



ABSTRACT

This research project should be treated just as a starting point for further investigations into why many development projects aimed at improving the living conditions of the slum dwellers or peoples settlements fail in Kenya. The Mathare 4A and Kibera slums up-grading projects performed dismally due to similar pertinent problems. The peoples settlement electrification project has also had its share of hiccups due to the perennial misunderstanding between the various stakeholders arising from lack of proper information and participatory approach to the project implementation. The main project implementer; KPLC made serious negative assumptions concerning the populace of the peoples settlements which made them oppose the project from the on-set. The issues like use of load limiters made the residents feel the power they were being supplied with was of low quality and not enough for their usage so they continued to resort to the illegal supply from the slum cartels who are stealing power from KPLC. The cartels also capitalized on lack of proper information to the residents from the implementer so as to raise fighting mechanisms to bring the project down for their illegal trade to could continue thriving.

The research project also faced serious problems on obtaining information from KPLC staff, slum residents and other stakeholders due to suspicion and negative opinions already formed on the project or vested interests in the project. There following findings and recommendations came out strongly from the research data;

Speed of project implementation:

The implementation rate is too slow resulting in targeted customers resorting to illegal connections as a result of too long waiting periods. This has to improve through proper resource availability and coordination.

Pre-paid metering methods:

Most of the residents of the slums are in casual labour force; being paid per day or weekly, so accumulating their electricity consumption for a whole month make them feel it is expensive.

The power utility company should introduce daily power paying method like EDUs with even small unit purchases like with Ksh 20/=, the way mobile phone providers are doing. This will make the residents purchase their consumptions when they need and with proper balancing with other competing needs. This explains why even butcheries and shops in these areas have even measures for things like meat, cooking fat, unga just for single meal consumptions.

Proper stakeholder involvement:

The slum residents have little information about the projects and when they have the information it is piecemeal and liable to misinterpretation. The implementer should have thorough and friendly customer education so as to win the support of opinion leaders and other decision makers in the areas.

Connection charges/Fixed charges:

This makes customers in these areas feel electricity is expensive and so they resort to illegal connections. The provider should do away with these as they stand to gain through savings in revenue lost due to illegal connections.

The research further recommends wider coverage in the area of study to make the recommendations all inclusive.

CHAPTER ONE

Introduction

Background of the Study

This proposal is particularly intended to study the effectiveness of existing power supply programme to Peoples settlement schemes in Kenya. Peoples settlement schemes; previously known as slums, which are prevalent all over urban and peri-urban centers of the country mainly consist of low income, semi-permanent houses. They face many unique challenges of insecurity, lack of infra-structure including connection to electricity, sewerage system, water supply and accessibility (road networks). In addition, where there is electricity supply is characterized by high system losses due to rampant electricity theft through illegal connections and high incidences of electricity related accidents (fires and electrocution) due to poor premises wiring standards. In addition there is very low supply reliability due to overload as a result of un-projected load growths and vandalism.

There have been therefore many discussions recently regarding how best to address the matter of extending power to most of the residents of the people's settlement as they hold a big fraction of the Kenyan population which cannot be ignored in an attempt to take development and service to the people of Kenya.

Clifford Woody correctly states that research “involves defining and redefining problems, formulating hypothesis or suggested solutions, collecting, organizing and evaluating data, making deductions and reaching conclusions; and lastly carefully testing the conclusions to determine whether they fit the formulated hypothesis or suggested solutions”. It is along these premise that the study will basically seek to establish whether the existing programme of extending power supply connections to the peoples settlements have been effective in the provision of safe and affordable electricity to these people in a way to start to improve the dignity, quality of life, security, health, education and employment prospects of these highly disadvantaged yet major segment of the Kenyan society.

The study will try to answer the following questions;

What percentage of the peoples settlements in Nairobi have been covered so far since the programme started?

Is the supplied electricity affordable to the populace of these settlements?

What is the net impact of the programme so far on the people's lives?

Are the beneficiaries supportive of the programme?

How has the programme impacted on the following?

- Commercial losses through electricity theft.
- Safety of users and other residents of the people's settlements.
- Technical losses attributable to system overloads and planning.

The methodology we intend to use in collection of data will include questionnaires and interview schedules to beneficiaries (users/customers already connected), residents not yet connected, KPLC officers involve in the programme and development groups working within the peoples settlements. Relevant data will also be collected from KPLC installations and records for analysis to ensure validity and reliability of the research outcome.

The study is expected to bring out clearly the specific gains made so far and to pin point major shortcomings which can be addressed to enhance the effectiveness and efficiency of power supply programmes to peoples settlement schemes in Kenya.

In the recent years, taking development to the people has been one of the most important commitments of the Government of Kenya to its people. Having power connection is not only an improvement to people's quality of life but is a gateway to many development activities of the people including job creation through encouraging Small and Medium Enterprises(SME). Most people who reside in peoples settlements lack employment opportunities and constitute a big percentage of the population; approximately 80% for Nairobi.

It is for this reason that The Kenya Power and Lighting Company Limited (KPLC), having been given a target of connecting additional 150,000(one hundred and fifty thousand) customers annually by the government, decided to focus on the peoples

settlements; with pilots programmes in Kibera, Mukuru,Kariobangi, Korogocho and Mathare; all in Nairobi.

Theft of electricity has been rampant in the peoples settlements through illegal connection to electricity done by cartels who tap un-metered power from KPLC and sell it to the residents at exorbitant fees fleecing both the residents as well as denying KPLC its much needed improved sales revenue.

The cartels also use their proceeds to support “mungiki” activities hence deteriorating the security situation in the settlements and the neighborhoods. There have been many cases of fires in the peoples settlements some of which have been attributed to unsafe connection to electricity and poor wiring standards of the premises. This has led to KPLC with the help of the government and other development partners teaming up to see the best way possible to enhance connection to safe and reliable electricity to residents of the peoples settlements. The necessity of this effort and the programme is covered in KPLC'S connection policy (2007).

STATEMENT OF THE PROBLEM

The purpose of the study is to assess whether the programme which is on-going in the pilot schemes of Kibera, Mathare, Kariobangi, Korogocho and Mukuru slums in Nairobi are effectively addressing the intended purposes and creating the desired impacts in the lives of the residents of the peoples settlements. The study will try to investigate any shortcomings and propose plausible remedial actions necessary to enhance the chances of success of the programme.

The study tends to put more emphasis on the contribution of power supply connections to the quality of life, creation of employment opportunities, improved security, improved safety and reduction of both commercial and technical losses as well as how enhancing the efficiency and effectiveness of the programme can yield more beneficial impacts to the peoples settlements.

The study will also highlight the society's understanding and perception of the power supply programme to the peoples settlements in Kenya and how this can be improved so

as to enhance effectiveness and efficiency. The study will however try to balance the interest of all the stakeholders; KPLC, landlords, tenants, victims and beneficiaries of the programme. The research's basic understanding is that a problem clearly defined and understood is in its first stage of solution.

Research Objectives

Professor W. A. Neiswanger correctly states that the statement of the objective is of basic importance because it determines the data which are to be collected, the characteristics of the data which are relevant, relations which are to be explored, the choice of the techniques to be used in these explorations and the form of the final report.

This particular research project is intended to give limelight to KPLC managers, on what has been achieved and what needs to be achieved in line with the expectations of all the stakeholders. It will also try to bring out the attitudes of the various stakeholders to the programme and how these can be positively influenced through creation of awareness on the importance of the programme and what opportunities will be created for positive impacts on the lives of the residents of the peoples settlements if the programme is effectively and efficiently implemented.

The research is also intended to provide unbiased report on the programme impacts on the peoples settlements to all the stakeholders; KPLC, The Kenya Government and other development partners who are interested in improving the quality of lives of these venerable and remarkable members of the Kenyan society, by giving up to date much needed information on what their support has yielded and how much can be achieved in the near future.

The following are the specific objectives of this study:-

1. To establish whether the main objectives of the programme are being addressed and which particular activities are being carried in line with them.
2. To identify the problems which have been encountered and workable solutions acceptable to all the stakeholders.

3. To assess the responses and attitudes of the various stakeholders and develop how these can be captured in the programme so as to enhance effectiveness and efficiency of the programme.
4. To establish a roadmap to aid faster implementation of the programme.
5. To establish the significant changes the programme has created in the lives of the residents of the peoples settlements so far covered.

Research Questions

The following are some of the questions that the research will strive to answer:

1. What are the objectives and goals of the programme? And what are the main activities necessary to achieve the objectives?
2. What are the major successful activities so far achieved since the inception of the programme? And which are the main obstacles or challenges to programme implementation so far encountered?
3. What are the responses of the people who have benefited from the programme as well as those who have not benefited from the programme but are in the peoples settlements?
4. What are the lessons so far learnt and how can they be incorporated into the programme?
5. What is the most significant impact of the project on the lives of the residents of the peoples settlement schemes so far covered?

Significance of the Study

Once the study is completed, it will clearly bring out some of the activities necessary to propel the programme to greater success and facilitate faster roll out so as to address the issue of providing electricity connection to these very important segment of the Kenyan population. The study will thus assist in improving the quality of life of the residents of the peoples settlements in Kenya and enable KPLC improve their customer connectivity, reduce both commercial and technical losses, as well as enable the Kenya Government enhance the provision of essential services to these segment of the society.

The study will also be able to offer invaluable insight to KPLC, The Government and their development partners as to the attitudes of the society to the programme and how best to bring in the interest of all the stakeholders so as to have high programme effectiveness, efficiency and long term viability.

The study on the other hand will help create the much needed awareness to the society of the programme, its goals and objectives as well as how the residents of the peoples settlements will benefit if the programme is successfully implemented in all the peoples settlements in the country.

This is hoped to spearhead more involvement from development partners and the beneficiaries through financial and other necessary support.

Definition of Significant Terms

Universe/population: Complete set of individuals, cases or objections with some common observable characteristics.

Census: Complete enumeration of all the items in the population.

Sample: A subset of a particular population obtained from the accessible population which is representative of the entire population.

Target population: That population to which a researcher wants to generalize the results of the study

Subject/respondent/interviewee: Each member or case in the sample.

Sampling: Is the process of selecting a number of individuals for the study in such away that the individuals selected represent the large group from which they are selected.

Data: Refers to all the information a researcher gathers for his/her study.

Problem statement: Is a specific statement that clearly conveys the purpose of the research study.

Sampling frame: A list, directory or index of cases from which a sample can be selected for the study

Electricity Utility Company: the Company responsible for the sale of electricity in an area.

Organization of the study

The project study will be divided into five chapters; chapter one will cover introduction to the slums electrification project, statement of the research problem, research objectives, and research questions, significance of the study and definitions of significant terms to be used in the study.

Chapter Two will explore the slums electrification projects in Kenya and carry out comparisons with what is going on for similar projects in India and South Africa and finally develop a theoretical framework to be used in the research study.

Chapter Three will develop appropriate research methodology to be used in the research, define the research scope, and develop appropriate research design, define the target population, develop sampling techniques and finally come up with data collection procedures.

Chapter Four will deal with data presentations and analysis while chapter Five will finally come up with research conclusions and recommendations to be followed as well as any further research suggestions.

CHAPTER TWO

Literature Review

Defining Peoples Settlements

Definition of a peoples settlement or squatter settlement varies widely from country to country and depends on a variety of defining parameters. In general, it is considered as a residential area in an urban locality inhabited by the very poor who have no access to tenured land of their own, and hence "squat" on vacant land, either private or public. For the millions of poor in developing areas of the world, urban areas have always been a means for improving their quality of living and environment, besides getting better jobs and incomes. This, in contrast to deteriorating conditions in the rural areas has generated a considerable flow of migrants to cities, particularly in the last three decades. Priorities of urban migrants change over time, depending on various conditions that they find themselves. But one of the first dilemmas that they face and which persist for a long period is the question of an adequate house. With little resources, financial or otherwise, skills or access to them, the drastic option of illegally occupying a vacant piece of land to build a rudimentary shelter is the only one available to them.

The problem is further compounded by the apathy and even anti-apathy of various government agencies who view the "invasion" of urban areas by "the masses" and the development of squatter settlements as a social "evil" that has to be "eradicated".

Such a confusing and knee-jerk reaction and attitude towards peoples settlements or squatter settlements has not helped the more basic question of "adequate housing for all". Qualifying definitions, characteristics, quality and examples of squatter settlements vary widely, with the inherent danger of generalization, but an attempt has been made to identify key features which are common to such areas and distinguish them.

Therefore a peoples settlement or a squatter settlement, can be defined as a residential area which has developed without legal claims to the land and/or permission from the concerned authorities to build; as a result of their illegal or semi-legal status, infrastructure and services are usually inadequate. There are essentially three defining

characteristics that helps us understand squatter settlement: the Physical, the Social and the legal with the reasons behind them being interrelated.

Physical Characteristics

A squatter settlement, due to its inherent "non-legal" status, has services and infrastructure below the "adequate" or minimum levels. Such services are both network and social infrastructure, like water supply, sanitation, electricity, roads and drainage; schools, health centres, market places etc.

Water supply, for example, to individual households may be absent, or a few public or community stand pipes may have been provided, using either the city networks, or a hand pump itself. Informal networks for the supply of water may also be in place. Similar arrangements may be made for electricity, drainage, toilet facilities etc. with little dependence on public authorities or formal channels.

Social Characteristics

Squatter settlement households belong to the lower income group, either working as wage labour or in various informal sector enterprises. On an average, most earn wages at or near the minimum wage level and mostly do part-time jobs. Squatters are predominantly migrants, either rural-urban or urban-urban. But many are also second or third generation squatters.

Legal Characteristics

The key characteristic that delineates a squatter settlement is its lack of ownership of the land parcel on which they have built their house. These could be vacant government or public land, or marginal land parcels like railway setbacks or "undesirable" marshy land. Thus when the land is not under "productive" use by the owner, it is appropriated by a squatter for building a house. It has to be noted here that in many parts of Asia, a land owner may "rent" out his land for a nominal fee to a family or families, with an informal or quasi-legal arrangement, which is not however valid under law.

In general, there are several attributes that act as generative forces and determine the quality and size of a settlement. Such attributes could be either internal to the settlement or external:

Squatter settlements have been in existence from a long time, in the sense that an individual other than the land owner has built houses with or without the consent of the land owner. But they were not illegal "squatter" settlements as we define and categorize them today. The term "squatter settlement" is in fact a more recent western-initiated development, which came about by the writings of Charles Abrams and John Turner and particularly during and immediately after the Habitat Conference of 1976 in Vancouver, Canada.

This delineation of such informal or spontaneous settlements as "squatter" settlements represented a growing change in attitude from outright hostility to that of support and protection.

Abrams (1964) illustrates the process of squatting as a "conquest" of city areas for the purpose of shelter, defined both by the law of force and the force of law.

Turner (1969) takes a positive outlook and portrays squatter settlements as highly successful solutions to housing problems in urban areas of developing countries. Payne (1977) similarly puts the development of squatter settlements in the overall perspective of urban growth in the third world and its inevitability. A vast number of case studies at the Habitat Conference at Vancouver in 1976 highlighted the conditions in squatter

settlements, calling for a concerted and committed approach towards solving the problems.

The Squatter

A "squatter" (in The Concise Oxford Dictionary) is a person who settles on new especially public land without title; a person who takes unauthorized possession of unoccupied premises. Therefore, a residential area occupied by squatters becomes a squatter settlement or peoples settlement.

But the narrow generalization, especially of settlement type is evident: everything from a brick-and-concrete multistoried house to an "occupied" cardboard carton become "squatter settlements". The need is so much more necessary to understand such settlements so that a concerted action can be taken.

Squatter Settlement - Alternative Names

One common confusion regarding squatter settlements is its relation to the term "slum". Encyclopedia Britannica defines a slum as "...a residential areas that are physically and socially deteriorated and in which satisfactory family life is impossible. Bad housing is a major index of slum conditions.

By bad housing is meant dwellings that have inadequate light, air, toilet and bathing facilities; that are in bad repair, dump and improperly heated; that do not afford opportunity for family privacy; that are subject to fire hazard and that overcrowded the land, leaving no space for recreational use....." Therefore, while a slum settlement refers to the condition of a settlement, squatter settlement or peoples settlement would refer to the legal position of the settlement.

There are a number of names by which squatter settlement are described by various authors, which highlight the attitudes and approaches towards them, ranging from a positive to neutral to negative outlook. These are:

- Informal settlements
- Low-income settlements
- Semi-permanent settlements
- Shanty towns

- Spontaneous settlements
- Unauthorized settlements
- Unplanned settlements
- Uncontrolled settlements
- Slums

The Development Process of a Squatter Settlement

The key question to be asked here is why do people squat? There are two reasons for this: one is internal to the squatter, and the other is external. Internal reasons include, lack of collateral assets; lack of savings and other financial assets; daily wage/low-income jobs (which in many cases are semi-permanent or temporary). External reasons include high cost of land and other housing services; apathy and anti-apathy on the part of the government to assist them; high "acceptable" building standards and rules and regulations; lopsided planning and zoning legislation.

These reasons leave no option for the low-income householder to squat on a vacant piece of land. The actual squatting is done either by a "slum lord" or simply a initial small group of core squatters. The slum lord appropriates a piece of vacant land, subdivides it and "sells" it to various households for the purpose of building a house.

Services like water-supply or electricity may be provided either by this person or by the organization of the squatters, usually at the community level.

The core group squatters are a small number of families who, almost overnight, occupy a piece of land and build a rudimentary and temporary shelter.

Later, depending on the degree of threat of eviction, this may be upgraded to a permanent and more families may join this group. There are two distinct processes involved in the formation of a settlement. One is the organic and induced processes. The organic process refers to the forces and pressures which are initiated from within the settlement and squatter. They evolve naturally, without any outside intervention and using internal resources of the family or settlement for development, such as labour, locally available materials etc. The induced process refers to the "inducement" set up by agencies and organizations which are external to the settlement. Operating with objectives and goals on a larger, city-wide scale, they initiate programmes and projects for the overall development of the settlement. Both these put together act on the growth of a squatter settlement, through a series of consolidative stages of development.

These stages are conclusive in their outcome, in the sense that they represent a continuum with one stage or process overlapping and even running parallel to each other. They are also cumulative in their effects and not exclusive.

Approaches towards a Squatter Settlement

Considering the magnitude and scale of the housing deficit and the lack of concerted action or inadequate response of government agencies, there is no doubt of the positive role that squatter housing plays in housing the millions of poor families.

The main question of land ownership and over utilized infrastructure and services will, however, always remain unanswered. Successive generations of governments have recognized this and a number of approaches have been adopted in finding a solution to the dilemma of squatting. The two popular approaches used by the public authorities have been settlement up-gradation and sites-and-services. Settlement up-gradation has been an option where a compromise has been reached by the land owner and on a sharing basis, the squatter has been allowed to continue on the land parcel, but with a significant up-

gradation of the settlement's infrastructure and services, including, in some cases, land leases or ownerships.

Where such land compromises or sharing has not been possible, the squatters have been relocated to another location, where varying levels of "sites"-and-"services" have been provided, with, again land lease or ownership. Land sharing is an approach which has brought about considerable settlement improvement by the initiative of the people themselves.

The squatter, after having organized themselves into a viable organization, have initiated negotiations with the land owner and have "shared" the land, giving the prime locations of the land (for example, the side facing a road) to the owner and using the remaining for their housing, but in a more organized and improved manner. The role of non-governmental and voluntary organizations has to be emphasized in this respect, in mobilization of the people into an organization, in training and educating them, in forming a link with the authorities, and in various other catalytic ways.

As a complement to this, the participation of the community of squatters, in improving the quality of their settlement is also an important resource that has to be tapped for improvement.

Commonly, community credit programmes, for example, are used as a rallying point for bringing the squatters not only because money itself is important, but also because of the externalities that it can generate.

Future Role of Squatter Settlements in Urban Housing

Squatter settlements in urban areas are inevitable phenomena. As long as urban areas offer economies of scale and agglomeration economies, large cities will always continue to grow attracting migrants from rural and smaller urban areas, leading to more squatting. There is no universal "quick-fix" solution that can solve all the problems of squatting in all parts of the developing world. Considering the inevitability of squatting, the need is primarily for a change in attitude towards squatting, squatters and squatter settlements. One such approach that has been receiving considerable attention from various government and public authorities has been the "enabling" approach, where instead of

taking a confrontationist attitude, governments have strived to create an enabling environment, under which people, using and generating their own resources, could find unique local solutions for their housing and shelter problems.

Electricity Supply to Peoples Settlements

It is evident that the peoples settlements or squatter settlements need basic facilities and infrastructure like roads, sewerage, health facilities and electricity connection despite their poor housing conditions.

Kenyan Situation

In Kenya this is the responsibility of The Kenya Power and Lighting Company Limited which is a state corporation charged with the responsibility of transmitting, distributing and selling electrical energy to customers (consumers) throughout Kenya and at the moment enjoys monopoly in the business.

It is to be in line with both its vision and mission, and the social cooperate responsibility that KPLC has made several endevours to take electricity supply to all parts of the country including the peoples settlements despite the many constraints and challenges. The Kenya government as the major shareholder in KPLC has been supportive in the struggle to make electricity connection reach as many people as possible.

This has been done through Rural electrification Programme (REP) as well as individual/group customer connection initiatives.

The power supply to peoples settlements has been in the past left to individual/group initiatives as most of the peoples settlements are located next to areas well supplied by electricity as well as areas not initially categorized as rural.

The Energy act 2006 which became operational in year 2007 recognized the challenges in supplying electricity to the peoples settlements and opened up for them to benefit from The Kenya Government / Development partners funding through Rural Electrification Programme(REP).

The Kenya power and lighting company as the sole distributor of electrical energy in the country also ignored the peoples settlements in the past as an avenue to increase its sales and connectivity growth.

The connections in the peoples settlements was therefore left to the beneficiaries themselves and middlemen who came in to capitalize on the existing gap to make unwarranted benefits by exploiting the potential customers. The few customers who had connection also resorted to selling supply to their neighbours at higher rates or charging the neighbours fees to allow them have their electricity meters from KPLC installed at their service lines.

The extended connections in these settlements resulted in over-distanced, under-protected and poor workmanship in the supply lines in the peoples settlements with serious and negative effects on safety and standards of supplies to the residences. The desperate residents resorted to using unconventional methods to get connected to electrical supply with most of the supplies being un-metered and wrong wiring methods used to distribute the illegal supply extensive throughout most of the peoples settlements. The uncontrolled sales and distribution of electricity awaken KPLC and the authorities as the theft of electricity reached unacceptable levels in these settlements as well as high incidences of fires, electrocution and general insecurity. KPLC resorted to sweep operation in the peoples settlements with the help of the administration and security forces to disconnect the illegal connections. The act which always encountered resistance and lack of co-operation from the residents of the peoples settlements as well as the cartels who were engaged or beneficiaries of the proceeds of the illegal connections/sales. It therefore became apparent that alternative electricity supply had to be provided to the residences of the peoples settlements so as to fight the illegal connections and unsafely distributed electrical supplies.

Cost of wiring the premises compared to the cost of the structures as well as the monthly rents paid was another challenge and who to bare the burden of wiring the premises. This became a tug of war between the tenants and the land lords.

Another challenge was the connection of the customers and how to meter each one of them as the structures are always in blocks sub-divided into 10ft by 10ft dwelling units. The blocks are also so squeezed with very limited space to construct the distribution lines more so that the blocks are not arranged in any order. Apart from the infrastructure

problems of taking power to these settlements, individual connections have been a serious challenge and have evolved through the following;

Isolated service cable for each applicant

In the beginning every customer who wanted power did their own wiring and put up their meter boards from where KPLC terminated their service cable. This led to so many service cables all over the settlements which were extremely difficult to disconnect in case of emergency.

It also encouraged massive power thefts through the numerous avenues for illegal connections and customers abandoning their meters with outstanding bills and applying for new ones.

There was no order at all in supplying the customers who were scattered all over the peoples settlements and applying for power connections.

Central metering cubicles

The second attempt was to use central metering ground mounted cubicles where each customer requiring power could be metered from. The cubicles were to be supplied with cables of adequate capacity to take care of projected future connections.

This failed as some residents were still puncturing either the main cables to the metering cubicles hence having un-metered power or puncturing the metered customer cables between the cubicles and the premises hence giving the customers unrealistically higher billings than their consumptions. Security and ownership of the metering cubicle was another problem.

Individual blocks having their central meter boards

The next attempt to solve the supply problem to the peoples settlements was through central metering for the various blocks from where each household in the block could have their meter and get supplied.

This failed as the cost of power connection was high and the landlords did not see the need to have power connected as the rents are controlled and they could not recoup their power connection costs from monthly rents. Some customers in the blocks also did not consider power connection a priority as they had no stable jobs to sustain even their very

basic needs. Power theft was still rampant through illegal looping from the block meter boards by neighbouring blocks that had no connections yet.

Pole metering with load limiters

This was an improvement of the block metering so as to be more illegal connection proof. Load limiter boxes were installed at the power poles from where each block had their service cables connected via load limiters to regulated consumptions as each connected customers was to pay a monthly estimated flat rate of Ksh 300/= for their consumption. The arrangement reduced drastically the illegal power connections but did not satisfy the customers as most of them complained of inadequate power and too much limitation on their power usage. Most of the peoples' settlement dwellers also found lump sum monthly bill payment un-affordable as they always live from hand to mouth incomes. The cost of wiring the premises was also still an issue because of the capital investment involved.

This led KPLC to introduce the Ready Board Unit for easy connection to the customers who were ready for supply but found cost of wiring their units prohibitive.

This is the current practice that is aimed to fasten power connections to the peoples settlement schemes in Kenya.

With the various improvements so far made and the Government's commitment to take development to its people as well as KPLC's realization that it can only achieve its target of connecting additional 150,000 customers annually through improvement of power connection to the peoples settlements. This study therefore is to look at the effectiveness of the approach being currently emphasized and come up with realistic findings from the ground of what has been so far achieved? , what needs to be done to enhance the progress? How to make the information be clearly understood by all stakeholders more so beneficiaries? And to use the research recommendations and findings to negotiate for more funding for the project from donor agencies and development partners.

Indian Situation: 1999 Indian Express Newspapers (Bombay ltd)

In 1995, The UT (United Transmission) Administration; which is the body charged with transmission and distribution of electric power in India decided to provide power

connection to residents of the slums; referred to as labour colonies. Despite the efforts since then, power theft through illegal connections known as “kundis” continues unabated. In fact, the kundis can be seen in almost all the labour colonies. For that matter even security personnel on guard duty in the heart of the city resort to “kundis” to easily meet their electricity needs.

In that year, a survey carried out by the UT Administration listed 30,000 persons to be provided with electricity connection in the labour colonies. This number is growing at an approximate rate of 10% annually and was re-estimated at 50,000 in April 1999.

In this year a separate electricity Sub-division was created for providing power to the rehabilitated colonies and slums.

According to the officials supervising the operation, 14,000 persons were issued connection; a maximum of 6,000 power connections were issued in colony No. 5, followed by 1,500 each in Palsora colony, Kumhar colony, Janata colony and Nehru colony, and 1,000 each in colony No. 4 and Bapu Dham colony.

The supervising officials expressed apprehension regarding the successful implementation of the scheme as “colony residents are habitual power thieves”.

The cross-section of labour colony residents whom Chandigarh Newsline spoke to were not keen about coming forward for connections as this meant paying for electricity.

Power theft through kundis has led to frequent breakdowns and tripping of the transformer. The worst affected areas are sectors 42, 44, 45, 25 and phase 1 and 2 of industrial area where production in the industries is affected adversely.

Despite several public interest litigations (PILS) filed in the Punjab and Haryana High courts over the past years, there is no let up on electricity theft, officials claim that the process of electrification is on course but when it will be completed is uncertain.

South African situation

In South Africa electricity is supplied by The Electricity Supply Commission, still known by its Afrikaans acronym, Eskom; which is the most important South African government owned enterprise. It proudly claims to be one of the New South Africa's success stories, having provided electricity to more than 300,000 new households each

year. Yet many ten of thousands cannot afford the full cost recovery policy (meaning that each consumer must pay the full cost of electricity they use without subsidies). The policy also means cutting off those who cannot afford to pay promptly for their consumed electricity. This has sparked several controversies and virtually all black South Africans were denied Eskom's services until the early 1980's due to apartheid racism. As a result of this, the black South African townships were perpetually filthy due to soot from coal and wood burnings.

Prior to 1988, Eskom supplied electricity mainly to large customers like mines and municipalities only. Although Eskom was at that stage already one of the largest electricity generating companies in the world, they had about 120,000 customers and all of them were on billed accounts.

In 1988, Eskom developed the "electricity for all" concept intended to supply electricity directly to the larger masses of domestic customers that did not have access to electricity at that stage. Some of the problems it had to overcome included the following:

Bringing many customers on board meant many more staff to manage the networks which was not financially viable as increasing cost of electricity was going to mean many more people could not afford it.

Many of the areas where potential customers resided had almost no infrastructure. There were no fixed addresses for customers, as they did not have permanent jobs or bank accounts and there were no postal services in those areas. All these are requirements for a billed system to operate effectively.

Many customers were illiterate and did not understand (or have the budget) to pay for fixed charges or bills that arrive only after the electricity has been consumed.

To address this and other problems, Eskom started the development of the basic prepayment system currently still in use.

This system consists of:

- 1) Prepayment meters (also called Electricity Dispensers or EDs).
- 2) Vending machines where the customers can purchase electricity credit, known as Credit Dispensing Units(CDUs)

- 3) Data concentrators that manage the CDUs and collected transaction data from the CDUs also called System Master Stations or SMSs.

This meant specification from the South African Bureau of Standards had to be developed for electricity dispensers and the vending system in conjunction with the manufacturers. To enable the new vending system to transfer credit to all types of meters it was also necessary to develop a standard transfer medium and protocol to the meters. For offline vending, a token is purchased from the vending machine of CDU, taken home by the customer and entered into the ED.

If the token is valid, the ED accepts the token and adds the credit (amount of units in Kwh) to the credit currently in the ED. The customer is then free to consume electricity until the credit recorded in the ED runs out, at which the ED interrupts the electricity supply.

For normal conventional meters, the function of Technical Support, Maintenance, Revenue collection and Management can to a large extent be operated autonomously. It is however important to recognize that, prepayment is not simply about the meter itself and requires an integrated systems approach.

The need for effective and available sales points as well as proper sales management systems (made up of both manual person based as well as computer equipment based components) should not be underestimated.

The approach although has meant a lot of capital investment has led to Eskom rolling out electricity connection to many customers annually including those in the peoples settlements or the Ghettos as they are called in South Africa.

From the Kenya, the South African and the Indian scenes; it is evident that electricity supply programme to the peoples settlements needs more researched and consolidated approach so as to yield the desired effects and to achieve wider coverage with the available resources.

It is for this reason that this research project will use the below theoretical frameworks to dig up the necessary information, so as to access what has been achieved in Kenya and to

find any areas which needs strengthening to improve the programme's effectiveness and efficiency.

THEORETICAL FRAMEWORK FOR THE RESEARCH

Residents of the peoples settlements need a special approach in electricity connections

As most of the residents of peoples settlements are squatters, have no permanent addresses, no fixed monthly incomes and lack supportive infrastructure like roads, it becomes necessary to provide them with electricity connection programme tailored to fit their situation in the following ways;

Suitable billing methods which will enable the customers get power supply continually through a soft payment mode.

Suitable means of getting their bills and convenient pay points.

Development of appropriate distribution network to fit into the slums infrastructure.

Customer education program to enable the slum residents appreciate the project and adapt it.

In order to capture pertinent details for the study, we intend to use the following source of data:-

Primary data

Customers: - Both already connected and potential customers in the peoples settlements.

KPLC staff: - Staffs of KPLC who have been involved and are still involve in the implementation of the project.

Other stakeholders in the plight of the residents of the peoples settlements.

Secondary Data

KPLC records: - connection data for the peoples settlements and power loss improvement data for these areas settlements before and since the project started.

Police records: - Records of fires and crimes in the peoples settlements before and since the project started.

Administrative records: - Records from the provincial administration on the peoples settlements.

Data collection Techniques

Interviews: - Face to face interviews with the residents of the peoples settlements, KPLC staffs, police officers and area administrators.

Questionnaires: - Questionnaires for the beneficiaries, residents of the peoples settlements not yet connected, KPLC staffs involved in the project, area administrators and area security personnel.

Desk search: - The major tool for collecting the secondary data will be desk searching from KPLC meter installation records, service line installation records and power line extension records for the peoples settlements.

Data analysis:-

All the data collected will be recorded and then analyzed in form of groups, pie charts, bar graph, tables etc. Authority will be sought from the relevant authorities for the use of any restricted materials by explaining the purpose of the study and confidential information will be treated as so.

CHAPTER THREE

Methodology of the Study

Methodology is a way to systematically solve the research problem which involves studying the various steps that are generally necessary in tackling the research problem along with the logic behind them. It involves deciding which techniques and procedures are applicable to the research problem at hand, what they mean and indicate, why use them and any assumptions underlying the various techniques. The following questions must thus be answered in the research methodology:

1. Why the research study is being undertaken?
2. How the research problem has been defined?
3. What data are to be collected during the research?
4. What research method to adopt?
5. What particular data analysis techniques are to be used and why?
6. How to interpret the results?

This particular research study is being undertaken to find out the state of affairs as it is at present in the Nairobi slums electrification project. It aims to report on what has been done or what is happening, what resources have been used, what areas have been covered and what problems do exist in the implementation of the programme .It therefore intends to use facts or information already available and analyze these to make critical evaluation of the programme so as to answer questions like, how long has the scheme taken to covered areas already covered, Is the roll out rate satisfactory and what are the teething problems? And what can be done to overcome them?

It therefore follows that data has to be collected on the number of customers already connected in the programme, resources so far used, time taken to cover the already covered areas and reaction from the programme implementers, beneficiaries and other stakeholders on their perception of the programme. The research is therefore going to follow descriptive, analytical and applied research approach to meet its main objectives.

The research methods to be used will be those that will aid in linking the available data and the unknown aspects of the problems in the suggested possible solutions.

The research method must thus encompass the data collection techniques, statistical techniques to be used in establishing relationships between the data and the unknowns and evaluation of the results obtained so as to draw appropriate conclusions as well as workable recommendations .The research method will use Quantitative approach so as to generate data for the peoples settlements which can be subjected to rigorous quantitative analysis in a formal and rigid fashion which can then be used in inferential approach by generalizing for other peoples settlements in Kenya .The Qualitative approach will be concerned with subjective assessment of opinions and behaviour as well as perception of the beneficiaries, project implementers, donors and other stakeholders. As Clifford Woody rightful put it, “ Research involves defining and redefining problems, formulating hypothesis or suggested solutions, collecting, organizing and evaluating data, making deductions and reaching conclusions, and lastly testing the conclusions to determine whether they fit the formulated hypothesis or suggested solutions”.

Research Scope and Design

The function of the research design is to provide for the collection of relevant evidence with minimal expenditure of effort, time and money. It is a plan that specifies the source and types of information relevant to the research problem and outlines the strategy which will be used for gathering and analyzing the collected data within the available time and budget. The following factors must thus be considered in preparing the research design:

1. What is the study about?
2. Where will the study be carried out?
3. What type of data is required?
4. Where can the required data be found?
5. What will be the sample design?
6. The skills of the researcher and his assistants
7. The time available for the research
8. The cost factor relating to the research

9. The way in which the selected means will be organized and the reasoning leading to the selection
10. The population to be studied

This study is to evaluate the effectiveness of the existing power supply connection programme to peoples settlement schemes in Kenya with case study of the slums in Nairobi. It can therefore be clearly defined that the study will be carried out in Kibera, Mathare valley, Kariobangi, Korogocho and Mukuru slums and the data needed will pertain to the population of these slums, those already connected to power supply through the programme, duration the programme has been in place, what is required to roll out the programme to cover all the targeted beneficiaries, the impact of the programme on the lives of the beneficiaries, perception of the slum residents to the programme, difficulties in the programme implementation and the resources so far used in the implementation. The data so required will be available from secondary sources in the records of the implementers and donors as well as primary sources to be gathered from the field through interviews of the beneficiaries, implementers and other stakeholders as well as field observation of the situation on the ground.

So as to be used to generalize for other peoples settlements in Kenya, the coverage of the case study groups will be done to the depth that only time and resources will be the limiting factors.

Target Population

After agreeing on the areas to be categorized as peoples settlements or slums, KPLC got population data for the various slums from Central Bureau of Statistics based on the last national census. The population of the slums in Kenya therefore is the focus of the study but with a case study of Nairobi slums. The results will be used to generalize for all the slums in Kenya.

The table below therefore shows the various slums and their populations from where the research can derive its target population.

As the research is based on a case study of the slums in Nairobi, the target population will thus include the electrifiable population of Kibera, Mathare valley, Korogcho, Kariobangi and Mukuru slums which is approximately 500,000 as per statistics of KPLC marketing section of June 2006.

Sampling Techniques

As getting all the necessary data from the population of around 500,000 of the electrifiable residents of the slums in Nairobi is not possible within the available time and cost, it is therefore practical to come up with a sample design. This is a definite plan for obtaining a sample from the given population such that their characteristics will be representative of the entire population.

Since the slums electrification project in Nairobi were divided into faces with defined number of beneficiaries for the various slums, non probability sampling will be employed with the various schemes used as the units.

Sample Size

Because the target population is more than 10,000 and this is a social science research, the formula below and assumptions/recommendation by Fisher et al will be applied;

$$N = Z^2 pq/d^2$$

Where N = the desired sample size

Z = the standard normal deviation at required confidence level

P = the proportion of the target population estimated to have characteristics being measured

$$q = 1-p$$

d = the level of statistical significant set.

Assumptions

As there are no estimates available of the proportion of the target population assumed to have the characteristics of interest, 50% will be used.

Setting standard normal deviation at confidence limit of 1.96

Setting desired accuracy at 0.05

Then the appropriate sample size is;

$$N = (1.96)^2 (0.5) (0.5) / (0.05)^2$$

$$= 384$$

This will be the sample size of the residents of the Nairobi slums from which necessary data will be collected from.

Note

- i. The staffs of KPLC involved in the project are estimated to be 30 in number and as many of these as possible will be involved in the data gathering.
- ii. The same will apply to the administrators in the slums of Nairobi who are estimated at 15, security officers in- charge of the slums in Nairobi estimated

at 10 and heads of NGOs and community groups operating in Nairobi slums estimated at 20.

Sampling Procedure

The research project intends to cover the following subgroups in the slums electrification project in Nairobi;

1. Customers who have been connected to electricity in the slums areas of Nairobi through the programme initiative.
2. Customers who have applied for electricity connection through the initiative but are yet to be connected.
3. Potential customers in the slums of Nairobi who have not applied for electricity connection in the slums of Nairobi.
4. Administrators in the slums of Nairobi.
5. Leaders of NGOs and community groups operating in the slums of Nairobi.
6. KPLC staffs involved in the implementation of the slums electrification project in Nairobi.

The first three subgroups are from the same population and hence stratified sampling method will be used to obtain the required sample sizes from the various clusters of the slums in Nairobi. That is Mathare valley, Kibera, Kariobangi, Korogocho, and Mukuru will form the clusters while customers already connected, customers who have applied and potential customers will form the various strata from the clusters above.

Sampling Frames

The list of customer SRN/account numbers for the various clusters will form the sampling frame for the customers already connected to electricity from which random samples will be drawn.

Pending connection customer application numbers for the various clusters will be used as sampling frames for the next stratum.

The customers who have not applied for electricity in the various clusters will be randomly selected through market surveys and the necessary data obtained from them.

From the calculated sample size of approximately 400, the various strata will be allocated sample figures as per cluster strengths.

Typical sample frames

This is a listing obtained from the marketing books of KPLC and will be used to gather information from this particular cluster of customers for the purpose of the research.

Data Collection

There are several methods of data collection but the following will be the guiding factors in selecting which method befits the study at hand;

Nature, scope and object of inquiry: The method selected should be such that it suits the type of inquiry that is to be conducted and whether to use already available data or collect fresh data from the study units.

Availability of Funds: Finance in practice is a big constraint and the researcher has to act within this limitation.

Time factor: Some methods take relatively more time than others and thus the time at the disposal of the study team will determine which method is most appropriate.

Precision required: The various methods have different level of precision and thus the one chosen must meet the desired accuracy level.

The required data can also be sourced from available records (secondary data) or collected directly from the study units (primary data).

The research team must thus evaluate and decide which of the two sources to use so as to save on time without compromising the quality or authenticity of the research outcome.

Secondary Data

These refer to data which is already available and is relevant to the research. These kinds of data must be thoroughly scrutinized to ensure Reliability, Suitability and Adequacy to the research study. Reliability can be tested by finding out who collected the data? What were the sources of data? Were they collected using proper methods? At what time were they collected? Was there any bias of the compiler? What level of accuracy was desired? And was it achieved. Suitability of the data involves thorough scrutiny of the various definitions of terms and units used at the time of collecting data from the primary sources, the object, scope and nature of the original inquiry while Adequacy of the data refers to the content and level of accuracy of the information for the intended study. In this study, necessary records from KPLC existing data will be relied upon and analyzed so as be used in the research study.

Customer connection records, power supply design records, marketing forecast records, meter installation records. Incidence records and power consumption records will be vital to the study.

Primary Data

This is the kind of data which is obtained directly from the study units and are necessary for the research at hand. These kinds of data must be collected using the most accurate, logical and systematic scientific methods so as to ensure reliability, suitability, adequacy and authenticity.

Data pertaining to the perception of the various stakeholders, impact on the lives of the residences of the peoples settlements and pertinent issues to the programme will best be obtained directly from the study units through observation, interviews, questionnaires and schedules.

Development of Research Instruments

Questionnaires

This will be used for obtaining data from mainly KPLC staffs who are involve in the programme implementation, administrators and leaders of NGOs or community service

centres in the various Nairobi slums. This is because these groups are literate and can read and give appropriate answers in the questionnaires.

To capture all the pertinent issues and give the respondents a chance to give their inputs, the first set of questions will be structured while the next set will be unstructured. The questionnaires will be self administered. The research assistants will deliver the questionnaires and collect them back after agreed duration to allow the respondent time to fill their views without interference.

Interviews

This will be used to gather data from the residents of the slums in Nairobi. This is because some of them may not be literate and tracing them to collect back the filled questionnaires might be an uphill task. So a face to face administration of a questionnaire or interview schedule will be used.

Format

The same questionnaires format will be used but this time administered face to face and the interviewer fills in the answers from the interviewees.

Note

The interviewers will be trained if objective and reliable information is to be maintained. They will also be required to practice interviewing and receiving constructive feedback until their performance becomes standardized and reaches the desired objectivity and reliability.

Observation Method

This data collection method will be used to acquire unbiased report on the situation on the ground floor of the programme. The research team will visit the concerned peoples settlements, use scientific method to observe and record occurrences on the Nairobi slum electrification programme.

This method will help to obtain the information on what is currently happening and which is independent of neither the respondents' willingness to respond nor their cooperation in the research.

This will be a structured observation process which will include the following details;

1. What should be observed?
2. How the observation should be recorded?
3. How the accuracy of the observation should be ensured?
4. How the observations will be analyzed and reported on?

For areas already covered by electricity connection in the Nairobi slums the following data will be required;

1. Number of families connected to electricity supply.
2. What Small and medium business enterprises do exists?
3. Number of people employed by the SMEs.
4. Operating times of the businesses connected to electricity supply.
5. For areas not yet covered by the slum electrification programme;
6. Number of families not connected to electricity.
7. What substitutes for electricity supply are they using?
8. What SMEs do exist in these areas?
9. What are the operating times of these SMEs?

Data Collection Techniques

Secondary Data

The following existing data is necessary to kick off the research study;

List of areas Categorized as peoples settlements (slums): In order to later make generalization of the study to other peoples settlement schemes in Kenya, it is appropriate to begin the study by collecting data available on these settlement schemes. These data can be readily available from the town planning department at the ministry of Local government as per which areas are to be considered as slums in the various urban centers. The data on the population of these areas categorized as slums can also be found from the ministry of Planning statistics department: report on the last census (Refer to Table No 2 as compiled by KPLC Marketing section)

Design statistics for the various slums in Nairobi: In order to measure the effectiveness of the programme in Nairobi slums, records of the various projections for the Nairobi slums should be obtained from the Design offices (Ref to Table 10).

Expenditure projections for the various Nairobi slum projects: This is going to help in the financial projection for the peoples settlement schemes in Kenya. This data will be obtained from Cooperate planning department of KPLC (Ref to Table 10).

Construction statistics for the various Nairobi slum Projects: The implementation status of these projects can be found from the various depot construction records. This is vital in accessing the implementation rates and unearthing bottlenecks if any (Ref to Tables 3 - 9).

Customer connectivity records for the Nairobi slums: Marketing records are vital in providing the number of customers who have been connected to power supply in the various Nairobi slums (Ref to Tables 3 - 9).

The above data are very necessary in the research project but must be subjected to thorough scrutiny as Dr. A. L. Bowley very aptly observes that it is never safe to take published statistics at their face value without knowing their meaning and limitations as it is always necessary to criticize arguments that can be based on them.

Primary Data

The following primary data are necessary to achieve the research objectives and possibly make inferences to other peoples settlements in Kenya;

1. Economic and social activities taking place in the slum areas already covered by the slum electrification programme in comparison to the slum areas not yet covered.
2. Residents and other stakeholders' perception of the programme.
3. Actual ground coverage of the programme since inception.

From Tables 3—9 customers connected or in the process of connection are, Mukuru; 567, Kibera; 1,326, Mathare; 224 and Kariobangi; 110.

This gives a Total of 2,227 customers either already connected or in the process of being connected.

This translates to $2227/55425 \times 100 = 4.02\%$ of the customers earmarked to be supplied.

This implies that only approximately 4% of the Nairobi slums electrifiable population have been connected to electricity or are in the process of connection. This figure is quite low to have been achieved in two years and puts a lot of questions on the implementation pace.

Most significant change to the lives of the slum dwellers:

The most significant change the project is having in the slums is increased chances of SMEs with the increased operating hours and better security to the residents.

Achievements of the project:

With safe and reliable electricity supply incidents of fires and power blackouts have drastically reduced.

Consumption of paraffin in the slum areas has reduced.

Businesses are opening until late hours and so many slum dwellers are getting job opportunities in the SMEs.

Lessons so far learnt:

The slum electrification project is fundamental in changing the lives of the residents and should roll out to all the areas and at fast pace.

CHAPTER FIVE:

Having been part of the implementing agency of the project as a design Engineer; the research project has been an eye open so that shortcomings, strengths, opportunities and threats have been unearthed which when further investigated and acted upon can turn around the project and hence the lives of the residents of the peoples settlements.

Comparision with what is being done in similar situations in South Africa and India can help us benchmark with the best outcomes and improve in our own situation.

Research Findings and Recommendations:

The research project although had serious limitations interms of resources and ground organization due to lack of cooperation from the various stakeholder and time constraints has the following findings and recommendations to put forward for further research on;

Project implementation Pace:

For the project to be fully accepted by the residents, the implementation pace should be enhance so that most of the residents prefer the project to the available illegal connections.

Poor planning which has characterized the project until some are being seen as abandoned should end. All the materials for the project should be purchased and the designs made more commodative and suitable to the users. This will ensure once a project is started it is implemented and the beneficiaries connected. This will in turn win confidence of all the stakeholders.

Prepaid billing:

It is long time prepaid unit purchase system in small denominations is introduced to meet the budget lines of the slum residents. Other service providers have tapped this wide market only through easy buy systems which the consumers do not feel much pinched to afford when needed.

Stakeholder participation:

The project implementers should share the information on the project with the beneficiaries, potentials donors and other stake holders so that the project becomes more acceptable to all and they are brought on board. Development partners will be more

willing to participate in projects which are acceptable to the locals and uplifting the lives of the common peoples in their cooperate social responsibilities.

Public lighting and streetlights:

This is important as far as security in the slums is concerned and will even make SMEs thrive to greater heights hence creating better and stabble job opportunities for the residents.

The designs should include these and stakeholders should be sensitized to be good custodians of these kinds of lights for their own good. The bills can be met by community contributions or cooperate sponsorships.
