Community outreach programmes have always been an indispensable element of the Department of Ophthali consistent goal of the team is to provide the highest quality eye care to as many people as possible and perfo surgeries as possible.

In spite of the challenges the programme faces, a total of eighteen (18) free surgical eye camps were underta February and November under the joint sponsorship of our partners.

During each visit a team of consultants and doctors totaling to 8 were involved in the outreach activiti

 objectives and ensure the sustainability of results. There is an obvious need for further interventions a
 project duration to three (3) years in order to improve the delivery of objectives which the department
 incorporated into next year planning.

• The department with Eastern Africa College of Ophthalmologists (EACO) has embarked on implemental development activities in Kenya. The roll out will go along way in responding to the institution capacity infrastructure gaps complementing the ongoing initiative with Partners.

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
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
