OPENING THE ARCHIVES OF HISTORY ASWE CELEBRATE 50 YEARS OF KENYAN INDEPENDENCE

õOpening the Archives of History as we celebrate 50 years of Kenyan Independenceö is an event that marks Kenyaøs post colonialism journey under political independence. The culmination of the half a century of Kenyaøs political freedom will be on 12th December 2013, a day also known as the "Jamhuri Day". On Jamhuri day, Kenya was made a Republic after attaining Independence on the 1st June 1963 celebrated as Madaraka day in Kenyaøs calendar.

As we open the Archives of History, the Nairobi University (UoN), Department of Political Science Students Association (NUPOSA) will use this ample opportunity in sharing with the academic fraternity and the Kenyan population at large the historical journey of Kenya that started fifty (50) years ago.

As an institution which has offered several platforms of political leadership in this country, the UoN intends to be part and parcel of the celebrations, not just as an intellectual institution but also, as a team player towards the realization of Kenyaøs political dreams, moulding of political leaders and as a Bonafide witness of the 50 yearøs journey. The Celebrations will take place at the University of Nairobi on the following dates: 3rd, 4th and 5th of December 2013. (The venue and programme will be communicated).

There will be a wide range of presentations from different individuals, organizations and institutions giving their insights and sharing their experiences with us including the Academia, The Greenbelt, the Judiciary, the Media, Human Rights organizations, and Religious institutions, relevant Ministries, the Prisons and Maendeleo Ya Wanawake, among others. Renowned individuals and personalities will include Rev. Timothy Njoya, political prisoners, Mau Mau fighters, the young Turks, and women representatives, among others. Here Pertinent Issues Affecting Kenyans and their History will be discussed, and lessons learnt will be teased out.

õA Leap after 50 Years of Independence: What Way Forward For Kenya?"

The Diplomatic Corps of different countries will share their political and diplomatic relations with Kenya. Additionally, the Newsletter "*Pace Setter*ö will be launched. In this Newsletter, different students will give their insights on different issues pertaining to the 50 years of independence and propose way forward for Kenya.

During the three days, there will be different entertainment groups including Mwalimu Thomas Wesonga (Patriotic Songs), The Free travelling Theatre (University of Nairobi), The University Choir and the Kibera Women forum for Peace and Development, just to mention a few.
