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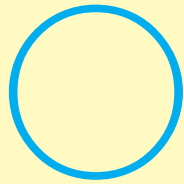

At the international level, our profile has continued to grow. In 2008, the University was honoured to host the former United Nations Secretary General, Dr Kofi Annan, during the 39th Graduation Ceremony. The University conferred honorary degrees on President Mwai Kibaki, Prime Minister Raila Odinga and Dr. Annan in recognition of their joint role in restoring peace in the country following the 2007 post

election chaos.

Mid 2009, the University hosted Dr. Anna Tibaijuka, UN Under-Secretary General and Executive Director, UN-ABITAT, Hillary Rodham Clinton, US Secretary of State and Ms Obiageli Ezekwezi, World Bank Vice-President for Africa Region. Such high level visitors to the University of Nairobi is because of our reputation as a leading Centre of Academic Excellence.

In line with our customer focused service delivery, the University holds graduation ceremonies as soon as students clear their studies, thus ensuring that they graduate on schedule to compete favourably in the job market.

In September 2009, we held our 41st Graduation during which 3,947 graduands from our four colleges of Agriculture and Veterinary Sciences, Architecture and Engineering, Biological and Physical Sciences and Education and External Studies - received their degrees and diplomas.

The 42nd Graduation Ceremony held in December 2009 involved graduands from the Colleges of Health Sciences and the College of Humanities and Social Sciences, with a few from the College of Education and External Studies. Where over 4,000 graduands received their degrees and diplomas. 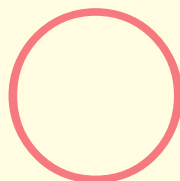
this effort.

Giving Back to our Alma Mater



In February 17, 2009, the Alumni Association donated Kshs. 5 million to the University Bursary Fund towards the assistance of needy students within the University. On

The University of Nairobi Alumni Association (UONAA) was launched in 2005 and brings together graduates of the University of Nairobi, providing a forum through which they can participate in the promotion of an active and visible leadership role in the community. The Association fosters interaction among the Alumni, student community, families, friends and industry. Through the Association, the University provides a legal framework of receiving market feedback on its programmes and products, which enables it to continuously review its programmes and services.

The Alumni are encouraged to use their talents and resources in support of the University's commitment to providing leadership in academic excellence. To enable graduates interact more meaningfully, the Association has

established discipline-based chapters and graduates are encouraged to associate themselves with such chapters.

The University is proud of its 100,000 plus graduates who are to be found in all sectors of the economy. These Alumni have contributed a lot in many ways towards ensuring that the University of Nairobi remains the undisputed Fountain of Knowledge. All graduates are challenged to retrace their footprints at their Alma Mater by registering as members of the association.

Since 2004, when Dr. Betty Gikonyo, a 1974 Medicine alumni and member of the University Council, was challenged to chair a sub-committee on the formation and launch of an Alumni Association, discernible developments have been observed.

The first task was to draw up the Association's objectives and a draft constitution. The University of Nairobi formally allowed the use of the names 'University' and 'Nairobi'. The two names are protected by an Act of Parliament, hence the permission for use.

In 2005, the Association was launched at a colourful ceremony presided over by the (then) Minister for Education, Prof George Saitoti, in the presence of the Chancellor, Dr. J.B. Wanjui. During the occasion, over Ksh.750, 000 was raised from 75 members who registered on the spot.

Later, an Alumni office was established with a Secretariat to provide a link between the Alumni and the University. The Secretariat developed an Alumni database of over 2000 members. The first ever issue of *Alumni News*, the UONAA newsletter, was published in the same year thus providing a forum of interaction and dialogue among the Alumni and their Alma Mater.

The year 2006 was a busy one for us. First, the Alumni database expanded to over 16,000 members, the Association oversaw the production of branded University polo shirts and other souvenirs, thus institutionalising the Friday corporate dress-down day at the University which in turn increased corporate identity and loyalty among staff, beside increased visibility of the Institution. In June the same year, the first ever Alumni night was held at the Carnivore, this was attended by over 600 UoN Alumni. This provided an avenue for Alumni interaction, networking and dialogue with the University Management.

To cap the year, we participated in the Scientific Conferences of both the Kenya Medical and Kenya Veterinary Associations, which targeted and recruited members for Alumni association and publicised its activities.

Finally we launched the University of Nairobi Alumni Association Award for Best Overall Student in all colleges in order to increase the visibility of the association and make it more relevant to the lives of the students as future alumni.

Come 2007, we established the following chapters: the MBA,

Veterinary Medicine, Journalism and Range Management Association chapters hence increasing membership of the Association to over 20,000 thereby enhancing the financial base to over Ksh.20 million. We also participated in University events such as Graduation Ceremonies, Conferences, Seminars and meetings; developed a three-year Marketing Strategy for the

Association and refocused the objectives and recruitment strategies, giving rise to increased membership and revenue collection to over KSh30 million. In the same year we produced the second and third issues of Alumni newsletter and developed and implemented the Alumni Association Office Service Charter.

In 2008, we developed and implemented an Alumni Information Management System (AIMS) to ensure prompt and efficient data capture, archiving and retrieval system. In order to increase revenue, the Association's finances are invested with financial institutions.

To complement the University's efforts of making the life of students at the institution a memorable experience, we purchased 100 concrete garden benches and donated them to the University halls of residence and the University Library. And with our goal of publicising the Association activities and members' dialogue, we published the fourth issue of Alumni

The other activities we carried out in 2008 were producing a new-look University of Nairobi branded shirts and blouses for Alumni members and UoN staff, designing and producing Alumni Membership Certificates; successfully negotiated the use of University Library by active members of the Alumni Association and sending out season's greetings and a newsletter to all registered members. This has led to a lot of positive feedback from members expressing gratitude to the University, portraying it as sensitive to its Alumni.

Not resting on our laurels, in February 2009, the Association donated Ksh 5 million towards the University Bursary Fund for needy

students as a way of giving back to society and motivating future recipients to work hard and lead a life of purpose.

In June 2009 the Association held an Alumni reunion and Elders' Night for the graduating Class of '09 at the KICC, where the Chief Guest was the Vice-President, H.E Hon. Stephen Kalonzo Musyoka, a 1977 Law Alumnus.

The Alumni had an opportunity to interact and socialise while at the same time mentoring the young Alumni preparing to join the world. And for the first time ever, the UoN Alumni now have a forum for social interaction.

During the event, we launched what has been billed as the "Facebook" of the University of

Nairobi and which has received a lot of interest from the University community, a social network forum, www.uoncommunity.com to share, discover and reconnect.

In September 2009, a steering committee was appointed to steer the initiated Alumni Centre Project. Ksh10 million was set aside as seed money. The Centre will provide a physical personification of the Alumni at the University while at the same time giving identity to its members.

As 2009 came to a close, we launched a revamped fifth issue of Alumni Newsletter as a magazine with a new masthead - the **UoNairobi**. Our pledge is to ensure that we do not let down the University of Nairobi Alumni.

UoN 'Terrorists' blunts 'Blades' at the **Inter-varsity Games**

The University of Nairobi hosted the 2009 edition of the Kenya Inter-University Sports Championship on 17th to 22nd December 2009. The University Sports and Games Calendar is guided and regulated by the Kenya Universities Sports Association (KUSA).

The University emerged the Second Best overall Team. The first place was taken by Kenyatta University. The UoN basketball team, 'Terrorists', beat Strathmore's 'Blades' in the games that were officially opened by the Minister for Youth and Sports, Prof. Hellen Sambili.

The University was mandated by KUSA to host the championship that brought together all universities in the country.

The Kenya Inter-University Sports Championship aims at creating an interactive forum for all the universities in the country. The objective of the championship, whose theme was Sports for Health and Peace were to scout,

identify and enhance talent among students of Kenya universities, promote mental and physical health among Kenya students and to improve self-confidence, self-esteem and self-control among university students as well as strengthening peer relationships among Kenyan students.

Other objectives included providing an outlet for stress and reduction of depression risks among students, promoting healthier lifestyle among Kenyan university students and promoting national cohesiveness among them.

A total of 23 Kenyan universities and constituent colleges participated in 15 different sports and games. A local organising committee headed by Deputy-Vice Chancellor, Academic Affairs, Professor Jacob Kaimenyi ensured that all was well for the championships which were officially closed by Prof. Kihumbu Thairu, Chairman, Commission for Higher Education.

University hosts First Confucius Institutes Conference in Africa

The University of Nairobi played host to the 2009 Confucius Institutes Conference in Africa, bringing together delegates from Confucius Institutes in the world. The director-general, Hanban and CEO, Confucius Institutes Headquarters, Dr Xu Lin also attended.

The Confucius Institute at the University of Nairobi hosted the four-day conference during which period delegates exchanged experiences on establishing and managing Confucius Institutes.

Confucius Institutes are named

after a great Chinese personality, Confucius or Kong Fu Zi, who was a thinker, political figure, educator and a founder of the Ru School of Chinese thought.

While officially opening the conference, the Minister for Higher Education, Science and Technology, Dr Sally Kosgei, lauded the Sino-Kenya relationship and congratulated the University of Nairobi for living up to its vision of being a world class university. The minister noted that the conference would enhance collaboration between China and Africa noting that there was a lot to learn from each other.

Addressing the delegates, Dr Xu Lin, pledged further financial support towards the Confucius Institute at the University of Nairobi and disclosed that she will be announcing scholarship opportunities for students and staff to study in China.

On his part, the Vice-Chancellor Prof. George Magoha, thanked the People's Republic of China for honouring the institution by starting the Confucius Institute at the University of Nairobi. He thanked Hanban for the renovations of the Education Building where the institute is based.

4,000 join UONAA

The University of Nairobi Alumni Association Chairperson, Dr Betty Gikonyo, delivered sweet news to the ears of the Class of 2009 of the College of Agriculture and Veterinary Medicine, the College of Architecture and Engineering, the College of Biological and Physical Sciences and the College of Education and External Studies graduates, when she declared that they were automatic members University of Nairobi Alumni Association .

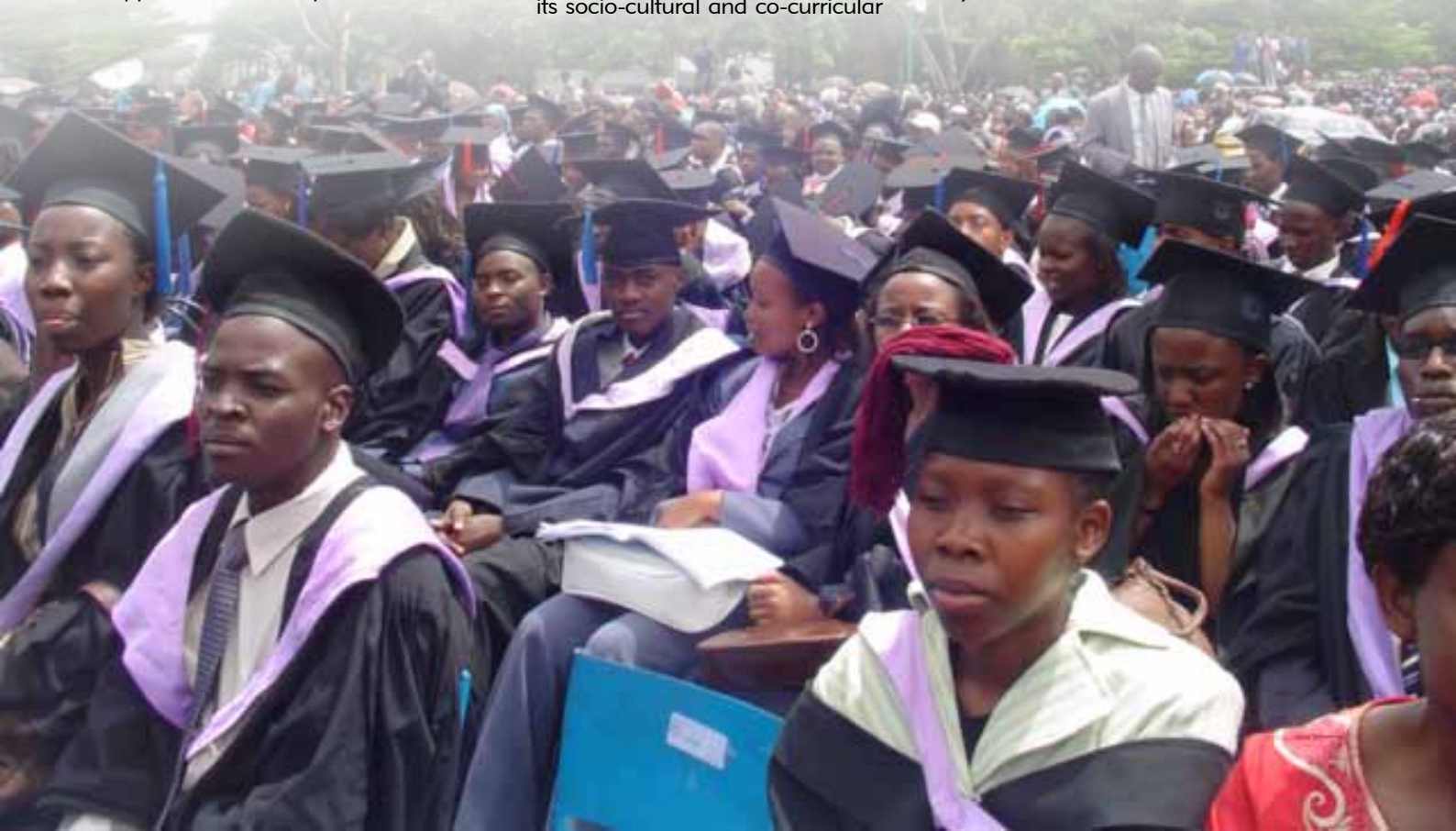

Varsity launches refreshing mineral water, Royal Satima

The University of Nairobi is now producing its own bottled mineral water. The water, sold under the brand name **Royal Satima**, is produced by the College of Agriculture and Veterinary Sciences in a joint project with the Finance Department.

According to sources close to the production unit, the current average production capacity is 3,000 half-litre bottles per day and 200 18.9-litre bottles used in offices with water dispensers. However, capacity can be enhanced depending on demand.

The water is available for sale at the University's Central Store for bulk purchases and other retail points like University of Nairobi Enterprises and Services (UNES) Bookstore, Arziki Restaurants and the Student Welfare Authority (SWA) outlets. SWA, through its outside catering wing based largely within the University has emerged as the main consumer.

The water project is an Income Generating Unit (IGU) for the Finance Department and CAVS, and is part of the University's revenue enhancement and cost containment measures undertaken

by Management in the last few years. The project has been driven by Prof Peter Mbithi, the Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Administration & Finance) and a core team composed of Prof C.K.K. Gachene, Prof E. K. Biamah, Prof L.S. Akundabweni, Dr S.G. Kiama - all of CAVS - and Mr Peter Busienei, a Deputy Finance Officer.

"We spent Ksh.8 million to set up the production unit. This amount covered piping works, water tanks, purification plant, packaging and a laboratory," says Mr Busienei.

The University bottled water is approved by the Kenya Bureau of Standards, who did the chemical analysis and gave a certificate authorising use of the KEBS standardisation mark. The University has also been issued with a bar code prefix number by GSI Kenya.

"So far, sales have reached Ksh.1.2 million since we started operations about two months ago. Initially, our target was the internal market which has over 50,000 people - both students and staff. Thereafter we shall venture out and go to supermarkets," adds Mr Busienei.

The mineral water, first rolled out during the 41st graduation ceremony held on September 18, 2009 and has the full support of the Vice-Chancellor. The Chancellor, Dr. Joseph B. Wanjui, has also given a thumbs up to the enterprise.

We are sure our Alumni out there are also keen to reconnect with their mother University by having a chance to consume the water. Let us all support the University by partaking of our own Royal Satima.

For both degrees are History, Computer Studies and Business Studies acceptable for 4 electives?

The University website indicates that for admission to undertake an LLB, one is required to have a KCSE B+ in English. Is one required to have a C+ mean grade?

Please forward my queries to anyone who can help or let me know whom I can speak to.

Dear Ms. Njonjo,

Thanks for identifying our institution amongst the rest where you wish to take your studies. To the queries you raised with Dr. Gikonyo: You can register for two different courses at the same time as long as the hours do not clash. That is, you register for LLB and BA Political Science. Entry requirements are as follows - LLB- Minimum C+ with B+ in English, BA- Minimum C+. And yes, you can register for Law and then BA and then take a few units of your choice. Note however that you will not graduate with a BA until all units are covered.

You will nevertheless get transcripts for the units taken. For both BA and LLB, any subject taken as an elective is acceptable as long as the mandatory subjects for LLB i.e. English is passed.

I trust this information will adequately answer your queries but feel free to pay us a call for more information.

Let's touch her together

The woman is still down-trodden. Touched by her plight, *Teresa Njue*, B.Ed '02 Alumnus, cannot just sit and watch the girl-child within her environment suffer. She narrates her story to *Ann Mbatha*.

A Maasai girl is born to a normal woman to lead a normal life, but culture and the society has placed her on the periphery, except for those who have had the opportunity to taste the fruits of education.

I first met the Maasai girl-child in 2000 during a visit to A.I.C Girls' FAWE Education and Empowerment Centre in Kajiado district. I was a Second Year student at the University of Nairobi pursuing a degree in Education. I belonged to the Women

Students Welfare Association) WOSWA and had trained as a peer educator at the University.

The training through WOSWA and Peer Educators club brought me closer to humanity and especially the young people and girl-child. I am not biased and still have the boy child in mind. Why? Behind every successful man there is a woman. So by moulding and empowering the girl as is my priority, will eventually lead to very successful men, stable families and a sober society.

The joy of being in Kajiado

Upon completion of my degree in 2002, I got a job at a private school, Mashuuru, in Kajiado District I looked forward to working with an organization that would enable me work with the marginalised, even on a voluntary basis.

Mashuuru Secondary school is a boys' school but it had given sanctuary to 23 girls. Being the

only female teacher, I was in for a big challenge. The few girls in the school were my immediate sisters, daughters and friends and I was there I was, as a teacher, sister and a friend to them.

The knowledge and counseling skills drawn from the Fountain of Knowledge found their place right away. I have not looked back since.

Making sure the girls completed their education (some of whom were already mothers), saving others from arranged marriages, like Mary Parsanka who completed Form Four this year, healing others from the effect of the practice of FGM, forgiving them for letting us down was and is a source of satisfaction.

The miserable payslip did not matter. It could not be compared to the joy of reaching out to those girls.

One of my greatest joys came in 2007 when I rescued two girls, Maria Kesui and her sister Lampat, from an arranged early marriage. Maria and Lampat are now in Standard Three and Standard Six respectively.

The girls had dropped out of school two years earlier to take care of their elder sister who later died of paralyse, a condition she developed during child birth having been married off at the tender age of 12 years!

After I narrated the sisters' ordeal, the local District Officer and Chief's intervened to have the girls readmitted to school.

I enjoy support from my school Principal, Mr. John Kuria and just as I did from his predecessor, Mr. Kennedy Ole Kerei, Sisters of the Daughters of St. Ann who run a hostel that caters for the rescued girls and from my colleagues.

Ups and Downs

It has not been easy. Some girls have dropped out along the way. Others have found their way back while others have completed school amidst many problems.

Mr. Kuria is very supportive. I was shocked to learn of his affinity and love for the girl-child's prosperity despite being the father of two boys. He is very protective of the girl child – tomorrow's mothers for sustainability of the society. At one time I hardly thought he would allow a breast feeding girl in school. We had one such a girl and she was given a lot of counseling during her pregnancy and delivery. This enabled her to lead a normal life in a class

of 37 boys. Even when she was on maternity leave, the Principal went ahead to register her for Kenya Certificate of Secondary Examination (KCSE). She is now pursuing a certificate course in Early Childhood Education.

Such cases are on the rise, but the girls never find life that hard because of our support and the comfort they enjoy. The Sister in charge of St. Ann Hostels is quite understanding. Though she took the vows of poverty, chastity and obedience, she does not let the girls struggle in poverty or drop out of school for lack of basic needs. She ensures the girls are regularly lectured on chastity

through the Guidance & Counseling Department and I also assist her organise the sessions. It gives them a sense of re-identification and self evaluation as many of them even apart from undergoing Female Genital Mutilation (FGM) are victims of sexual abuse. So for them, there is always a chance a secondary virginity and a good life even after the ordeal.

I thank the principal once again and CLARION (Centre for Law and Research International) for facilitating my training in a Gender Rights Programme, which has empowered me a lot, and without any iota of doubt, with God's help I should be able to leave the place better than I found it. That marks the presence of a UoN Alumnus.

Through the project, I have been able to empower more girls and boys in the school and within the area. As a result, some boys have rescued their younger sisters from cultural practices and championed for their education and empowerment.

I believe that education empowerment is the only tool to emancipate the girl-child from eminent danger and violations.

Yes, it also calls for the education of the boy-child to empower him so that he too can play the sister- or mother's keeper.

To my Alma Mater, I am proud to reconnect with you in your activities. I am whom I am because of going through your your system of education.

Through UONAA, you have shown me the way that I can give back to the community.

To the founders of the Alumni Association, I am faithfully following your footsteps.....yes I do!

He has served in various capacities in the health sector. For instance in 1995 and 1996, Dr. Mailu was the acting director in the division of Family Health in the Ministry of Health before becoming the National Manager of the Kenya Expanded

Programme on Immunization (KEPI). Then in 1997, he was appointed the Director, Health Sector Reform Programme before becoming the Reproductive Health Adviser in the same ministry in 2000.

In March 2001 he did Part-time consultancy with UNICEF/NY-HQ and WHO/GENEVA.

Between 2001 and 2003, Dr Mailu served in other capacities including a Unicef Project Officer in the India Country office in Delhi before eventually joining Nairobi Hospital.

The hard working Dr Mailu has used his vast experience to improve the image of Nairobi hospital and to position it as the best in Africa (outside South Africa) and as a result the hospital has won numerous awards locally and internationally in recognition of its professionalism including IT and financial reporting sectors. 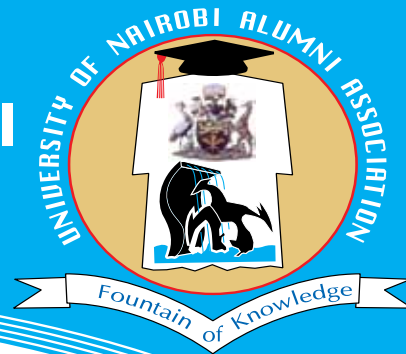

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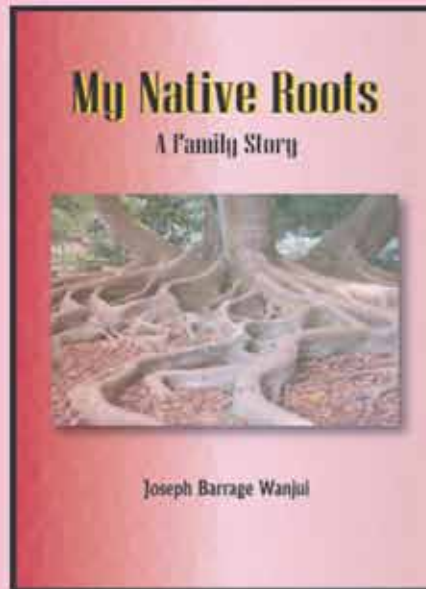




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
