. Kenyatta as saying he would be anxious to see the new constitution adopted as soon as possible, whatever the result of the election.

The report said a by-election in Nairobi, which was due to be held on December 15, had been postponed until January 12, and that Parliament would open on January 15.

The report said the British Ambassador had said the new constitution would be adopted in January.

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
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
